

Add some Modern Zen to your quilting and join me as I unlock the secrets to creating your very own modern mandala that will sparkle and shine! Constructing a mod mandala is both meditative and exciting, especially as they begin to take shape and bloom into a starry design!

* In a 1 day workshop, participants will go through the steps by completing one or more quadrants of the Mod Mandala design. Finished Mod Mandala size will be approximately 21" square.



Supply List:

☐ Fabric:

- Background Fabric: 3/4 yard (SOLID or SMALL, non-directional print that reads as a solid)
- Wide Bias Strips: 2 matching packages of Wrights .5" SINGLE fold bias tape (4 yards/package, available at most fabric/craft box stores)-Choose a color that contrasts with your background fabric
- Skinny Strips: 1/3 yard (solid or SMALL scale print: strips, dots, plaid/grid all work great, can also be used for binding)—Choose a fabric that contrasts with your background fabric. It may match, complement or contrast with your Wide Strip Bias Tape.

☐ Thread:

- Clear Monofilament Thread. Recommend Superior Monopoly thread—comes in clear (for light colored bias tape colors/fabrics) and smoke (for darker bias tape colors/fabrics).
- Neutral piecing thread that blends in with your background fabric (Recommend Aurifil 50 weight)

□ Tools/Notions

- Clover ¼" Bias Tape Maker (light green, #6)
- Light box that is at least 10"x12"
- Pins
- Thread Snips and Scissors for Cutting Fabric
- Iron (small travel iron is fine)/Pressing Mat
- Maryellen's Best Press—CLEAR/SCENT-FREE or Starch Spray
- Elmer's "School" Glue (bring either a fine tip applicator if you have one)
- Tape: Blue Painter's Tape and Clear Scotch Tape
- · Pencil, pen or small permanent marker
- Rotary Cutting Tools: 6"x24" rotary ruler, 12" square rotary ruler, 18x24 Rotary Mat and Rotary Cutter

☐ Sewing Machine in good working order with the following accessories:

- Topstitch or Microtex Machine Needles Size 90
- 1/4" piecing Foot
- Open Toe Embroidery/Applique Foot (for piecing/applique)
- · Extension Table
- · Knee lift bar if your machine has that feature




Showcase Speaker


Tax time and the return of a favorite cartoon

Calls for Entry

Continuing our notifications for ways to display your quilts and textile pieces to a wider audience... Entering shows is not difficult, but to begin here are a few guidelines:

- Always make sure you read everything in the call including the calendar, requirements, rules, etc. Especially the rules! Will save headaches and disappointment later on.
- Keep a record on your entries so you won't be caught with a quilt needing to go two places at once.
 Having to remove a quilt from a show or exhibit because you misread the exhibition dates is a no-no.
 Ask me how I know...
- Having a great photo of your quilt straight on, in focus, not on a bed or held up showing hands and feet, super important. There is lots of great info on quilt photography on line. Google!
- Don't be intimidated or depressed by a rejection! There are lots of different reasons why a quilt doesn't fit into a specific show. It is usually not because your quilt is bad!

Quilted Comics & Sci-Fi

Did you grow up watching "Batman," "Superman," or "The Hulk" on TV? How about "Star Trek?" Do you love the recent Wonder Woman, Avengers, and Star Wars movies? Can't wait for the next season of Game of Thrones or Westworld? Have you read all of the Harry Potter and Twilight novels? Are you playing Assassin's Creed or Overwatch on your video game system (or your teenager's!).

Now's your chance to create a quilt that portrays your love of super heroes, villains, fantasy, comic book, or anime characters for a special exhibit that will be on display at the 2019 editions of both the International Quilt Festival and Comicpalooza (one of the country's largest pop culture conventions) in Houston, Texas at the George R, Brown Convention Center.

We are interested in sharing newly made quilts on these subjects and more, with any technique—piecing, appliqué, embroidery, photo transfer, whole cloth and/or manipulated fabric, etc. Let your inner bold heroine or nefarious no-good doer burst out on fabric!

HANDS ALL AROUND

Call Open February 18-April 18, 2019

Artists from around the world incorporate influences from their own cultures into the design and technique of their quilts. This prestigious, long-running international showcase includes a variety of recent quilts from international artists.

SCHOOLHOUSE QUILTS

Call open February 1-April 25, 2019

The Schoolhouse block has been a favorite of traditional quilters for over a century. Quilt Historian Barbara Brackman mentions the block in her book Clues in the Calico. The first quilt using the block was dated 1890-

1892. The block was known by several names including Old Kentucky Home and Old Folks Home, until 1929 when Ruth Finley gave the block the endearing name Schoolhouse. For entry information and entry form http://www.quilts.com/enter-a-quilt.html

THE MATH AND SCIENCE OF QUILTS

Many people would like to think they won't need it or use the math and science courses required in high school and college, but quilters use both in making quilts. The fibers with which quilters work (the science) make the entire process possible and the quilt useable. Quilters use math to determine the size and shape of the quilt and pieces—squares, rectangles, hexagons, stars, half square triangles, etc.—and the amount of fabric, batting, and thread needed to complete the quilt or to purchase. HISTORY AND READING OF QUILTS

The quilts for this exhibit reflect history and/or reading training. The basic reading books that immediately come to mind for many people are the Dick and Jane series and phonics readers. The Hardy Boys and Nancy Drew Mysteries were once also a staple in local libraries. And their places have since been taken over by contemporary efforts like the Percy Jackson and Harry Potter series. TACTILE ARCHITECTURE™ 2019

Buildings have a long history of inspiring the creative designs of quiltmakers. In the 19th century, American quilters developed classic architectural patterns such as Log Cabin, Schoolhouse, and Brick Wall. This annual juried exhibit challenges quilt makers to create works based on architectural themes and inspirations. Once she unlocked the idea of pairing the fabrics to create half square triangles, the shimmer began to happen, much to the surprise of the participants. The shimmer prompted lots of uh and ahs as everyone's fabrics started combining to create a totally different design.

The second part of the class was after the quarterly meeting at the Senior Center in Westchester allowing the quilters a little more space to view their creations. Jenny also showed a larger style, one block pattern that a few of us started to cut out.

Jenny stayed with Barbara Weigold and Sally Wright. She had a great relaxing time with both quilters. She enjoyed her private tour of Beverly Hills.

Sunday, I picked her up and toured around the area. Jenny loves tiles, so we started out at the Annenberg Beach House in Santa Monica. Only two of the bathrooms were open. Luckily, I had pictures of the tiles in the third bathroom. Julia Morgan designed the tiles in an ombre color way from darker to lighter creating rectangles with square tiles. It was a beautiful sunny day at the beach.

Feeling a little peckish, we drove to Koreatown for lunch at Park's Barbequ. What a lunch we had. Beautiful food cooked for us on the cooktop in the table.

Off to the airport with a brief stop at: the Knitting Tree and the Sewing Lounge. Jenny loves knitting as much as quilting. She promises to be back at Asilomar with the Cairo Tentmakers, so if you want to know more about this process there will be two sessions next year.

Editor's Note:

Patterns, Rhythm and Repetition

A recent class I took was much harder than I expected. It wasn't about sewing; it was more about what makes good design, embracing all those design buzz words like symmetry, asymmetry, abstract, or figurative. Keep in mind, scale and size, center of interest, color and value once you have your pattern established. The class pushed us to work with geometric shapes to create new original designs, designs you would call abstract. The variety of work in the class was amazing! One person explored DNA structure (her occupation), another Morse code, but most were just abstract. And there is a big difference between just abstract and exciting abstract!

I loved the class, even though it caused me pause! The class was introspective in many ways. I discovered I'm more of an idea or concept first followed by a design rather than start with a basic shape and morph it in to a design. To push us all along, each day we were greeted with a daily quote on the chalkboard such as: "Creativity is Contagious. Pass it on." Albert Einstein. If you get a chance to take a class with Rosalie Dace, I highly recommend it. Pass it on!




