
- "Fabric Postcards" workshop with Carol Morrissey Friday, August 12th. Registration is open!

"Fabric Postcards" Workshop Friday August 12, 2022 10:00am - 1:00 pm.

The workshop fee is s \$30 plus a \$14 pattern fee (\$16 if it includes the heavy-duty interfacing order directly from Carol at ocaroldesigns.com).

"Fabric Postcards", is one of Carol Morissey's most popular workshops. These colorful little pieces are fun to create, they're quick, and they make great gifts. Plus, they're a standard size, so they can be easily and inexpensively framed! Carol has three different postcard collections from which to choose (pattern purchase is required for the workshop). And, as a bonus, if you give Carol enough advance notice, she will design a couple of original postcards just for your group!


Carol will share her favorite fusing techniques while we make colorful postcards using fused, raw edge appliqué. You can actually mail these postcards if you want, or use them as gifts, frame them, or swap with friends.

Each participant is required to purchase one of her postcard patterns (www.ocaroldesigns.com).

Please notice that you have the option to order a pattern that includes four pieces of Peltex, or you may order the pattern only, and purchase your own Peltex. Please order well in advance of the class to allow adequate time for mail delivery.



- 1. Pencil and note paper
- 2. Wonder Under #805, or your preferred brand of paper backed fusible web. One yard is plenty.
- 3. A non-stick pressing sheet or a piece of parchment paper
- 4. A light box, or a bright window where you can trace
- 5. Scissors
- 6. Iron and ironing surface
- 7. Peltex 72F heavy duty interfacing or similar product (it's stiff, like a hat brim). Postcards measure 4" x 6", so you may purchase the amount of Peltex based on how many you wish to make. It should measure 20" wide on the bolt, which means that if you cut carefully, you can cut 15 pieces from half a yard. Some brands or types of heavy-duty interfacing such as this have fusible web on one side, both sides, or none at all. It doesn't matter which type you get because you can add Wonder Under to your background fabric or to the interfacing. I like the 72F because it has fusible on both sides.
- 8. Rotary cutter, ruler, and mat
- 9. Optional but useful: tweezers



Fabric:

Each postcard requires two 4" x 6" pieces of fabric, one for the front and one for the back.

These can be the same, or two different fabrics. The pieces for the appliqué shapes are small, so gather your colorful scraps. Batiks are recommended because of their tight weave.


Sewing machine: A machine is not required for this class. However, you may choose to do some free-motion stitching on the appliqué later. I also zigzag or satin stitch around the outer edges of the cards when they're finished.


Carol Morrissey


At our Quarterly Meeting quilt judge and certified quilt appraiser **Lisa Erlandson** presents "Make Your Best Quilt." What does a judge see when they look at a quilt? How does an appraiser determine the value of your quilt?

This lecture examines the features a judge may look for in choosing a winning quilt as well as the qualities of a quilt that may increase or decrease the appraised value. More importantly, we will talk the simple things you can do to improve your skills. Even if you never intend to enter your quilt into a competitive contest or have it appraised, you want to make the best quilt you are capable of! Tips will be given to help you make the best quilt you can, whether the quilt is heading to a contest or to cover a loved one.

<u>Bio</u>

Lisa Erlandson is a compulsive quilt collector whose habit has led to several quilt-related specialties. She is an AQS Certified Appraiser of Quilted Textiles, lecturer, quilt show judge, teacher and quilt historian. And, she is a past president of the American Quilt Study Group. Lisa has appeared on 'The Quilt Show with Alex Anderson and Ricky Tims'.

She learned to sew as a child but considered it punishment (and maybe it was). She re-discovered sewing in the mid 1980s as a drama teacher and made her first quilt in 1991. Lisa has a Master of Arts degree in Public Communication from the University of North Texas. She taught junior high school, high school and college before deciding to focus on the quilt world.

Accidental Landscape™: Beaches Create miniature Beach seascapes using Karen's "Layered Waves" technique. The little Beach scenes are quick and easy to make, no templates, no fuss – just free form rotary cutting and topstitched edges. The results are always a pleasant surprise. Personalize your beach by adding collage details like a dune fence, beach grass, shells, sailboats, beach chairs, umbrellas, lighthouses, photo transfers, etc. by adding lace, yarns, and beads. Finished size: approx. 8" x 12" (not including borders)

Accidental Landscapes: What they are and how they evolved

How can a landscape be accidental? Lines and colors are carefully planned and the process of layering is left to serendipity. Curved or zigzag strips are cut free form (no templates or foundation bases are used), the edges are ironed under, then layered one on top of each other starting from the sky and working to the bottom of the scene. The scene is then pinned and topstitched. The topstitching is done 1/8" from the edge which gives the surface a wonderful added texture.



When teaching my "Layered Curves and Peaks" technique, my students would learn the topstitching technique by creating a textured piece of "Layered Curves" fabric. The fabric could then be used as is or cut up in different ways to form fun designs. Often, we would notice that if we viewed the curved lines in a horizontal format, we could envision little abstract landscapes. I tried making some landscapes on my own and brought them to the next couple of workshops. Everyone loved them and wanted the patterns! I told them that they already knew the technique and besides, the landscapes went together quite accidentally. I promised to try and write down the "guidelines" for the colors and lines. That's how I got into the pattern business – accidentally! (my "Accidental Landscapes" article was featured in the Summer 2003 issue of the "American Quilter" magazine)

Bio

Since I was a little girl, I have always felt the need to create. I consider myself a serious "doodler" – pencil in hand, I just love making lines and patterns. Color had always intimidated me, because I didn't enjoy the mess of mixing paints and I didn't have the color confidence to select the right colors. Fabric was a welcome relief to my dilemma— colors came already "pre-mixed" – no color charts, no mess, no fuss AND I could work with them anywhere in the house. I do love painting on fabric now, which I happily cut up and use in my fabric art.

The sewing machine didn't enter my life until I was 30 years old. I had purchased one as a young mother feeling

it was my duty to own one. The sewing machine sat in a closet till the day I saw my first quilt. Having drawn and taken art lessons since I was 6 years old, I figured that if I could draw it, I could figure out how to sew it. Even though my first projects were far from perfect, I loved working with fabric and couldn't wait to get to the quilting stage to add the wonderful texture to the surface.

I pursued German and Russian languages in college, thinking I would pursue a career as a translator, but spent time in a German commercial bank instead, then switched to doing pen & ink renderings of houses for real estate companies and



homeowners so that I could be home with my children. Next, I dabbled in real estate as a sales agent, however, when I realized that I was *drawing* more houses than selling them, I finally listened to the artist within me and pursued a career in art.

In 1996 I started making art quilts, which were very well received in national and international shows. The awards encouraged me to move forward in my new direction. My hobby officially became my business in 2002 when I opened my business "The Quilted Lizard." For 8 years I taught at a local quilt store and in 2002 I began teaching my technique "Layered Curves" and "Accidental Landscapes™" nationwide. Teaching workshops gives me the opportunity to share my passion for playing with fabric with others, and I love it!!

Supply List

Fabric:

- Sky $-\frac{1}{4}$ yard (1/2 yard if the fabric is directional)
- Sand 1/8 yard of 11 different "sand" fabrics (medium and light values)
- Water 1/8 yard of 3 different water fabrics (one dark, one medium and one light)
- Dune Fence Scraps of appropriate color
- Sailboats scraps of white Fabric scraps for beach grass, beach chairs, umbrellas, bucket, lighthouse, etc.... Tiny shells, beads, yarns, white lace for waves
- Photo transfers (optional)
- Inner Borders (optional) 1/8 yard each
- Outer Border ¼ yard

Supplies

- Sewing Machine Rotary Cutter and mat
- Threads for topstitching select threads to match fabrics or use variegated threads (cottons, rayons or metallics) Neutral thread for bobbin
- Fabric scissors
- Pins (I use the long flower head pins)
- Tracing Paper and pencil (optional for tracing collage details)
- Roxanne's Glue-Baste-It™ or your choice of fabric glue (for collage details)
- Ruler for rotary cutting borders Large Quilter's Square (12" or larger) for squaring piece
- Iron and ironing pad (mini iron will work)
- Threads for quilting (machine or hand)
- Needles for machine quilting or hand quilting
- 100% cotton batting (approx. 18" x 22") + half yard fabric for backing
- "Walking Foot" and/or Darning Foot for Machine
- Quilting Pins for Basting (for tiny quilts like these, pins are great)



Calls for Entry August 2022

So happy to say the quilt shows and exhibits are slowly coming back to life even as the pandemic continues. The Mancuso's PIQF is coming up soon and AQS has published their winter and spring calendar showing below. Right now, as always, before sending off your entry to any show, double check to make sure that the event is actually taking place. See below. Hopefully as 2022 progresses there will be more opportunities. Watch this space!

Here are some suggestions for quilt entry photography from International Quilt Festival.

PHOTOGRAPHING YOUR QUILT FOR SUBMISSION

Continuing our notifications for ways to display your quilts and textile pieces to a wider audience... Entering shows is not difficult, but to begin here are a few guidelines:

- Always make sure you read everything in the call including the calendar, requirements, rules, etc. Especially the rules! Will save headaches and disappointment later on.
- Keep a record on your entries so you won't be caught with a quilt needing to go two places at once. Having to remove a quilt from a show or exhibit because you misread the exhibition dates is a no-no. Ask me how I know...
- Having a great photo of your quilt straight on, in focus, not on a bed or held up showing hands and feet, super important. There is lots of great info on quilt photography on line. Google!
- Don't be intimidated or depressed by a rejection! There are lots of different reasons why a quilt doesn't fit into a specific show. It is usually not because your quilt is bad!



Rhoda Novak - member since 2020 Interview and write up by Pat Karasick

If you have taken a class from Westside Quilters lately, you may recognize Rhoda as she frequently is in a Zoom class. She first joined Westside at the beginning of the Pandemic. One of the big selling points was our Zoom classes and meetings saving her 2-4 hours of driving in from the Valley. She also belongs to two other guilds: Valley Quiltmakers and San Fernando Valley Quilt Guild.

Rhonda started quilting early in her married life as a graduate student. How did she have the time? She made her first pretty, washable and affordable bedspread. Remember when fabric was only \$5.00 a yard or less?

She will be joining Westside Quilters in Carol Morrisey's postcard class (Friday, August 12). She is planning to share her new skill with Caring Calabasas, a philanthropy group as a potential project to make and mail postcards to servicemen overseas.

Her favorite technique is capturing memories or emotions in fabric and thread. Ruth McDowell is a favorite teacher for translating images. Pat Belyea's book, East -Meets-West Quilts has a fast, easy pattern using an 8" rectangles. She loved her lecture last year. Her talk inspired Rhonda to make a Japanese indigo quilt with college insignia and another one using William Morris florals for her grandchildren. Her third quilt using art deco black cat fabric is staying at her house. Not all her quilts are big. Rhoda's last piece was a coaster for her granddaughter using William Morris fabric on the back of an orphan block with an embossed heart.

Currently, she is making fast boutique items, mug rugs, glass/rotary cases for both Valley guilds. Rhonda sews on an antique Bernina 1230. Boy, if her machine could talk what memories would come spilling out. Rhonda does not prewash her fabrics. She does not use starch or finish while ironing.

If you opened her refrigerator, you would find vegetables and fruits from her garden. She is very proud to be able to grow her own in the Valley variable weather.





Coffee with chocolate is her favorite beverage, probably while reading murder mysteries and thrillers since she is starting a new writing project. Our Rhoda has many talents.

She thinks her greatest achievement is having an article published and paid for by American Quilter Magazine with her photo and a piece that she ghost wrote for a European teacher about a technique.

Her big tip is to take classes that take you out of your comfort zone, aim to learn at least one new thing, enjoy the process and don't feel bad if you don't complete the project - it's about learning new techniques. Westside classes always have highly professional teachers. The classes are always

enjoyable with members participating and sharing.

The quote that she lives by is her father's motto: "You can do it!" Sometimes hard to live by, but something to strive for. I think we can all agree.

Rhoda's wish is for our guild and the world, peace, sanity, calm, time for family and love. Time to guilt or do whatever brings you joy and satisfaction.
