MY OBSESSION WITH APPLI-POPS

If you have ever heard of "Appli-Pops" you know they are different size discs of fabric made from round metal washers, one inserted into another (for lack of better words).

I jumped at the idea of making nice easy appliqué circles with finished edges. I thought "great! What a wonderful way of using all those small left over pieces of fabric from previous projects"... Yeah, right! That scrap basket is only down a bit! I became obsessed with using up those scraps.



Well...the first day was like a drug...I was totally hooked! I now became an "Appli-Pops" junkie!!!!! The creative juices were like lava...I just couldn't stop! It was amazing how many of these discs I could make with such a small piece of fabric.

Once I had over 100 of these discs, I wondered what I would make. I played around with a black background and came up with a few designs. I tried different solid backgrounds and found "this is the greatest creation since the rotary cutter"!

I spent at least 2 weeks making "Appli-Pops" and have changed the design of what I want to do with them at least a dozen times. See photos...

Using a distinctive style characterized by a dream-like use of color and imagery, her dye-painted scenes of multi-cultural life convey the untold stories of women, children, families, and the earth, and have been described as "easy to gaze at, but hard to forget."

With an educational background in design and photography, and over 35 years of experience as a professional artist, Hollis' work can be found in public and private collections throughout the world. In addition to creating her art, Hollis holds lectures and workshops in the United States and abroad,

instructing students in subjects including color, drawing, design, dyepainting, and quilting technique.

Zoom links will be sent to ALL members as part of your membership to Westside Quilters of Los Angeles. You do NOT need to fill out a registration form for this lecture.










What is Slow Stitching and how is it different from a Sew-In?

It is less about getting something done fast, it is about enjoying the process of embroidery, binding a quilt, darning a garment, knitting, crocheting, tattling, or hand piecing a block. Members frequently enjoy tea or coffee with conversation. Members can come and go at their leisure. One of the Program Co-chairs is vigilant about monitoring the "door" of the Zoom room. You can invite your friends by passing on the Zoom link.



This is designed as a casual day, no pressure, no trivia, or serious discussions. Come and have fun with your fellow Guild members. There is no need to register for this event, there will be enough chairs for everyone with good lighting.



Calls for Entry April 2021

As we have learned recently most shows and exhibits this Fall and Winter have either been cancelled, postponed or have gone virtual. All AQS quilt competitions at their shows for 2021 are cancelled. International Quilt Festival is planning an in person show in Fall 2021 and their calls are below. However, before sending off your entry to any show, double check to make sure that the event is actually taking place. There are a few deadlines coming up soon and some listed below to get ready for next Spring and Fall. Hopefully as 2021 progresses there will be more opportunities. Watch this space!

Here are some suggestions for quilt entry photography from International Quilt Festival.

PHOTOGRAPHING YOUR QUILT FOR SUBMISSION

Continuing our notifications for ways to display your quilts and textile pieces to a wider audience... Entering shows is not difficult, but to begin here are a few guidelines:

- Always make sure you read everything in the call including the calendar, requirements, rules, etc. Especially the rules! Will save headaches and disappointment later on.
- Keep a record on your entries so you won't be caught with a quilt needing to go two places at once. Having to remove a quilt from a show or exhibit because you misread the exhibition dates is a no-no. Ask me how I know...
- Having a great photo of your quilt straight on, in focus, not on a bed or held up showing hands and feet, super important. There is lots of great info on quilt photography on line. Google!
- Don't be intimidated or depressed by a rejection! There are lots of different reasons why a quilt doesn't fit into a specific show. It is usually not because your quilt is bad!

The calls below are just a sample of the many opportunities out there. For more search "Fiber Art Calls for Entry" or "Quilt Calls for Entry"

Martha Sielman the Executive Director of SAQA is working on a new book which will celebrate all types of **fiber art about birds**. It will hopefully be published in 2023. She is looking for a variety of birds, compositions, techniques, and approaches. To submit your work, fill out the submission form at https://www.saqa.com/events/call-submissions-book-about-birds. **The deadline is April 30, 2021.** Final decisions about inclusion will be in July.

2021 Competition Theme: Visuals #4 National Quilting Competition - Mancuso Springfest. Although quilting is a very tactile experience, the real impact is when we all step back and see the visual of what has been created. With this in mind, we are going ahead with our third virtual quilt competition.

Quilts may be entered in the Full-Size Quilt Competition (Innovative/Traditional Categories), Mid-Century Mod Modern Quilt Competition, or the Wall Quilt Competition.

Competition is open only to residents of the United States.

Online Entry Deadline: 11:59 p.m., Tuesday, April 6, 2021

Hands All Around

Artists from all around the world incorporate influences from their own cultures into the design and technique of their quilts. This prestigious, long-running international showcase will include recent quilts by international artists who create works inspired by such.

- Limit two (2) entries per person.
- Each work must measure a minimum of 36" on each side.
- The guilt can be NO LONGER than 96" ON A SIDE.
- There is a \$20 submission fee per quilt.
- The works must be made between 2017 and 2021.
- Entry Deadline May 21, 2021

In Full Bloom

Just as quilters create beautiful pieces of art with fabric, florists and gardeners cultivate works of beauty from the soil. The International Quilt Festival will showcase floral quilts from across the spectrum in color and splendor in the special exhibit. This exhibit will premiere at the International Quilt Market and Festival/Houston, October 28 thru 31 – 2021. We would also like to retain quilts for a possible exhibit at International Quilt Festivals in 2022.

- Limit two (2) entries per person.
- Each work must measure a minimum of 36" on each side.
- The guilt can be NO LONGER than 96" ON A SIDE.
- There is a \$20 submission fee per quilt.
- The works must be made between 2017 and 2021.
- Entry Deadline May 21, 2021

In The American Tradition

Contemporary quiltmakers often look to the art form's rich tradition for inspiration in their own works. This exhibit features recently-made quilts that incorporate traditional blocks, styles, and/or techniques.

- Limit three (3) entries per person.
- Each work must measure a minimum of 36" on each side.
- The guilt can be NO LONGER than 96" ON A SIDE.
- There is a \$20 submission fee per quilt.
- There is no made by date.
- Entry Deadline May 21, 2021

Landscape Quilts

From valleys and volcanoes, and mountains to monuments, landscapes often inspire artists, including many in the quilt world. We invite you to submit your recently made landscape quilts to be featured in this exhibit.

Limit two (2) entries per person.

- Each work must measure a minimum of 36" on each side.
- The guilt can be NO LONGER than 96" ON A SIDE.
- There is a \$20 submission fee per quilt.
- Entry Deadline May 7, 2021

Tactile Architecture

Buildings have a long history of inspiring the creative designs of quiltmakers. In the 19th century, American quilters developed classic architectural patterns such as Log Cabin, Schoolhouse, and Brick

Wall. This annual juried exhibit challenges quiltmakers to create works based on architectural themes and inspirations.

- Limit two (2) entries per person.
- Each work must measure a minimum of 36" on each side.
- The quilt can be NO LONGER than 96" ON A SIDE.
- There is a \$20 submission fee per quilt.
- The works must be made between 2017 and 2021.
- Entry Deadline May 7, 2021

Featured WQ Member:

Lisa Drew Member since 2012

My mother-in-law, Alice, introduced me to quilting over 20 years ago. She was a prolific quilter, had owned a quilt shop and regularly taught classes back in Pennsylvania. Whenever she would visit, I would drive her around to various quilt and fabric stores spending hours browsing & eventually caught the bug myself. We spent every visit, here, there or anywhere else we met up sewing. She was an inspiration to say the least.

The quilts I make are usually bed or couch quilts. Apart from a few appliqued ones, they are nearly all for everyday use & get taken everywhere including camping & at the beach. My family & most of my friends have at least one & my kids pretty much have a quilt for every holiday. My current favorite

are the siddi quilts. I just took a class with Sujata Shah & am now starting my second piece.

Over the years how often I quilt has varied. I used to do a lot of handwork when I would take my kids to their activities. Lately, because of COVID & being an empty-nester I have been sewing a lot more, at least a few times a week & once I get on a roll, late into the night. In the last year I have made a mystery quilt, a house quilt, some philanthropy quilts & have been working my way through my UFOs slowly but surely.

At the end of each trip, we were both inspired & exhausted, & came home laden down with samples we had received & the spoils of the Thursday evening fabric sale, which was one of the craziest but most fun shopping experiences I have ever experienced.

I love looking on Instagram, Pinterest and YouTube for inspiration & ideas. Show and Tell is always inspiring & talking to quilting friends leads me to look up new artists, teachers & techniques online.

I have made some of my friends quilts for their "big" birthdays. For the first one I did, I quilted parts of my friend's favorite poem, Howl, onto the quilt where it was not obvious at first glance. A couple of months after receiving it he called, surprised and excited that he had found it. On telling this to another friend, she said "did you put any words in mine?" then went home to find her "hidden" messages.





WQ Member Articles and News:

WHAT ARE HMONG STORY CLOTHS?

Years before I began quilting, I purchased a Hmong story cloth at an outdoor art fair at Exposition Park. The story of daily life in a Laotian community half-way across the world decorated my white walls for a long time. But I never knew the significance of the story cloth until now.

My family watched the evening news from Vietnam every night at dinner. The statistics of soldiers killed in action were followed by anti-war protests from nearby Berkeley. When the US finally withdrew from Vietnam in 1973, the bitter stories of what happened to US supporters in surrounding countries were hidden.

The Hmong people were forced out of their homes in Laos and had to escape to refugee camps to save their lives. When they were resettled in the US, the women turned to making story cloths to help feed their children. View Hmong Story Cloths and Map of Southeast Asia

Some of the cloths told the story of the daily life of the Hmong before the war with scenes of fishing and growing rice. Others showed bombers dropping chemicals on farms and people, causing devastation and hunger. Farm and War Life in Story Cloths

Applique is the main technique with a turned edge. My cloth uses solid colors with a dark blue for the background, and an even darker blue for the border. Bright colors make people and their clothes stand out in contrast. The expertise of the Hmong embroidery in these cloths continues their tradition of detailed embroidery. History of Hmong Needlework

Many of the Hmong were resettled into the Pennsylvania area near Amish quilters. Since the Hmong women were expert artisans, some were recruited to help sew for the Amish quilting businesses. This arrangement benefited the Amish who had a strong demand for their traditional quilts, and the Hmong women who had few other job opportunities. <u>Hmong Women Sew for Amish Quilters</u>

<u>Kao Kalia Yang, Hmong author</u> has written many successful books about the experiences and culture of the Hmong.

Despite the pain of the past, today we can celebrate the outstanding talents of the Hmong immigrants who have contributed so much to the diversity of our quilting traditions.
