This time will pass and we will always remember it.


Thanks for all you are doing for yourselves, your families and our community.

#### **Facial Masks**

Quilts from the Heart, a group of volunteer quilters are busy changing their mission from charitable quilts to making facial masks to address the lack of personal protective gear. There is an overlap of Westside Quilters in this group. As of today, 123 masks have been delivered to local hospitals. The next group is destined for local nursing homes in the area.

Patti Londre, a Westside Quilter has gathered her neighbors to cut pre-washed fabric into "kits". Matching up inner masks with the These are delivered by Nina outer fabric. Flores, another member of both groups and leader of Quilts from the Heart. The approved downloaded CDC pattern was from www.craftpassion.com. It does not go over a respirator, but is a barrier that is better than nothing. Most nurses request at least two, so that one can be washed while the other one is worn.

#### How to make a Face Mask

What you will need

-Cotton fabric, a pretty print is best.

-Rope Elastic, beading cord elastic will work (you may also us 1/8" flat elastic)

-Cut the elastic7" long and tie a knot at each end (DO NOT knot the ends of the flat)

You can make two sizes: Adult or Child

- Put right sides of cotton fabric together of Cut 9x6 (Adult) or 7.5 x 5 (Child)
- 2. Starting at the center of the bottom edge, sew to the first corner, stop. Sew the elastic with the edge out into the corner. A few stitches forward and back will hold this.
- 3. Sew to the next corner, stop, and bring the other end of the same elastic to the corner and sew a few stitches forward and back.
- 4. Now sew across that top of the mask to the next corner. Again, put an elastic with the edge out.
- 5. Sew to the next corner and sew in the other end of the same elastic.
- 6. Sew across the bottom leaving about 1.5" to 2" open. Stop, cut the thread. Turn inside out.
- 7. Pin 3 tucks on each side of the mask. Make sure the tucks are the same direction
- 8. Sew around the edge of the mask twice.

It is so easy to make this.

Be sure any fabric design is placed horizontally.





#### How to Make an Adult Mask with Ties Supplies for 1 mask:

One (1) 8x14 inch piece of cotton fabric Two (2) 1.5 x34 inch strips Thread & sewing machine

#### Prepare the mask:

On 8/14-inch piece, right sides together, sew 1/4 inch seam, creating tube.

Turn right sides out, press seam and fabric.

Make 3 pleats, approx. 1 inch each in size, using steam or pins to hold. Mask will be approx. 3-3.5 inches in width.

Sew  $\frac{1}{4}$  inch seam on each side of mask, securing pleats.

Trim seam allowance.

#### Prepare the ties:

Fold in half and press (3/4 inch). Open tieback up. Fold each edge in to meet middle (3/8 inch/0.375 inch) and press.

Fold in half again, securing raw edges inside and press. Each tie will be approx. 3/8 inch in width.

#### Assembly:

Align center of tie with side of mask, open tie so edge of mask fits snugly inside. Pin.

Sew tie to mask, seam will be very short, get as close as able while still catching all fabric. You are just attaching the mask to the tie at this point, not sewing the whole tie yet.

Repeat for other tie and other side of mask.

Sew down edges of tie, securing raw edges inside. Seam is very short. You will stitch over where mask is already attached. This is good because it helps reinforce.

Repeat for other tie and other side of mask. Clip any stray fabric and enjoy

#### **Staying Connected**



### Calls for Entry, April 2020

As of now in early April many quilt shows and textile exhibits have canceled or postponed due to the virus outbreak. Personally, I have had two accepted exhibit opportunities postponed until further notice and though I am disappointed, I'm at least happy that I had not already shipped the quilts. So, from my experience this advice - if you plan on entering a show or exhibit in the near future make sure that the event is going on as planned before you shell out cash for an entry or send your work.

Meanwhile I'll continue to list the Calls for Entry for Quilt Festival Long Beach and Houston. Some of these have been updated so please check on the dates below. They are current as we know it. And the call for the main judged show is now open! Nothing beats having your work seen in Houston. Enter now!

Here are some suggestions for quilt entry photography from International Quilt Festival. <u>PHOTOGRAPHING YOUR QUILT FOR SUBMISSION</u>

Continuing our notifications for ways to display your quilts and textile pieces to a wider audience... Entering shows is not difficult, but to begin here are a few guidelines:

- Always make sure you read everything in the call including the calendar, requirements, rules, etc. Especially the rules! Will save headaches and disappointment later on.
- Keep a record on your entries so you won't be caught with a quilt needing to go two places at once.
  Having to remove a quilt from a show or exhibit because you misread the exhibition dates is a no-no.
  Ask me how I know...
- Having a great photo of your quilt straight on, in focus, not on a bed or held up showing hands and feet, super important. There is lots of great info on quilt photography on line. Google!
- Don't be intimidated or depressed by a rejection! There are lots of different reasons why a quilt doesn't fit into a specific show. It is usually not because your quilt is bad!

#### MOVIES AND MUSICALS: HOORAY FOR HOLLYWOOD!

Hollywood's rich artistic history has inspired moviegoers and fed their fantasies ever since the Silent Era. And everyone seems to have their own list of favorite films, actors, actresses, and directors. Quilts submitted for this exhibit should be inspired by those celluloid dreams – and the people who helped make them come to life across the decades. *Entry Deadline April 15, 2020* 

#### ART DECO INSPIRED QUILTS

Inspired by geometric designs, streamlined forms, and sometimes offbeat colors, the Art Deco movement was stylish, influential, and omnipresent from 1925 through the 1940s. Art Deco was reflected in paintings, crafts,

fine arts, and even architecture. Quilts submitted for this exhibit should be inspired by this much-loved style. *Entry Deadline April 23, 2020* 

#### ART NOUVEAU – CRAFT AS ART

From the 1880s until World War I, western Europe and the United States witnessed the development and ascent of the Art Nouveau style. Taking inspiration from the unruly aspects of the natural world, Art Nouveau influenced art and architecture, the applied arts, graphic work, and illustration. Some of its best-known practitioners include Toulouse-Lautrec, Tiffany & Company, Alphonse Mucha, and William Morris. Quilts submitted for this exhibit should reflect Art Nouveau themes and style. *Entry Deadline April 22, 2020* 

#### BEST OF THE WEST COAST GUILDS: AWARD-WINNING TRADITIONAL QUILTS

The west coast of the United States is home to scores of guilds and groups where members meet to share friendship, experiences, and create new quilts. This exhibit features some of the best traditional work done by quilters of all styles – appliquéd, pieced, wholecloth – and skill levels. Entrants should have previously won an award in a guild competition/show. Quilts submitted for this exhibit should have been completed in the past five years or less. \*WQ does not sponsor a quilt show, but a lot of you belong to a number of guilds that do\* *Entry Deadline April 20, 2020* 

#### **QUILTING AS THERAPY**

Art Therapy uses the creative process – and works of art created during a patient's therapy – to help those in treatment develop self-awareness, explore emotions, address unresolved emotional conflicts, improve social skills, and raise self-esteem. Quilts submitted for this exhibit should stem from the quilter's own therapeutic journey or practices in their own lives. *Entry Deadline April 27, 2020*

#### **FINE CHINA**

Entries are quilts that are based on china patterns or traditional quilt patterns that are associated with china or crystal. "Fine" china was once the top item on every bride-to-be's wish list. Autumn, Blue Fluted Half Lace, Wedgwood Jasperware, Wild Strawberry, and Willow Blue are some of the most popular China Patterns.

- All styles traditional, modern, and art are acceptable for this quilt call.
- Limit three (3) entries per person.
- Each work must measure at least 49 inches (130 cm) on each side.
- The quilt can be NO LARGER than 86 inches (218.44 cm) ON A SIDE.
- The participating works must be available for two years, from June 2020 through November 2022.
- Entry deadline April 30, 2020

#### FINE FEATHERED QUILTS

A selection of Feathered Star and Princess Feather quilts will make a powerful statement as an exhibit at International Quilt Festival, Houston and as a book whose profit will be donated to the Texas Quilt Museum.

We are interested in sharing antique, or modern, newly made, inherited, bought, etc., with any techniques piecing, appliqué, embroidery, photo transfer, wholecloth and/or manipulated fabric, etc.

- There are two categories: Yesteryear quilts made prior to 1930 and Today quilts made in 1930 and after.
- Limit five (5) entries per person or group.
- Each work must measure at least 50 inches (130 cm) on each side.
- The quilt cannot be larger than 86 inches (218.44 cm) ON A SIDE.
- We would like the participating works to be available for three years of travel, from August 2020 through August 2023.

#### • Entry deadline May 7, 2020

#### HANDS ALL AROUND

Artists from all around the world incorporate influences from their own cultures into the design and technique of their art quilts.

- Limit two (2) entries per person.
- Quilts must be a minimum of 36" (91 cm) wide and maximum of 108" (274 cm) wide.
- No more than 90" (228 cm) in length.
- Made between January 2017 and February 2020.
- The participating works must be available for two years, from June 2020 through September 2020.
- Entry deadline May 7, 2020

#### HARRY POTTER QUILTS

We love Harry Potter! If you do too, why not enjoy one of the free Harry Potter-themed quilt patterns available online or use your magical imagination and submit a quilt following the below rules. These quilts should feature characters, themes, or elements from the world of Harry Potter books and movies. These are to make and enjoy and show, not to sell, out of respect of JK Rowling's creativity and intellectual rights.

All styles traditional, modern, and art are acceptable for this quilt call.

- Limit three (3) entries per person.
- Quilts must have been made between January 2017- March 2020.
- Each work must measure at least 44 inches (130 cm) on each side.
- The quilt can be NO LARGER than 86 inches (218.44 cm) ON A SIDE.
- The participating works must be available for two years, from June 2020 through September 2022.
- Entry deadline May 11, 2020

#### HISTORY AND READING QUILTS

The quilts for this call should reflect history and/or reading instruction.

Quilt artists are encouraged to illustrate their History or Reading (book) quilt, in its simplicity and/or its complexity in answer to this call.

The selected pieces will not only feature the quilt art, but hopefully open a lively discussion on the amazing world of history, or an event in history, and reading (books).

- All styles traditional, modern, and art are acceptable for this quilt call.
- Limit three (3) entries per person.
- Each work must measure at least 50 inches (130 cm) on each side.
- The quilt can be NO LARGER than 86 inches (218.44 cm) ON A SIDE.
- The participating works must be available for two years, from June 2020 through September 2022.
- Entry deadline May 21, 2020

#### IN FULL BLOOM

Just as quilters create beautiful pieces of art with fabric, florists and gardeners cultivate works of beauty from the soil.

- All styles traditional, modern, and art are acceptable for this quilt call.
- Limit two (2) entries per person.
- Quilts must be a minimum of 36" × 36".
- New for 2020. No more than 90" (228 cm) in length.
- Made between January 2017 and February 2020.
- The participating works must be available for two years, from May 2020 through September 2022.
- Entry Deadline April 16, 2020.

#### IN THE AMERICAN TRADITION

This exhibit features recently-made quilts that harken back to the time of traditional blocks, styles, and techniques as their design source.

We are looking for both contemporary interpretations and traditional quilts, either by hand or machine, appliquéd, pieced, or wholecloth.

- Limit two (2) entries per person.
- Each work must measure at least 50 inches (130 cm) on each side.
- Width and length not to exceed 108".
- The participating works must be available for two years, from June 2020 through September 2022.
- Entry deadline April 9, 2020

#### LANDSCAPE QUILTS

From valleys and volcanoes, and mountains to monuments, landscapes often inspire artists, including many in the quilt world.

- All styles traditional, modern, and art are acceptable for this quilt call.
- Limit two (2) entries per person.
- Quilts must be a minimum of 36" × 36".
- New for 2020. No more than 90" (228 cm) in length.
- Made between January 2017 and February 2020.
- The participating works must be available for two years, from May 2020 through September 2022.
- Entry deadline April 30, 2020

#### THE MATH AND SCIENCE OF QUILTS

In high school and college, most of us take math and science courses because they are a basic requirement and we like to think we won't need it or use it. As quilters, we use both constantly in making our quilts without consciously thinking about it. The fibers we work with (the science) frame the entire process. We use math to determine the size and shape of the quilt, and the pieces.

- All styles traditional, modern, and art are acceptable for this quilt call.
- Limit three (3) entries per person.
- Each work must measure at least 50 inches (130 cm) on each side.
- The quilt can be NO LARGER than 86 inches (218.44 cm) ON A SIDE.
- The participating works must be available for two years, from June 2020 through September 2022.

#### **QUILTED COMICS AND SCI-FI 2020**

Theme: Entries are quilts on the themes of comic books, science fiction, fantasy, and pop culture. Did you grow up watching "Batman," "Superman," or "Star Trek?" Love the Avengers or Star Wars movies? Dug into the Harry Potter books? Are you playing your children's video games when they are at school? Now's your chance to create a quilt that portrays your love of super heroes, villains, fantasy, comic book, or anime characters to be on display at the International Quilt Festival 2020.

- All types of techniques are acceptable.
- You may enter up to three (3) quilts per person.
- Each work must measure at least 40 inches (130 cm) on each side. The quilt cannot be larger than 86 inches (218.44 cm) ON A SIDE.
- Quilts submitted for this exhibit should have been completed in the past five years or less.

#### SCHOOLHOUSE QUILTS

The Schoolhouse block has been a favorite of traditional quilters for over a century. The quilt block has been known by several names including Old Kentucky Home and Old Folks Home. There are many versions of the block design available. Whether you decide to use the traditional design or a current interpretation, we want to see it.

- All styles traditional, modern, and art are acceptable for this quilt call.
- Limit three (3) entries per person.
- Each work must measure at least 50 inches (130 cm) on each side.
- The quilt can be NO LARGER than 86 inches (218.44 cm) ON A SIDE.
- The participating works must be available for two years, from June 2020 through September 2022.

#### **TACTILE ARCHITECTURE™**

Buildings have a long history of inspiring the creative designs of quiltmakers. In the 19th century, American quilters developed classic architectural patterns such as Log Cabin, Schoolhouse, and Brick Wall.

- All styles traditional, modern, and art are acceptable for this quilt call.
- Limit two (2) entries per person.
- Quilts must be a minimum of 36" × 36".
- New for 2020. No more than 90" (228 cm) in length.
- Made between January 2017 and February 2020.
- The participating works must be available for two years, from May 2020 through September 2022.

### Rosie lee Tompkins at the Berkeley Museum of Fine Art

Rosie lee Tompkins was an assumed name for the artist, Effie Mae Martin. I always think of her as a California artist. I don't know when she moved to Richmond, Ca. from Arkansas, where she was born, but I think she was in Richmond during her most productive time from the 1980s till the late 1990s.

Her work is very arresting. The intensity of color enhanced by her frequent use of velvet. Although she used a number of fairly typical patterns, my favorites used no shapes more complicated than triangles and squares but she used color to enlarge basic themes into really complex rhythms,

She did some quilts and other fabric sculptures as comments on history or society. They do not have the tour de force quality of the other work.

A religious soul, she created some of her quilts to the function of "healing devotionals."

She often only did the piecing but gave credit to the women who did the quilting for her - often Irene Bankhead.

Maybe if she were active today, she would be excited by machine quilting and do her own quilting!


