Dear Jane is a quilt that Jane Stickle completed in 1863 during the Civil War. Brenda Papadakis discovered it at the Bennington Museum in Vermont and introduced it to the world in 1996.



PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

A Quilt Show Adventure

On November 4th, the African American Quilters of Los Angeles held a one day quilt show at the Carson Community Center. I attended the show on the advice of a friend who is a mosaic artist but who has friends in the AAQ of LA.

It was a quick drive down the 405. The room where the show was held had a sun filled entry way. I was greeted by members of the guild and gifted with a small handmade quilt that had an embroidered umbrella and a color brochure. The theme of the show was "It Takes a Village". They were selling raffle tickets for baskets of goodies and one prize was a smoker. I had to try and win that for my BBQ-ing, loving husband.



The show had several categories, general, art quilts and "It Takes a Village". There were about 200 quilts total. I started with the general quilts. I was surprised by the use of traditional blocks but made with the vibrant ethnic and African fabrics. There were several T-shirt quilts in this category and they all had a story to tell about a child, a grandchild or their own personal journey. One of my favorite patterns in this group was the African Queen. A couple of the quilters who used this pattern really expanded on the design so that there was a second and third vibrant movement to the quilt and you had to really look to see that the African Queen was there.

In the art quilt category there were some large, colorful portrait quilts. There was a Diana Ross portrait and personal portraits of children celebrating milestones like graduations or weddings. These portrait quilts had the feel and look of Ramsess. He is an artist, self-taught who works in all sorts of mediums including cloth. If you get a chance, check out his website for a visual idea of the color and storytelling quality of his quilts. He also had a quilt in the show and a vendor booth selling quilts, and cards and calendars with a variety of his art work. There was even a 3D quilt in this section where you had to put on those goofy glasses, and when you did the fishes and aquamarine life pieces on the quilt seemed to swim across the quilt.

"It Takes a Village" section had the most prominent storytelling quality. There was a lot of neon color and texture to these quilts using embellishment and trapunto. They also had a section of a real village. Members who participated made miniature quilted 3D houses. My favorite was one that had the roof removed and when you peeked inside it was a tiny sewing studio, amazing!

As I made my way through the show a live jazz band started playing and so of course I made another pass through to take a closer look at quilts that had intrigued me and to listen to the music for a bit. The music gave the show an enchanted quality.

It was a really nice show and a great way to spend a couple of hours observing this art medium that I enjoy so much. The only bummer was, I did not win the smoker for my hubby.

I hope you all had a lovely Thanksgiving and are getting ready for our annual Holiday Tea. Please RSVP if you have not already and I will send out another email blast with parking instructions and potluck information.

Thanks again to all of you, our members, who make our Westside Quilters such a charitable and enjoyable group to work, learn and guilt with.

Thread Sketching: Still Life with Three Fruits

Learn how to add highlights and shadows, and blend colors using thread sketching to create a realistic still life. Students learn how to:

- cut pieces from fusible adhesive and fuse them to the background
- stabilize the fabric surface
- choose the right threads and needles for thread sketching
- · adjust tension for the correct stitch
- add color, highlights and shadows using thread
- quilting considerations

About Susan: "Quilting started as a hobby, but turned into a passion and a business. I now teach nationally and internationally, host "Quilting Arts TV," and have produced



numerous patterns, two books, and five video workshops. Creating fiber art is my consuming passion. I am an artist who works in fabric and thread. I find great joy in creating works that draw people closer and invite them to savor color, texture and form.

The art I create is my way of celebrating and documenting the deep mysteries of the world that are to be experienced only by close inspection of the miraculous details of nature. While my core materials — cloth and thread — are those used in traditional quilting, I often employ substances such as fabric paints and dves. Tyvek. Angelina fibers, and water-soluble wax pastels, to transform the cloth. Nearly all of my work is realistic in style, and starts with original photographs of the subjects. I use two primary techniques – wholecloth painting, and fused appliqué – then heavily free-motion thread sketch the surface before quilting.

She melted into tears and asked my name saying I had no idea what a difference this made. It was a humbling experience and one that left me a bit tearful as I drove home thinking how hard some people—especially older ones—are having these days. In the scheme of things, taking the time to chat a minute, to shake her hand, and to share a few dollars is definitely a mere drop in the ocean, but it mattered.

In this season of thankfulness and holiday celebrations, I must keep her face in my memory bank as I paddle along and have an eye out for

opportunities to pay it forward, which in itself pays off so handsomely in the feeling that comes from the joy of sharing.

Sally & Roberta's Excellent Adventure Volume II

Roberta Walley and I were off on another great adventure in early November - this time to Houston, Texas for International Quilt Festival! Even with the horrible damage from this summer's hurricane downtown Houston was definitely open for business for Festival, the George R. Brown Convention Center with a newly remodeled entrance facade, a spanking new Marriott Hotel and lots of new restaurants and entertainment. I had been twice before, but this was Roberta's first experience at Festival and I think it is safe to say she was bowled over by the sheer scope and size. It is the largest guilt extravaganza in the US with well over 1000 quilts on display (2 of them were mine!), over 1100 vendor booths, a multitude of lectures. classes and special exhibitions. The Festival drew somewhere around 55,000 visitors from 35 countries over the 4 days. Art quilts, traditional quilts, modern quilts were all on display including exhibits which addressed themes of identity and activism, a display of pieces celebrating women and their accomplishments, and guilts telling stories of heroes from the Civil Rights movement. I was especially thrilled to see the 2017 Cherrywood Van Gogh Challenge guilts - 140 of them all together forming an impressive wall of color and design. A special exhibit of the work of Taiwanese artist Danny Amazonas was incredibly impressive. For traditionalist there was a lovingly mounted exhibit of the work of the late Sue Garman. Roberta took a class on Saturday making a sashiko embroidered silk vest and I'm looking forward to seeing her model it at a future WQ event. Shopping opportunities were irresistible! We both purchased fabric, tools, books, and some amazingly beautiful hand stitched Indian silk sari scarves. Stand for long enough on the show floor and you will no doubt run into some guilter or artist you know... Sherry Kleinman, Patt Blair, Maria Shell, Laura Wasilowski, Pam Holland, and two of our fellow travelers from our Japan tour last winter all were there! We especially enjoyed a dinner at The Grove Restaurant organized by Maria Shell with Sherry and her daughter Brit visiting from New York and meeting some SAQA members from around the country.

We basked in luxury at The Four Seasons Hotel just across the Park from the Convention Center and sat in the bar - as the only Dodger fans - watching the local Astros win the World Series. The Saturday afternoon victory parade was downtown near the Convention Center, tying up traffic for hours, but it was great seeing the enthusiasm for the local team in tough times for the Houston area. The only flaw in our trip, a little tumble on the sidewalk which kept me and my knee under ice packs for a day and a half. I can only say if you have to be crippled and in bed at a hotel, the Four Seasons is a lovely place to do it. I also experienced my first airport wheelchair ride!

The knee is healing and I'm certainly ready to go back to Festival any time!

Thread Sketching: Still Life with Three Fruits

a workshop with Susan Brubaker Knapp

Expand your machine free-motion skills while creating this thread-sketched and quilted still life. Students learn how to:

- fuse down the applique pieces
- create shading, dimension and texture with thread
- gain control and confidence when free-motion stitching
- stabilize the fabric surface
- choose the right threads and needles for thread painting
- correct tension problems
- layer with batting and free-motion quilt

SUPPLIES to bring:

- Two sheets or 1/4 yard Lite Steam-a-Seam 2 or Pellon Wonder Under
- Two pieces 12 x 12" very firm/non-stretchy interfacing, to be used as a stabilizer. Examples include Pellon 910, heavy weight Shaping Aid, or Pellon 806 Stitch-N-Tear. If it stretches at all, it will not work.
- FABRIC NOTE: I like to use batik because it is a bit heavier and it has a very tight weave, which provides more stability and prevents fraying. Stay away from light-weight fabric.
- Light tan/gray fabric for background, 11 x 7"
- Medium tan/gray for background, 11 x 4" (not too dark or it will show through the lighter fruit fabrics and shadows will not show up!)
- Medium red fabric for apple, 6" square
- Yellow fabric for lemon, 6" square
- White fabric for backing lemon, 6" square
- Light green fabric for pear, 6" square
- Cotton embroidery-weight (50 or 60 weight) thread in black, white, light tan, dark brown, dark purple, dark red, red-orange, dark orange, light orange, yellow, yellow-green, medium green and dark green (see photo). Examples include Aurifil Cotton Mako 50 wt., Mettler No. 60 fine embroidery cotton merc., or YLI Soft Touch. Note: 100% cotton thread makes it easier to adjust tension for threadsketching.
- Low-loft cotton batting, 12" square
- 12" square backing fabric
- paper scissors (sharp)
- fabric scissors (sharp)
- seam ripper
- sharp pencil (mechanical works best)
- white chalk pencil (mechanical ones by Bohin or





Sewline work best)

- straight pins (quilting pins)
- light and/or reading glasses, if you need them
- Sewing machine must be in good working order, able to drop feed dogs, and have a freemotion or darning/embroidery foot.
- manual for your machine
- three empty bobbins
- Universal or Microtex needles, 80/12 or 70/10
- extended surface for your sewing machine (if you have one; highly recommended)

Calls for entry

Continuing our notifications for ways to display your quilts and textile pieces to a wider audience... Entering shows is not difficult, but to begin here are a few guidelines:

- Always make sure you read everything in the call including the calendar, requirements, rules, etc. Especially the rules! This will save headaches and disappointment later on.
- Keep a record on your entries so you won't be caught with a quilt needing to go two places at once. Having to remove a quilt from a show or exhibit because you misread the exhibition dates is a no-no. Ask me how I know...
- Having a great photo of your quilt straight on, in focus, not on a bed or held up showing hands and feet, super important. There is lots of great info on quilt photography on line. Google!
- Don't be intimidated or depressed by a rejection! There are lots of different reasons why a quilt doesn't fit into a specific show. It is usually not because your quilt is bad!



Westside Quilters General Meeting Minutes October 21, 2017

<u>President:</u> Kim Ryan opened Westside Quilters (WQ) August general meeting by welcoming guests and new members.

The minutes of the August 5, 2017 quarterly meeting had been circulated to WQ Board members via e-mail, and to the membership in WQ's Newsletter. Sally Wright moved to accept those minutes. The motion was seconded and passed on a voice vote.

Kim will be sending out an e-mail to members inviting them to WQ's Holiday Tea on Sunday, December 3rd.

<u>Treasurer</u>: Karynn's report, showing a September 30th balance of \$9,438.42, had been published in WQ's October Newsletter. Sally Wright moved to accept the Report to be accepted by the Guild. That motion was seconded and passed by voice vote.

<u>Membership</u>: Luann announced that WQ's membership stands at 79. She is in the process of contacting those who have indicated they would like to join a mini-group and will help them to organize it and get started.

Philanthropy: Perla, Lisa and Virginia noted that quilts, baby hats and receiving blankets are being collected for Upward Bound and for A Child's Dream.
