### **History or Fabrication**

There will be a Pop-up speaker at our Friday, February 4, Sew-In at 11:00 A.M. -12:00 A.M. <u>Anthony</u> <u>Cohen, from the Buttonwood Farms</u>, a living history center depicting 19<sup>th</sup> Century plantation life. The farm is 40 acres located inside Seneca Creek State Park in Germantown, Maryland. While we can't go there, it's closed until Spring, saving air fare and packing time, this armchair trip should be enlightening. As history changes old terminologies to reflect greater cultural awareness.

There are new structures when you visit Mount Vernon, home of George Washington. New signage at Thomas Jefferson's Monticello home in Virginia. Highlighted hiding places for fugitives in historic homes in Odessa, Maryland and Connecticut. Safe homes were spaced 12 hours apart, the time it would take an able -bodied man to walk from one house to another at night. New verbiage is trying to restore dignity to those people unheard or unseen in the past. We were taught insufficient history in high school and probably in college, too.

In keeping with our mission statement, one of our goals is education and exchange of ideas. Our quarterly meeting, speaker Saturday, February 5, 2022, Jan Doyle will present a program entitled, <u>Quilts and the Underground Railroad: Fact or Fiction.</u> She will link quilt block names to their background history and meaning.

Veteran WQ members will remember Don Beld's talk about Civil War quilts. Those quilts were predominantly made in Maine and Massachusetts. This will be more about sending messages, not just being a comfort in the cold.

If you are still interested in learning more on your own, there are YouTube speakers available. One that dispelled many myths for me was Regina Abernathy, Historian and novice quilter, Knowledge Exchange from Lakeland Community College.

# Featured WQ Member:

### Nancy Kawahara Member since 2018

### When did you start quilting? Why?

In anticipation of my retirement, I started taking quilting classes from Susanne Cole at Sewing Arts Center in January 2016. Before that, my sewing was limited to making Halloween costumes for our 3 kids once a year. I love the

idea of making things, like quilts, that people need and will use.

### What types do you make?

There's so much to learn! I'm amazed at the many ways quilts are made and I'm still in the exploration phase (maybe I'll always be in this phase). I've really enjoyed hand stitching, like appliqué and hand quilting. I've kept a journal of all the quilts I've made, noting the fabric, design, stitching, etc. and the recipient. So far, I've made over 70 quilts and I try something new in each project.

### Why did you join Westside Quilters?

I joined sometime in 2018 to meet other quilters. One of the first people I met was Luann Jaffe, who it turns out has been a neighbor of ours since we moved into our neighborhood 35 years ago! She and others have been a great encouragement to me and it's been fun to share in the excitement of trying a new pattern, notion, or technique. I joined the WQ board in 2019 as Philanthropy Co-Chair and it has been amazing to see how generous WQ members are in making philanthropy quilts and see how happy the organizations are to receive them. During COVID, I've been especially impressed how WQ members have found ways to help those who are less fortunate. I'd recommend serving on the WQ board to get to know other members better and keep WQ strong. I know it has helped me during COVID to connect with others in different ways.

### Who are your favorite teachers and lecturers?

Of course, I am indebted to Susanne for teaching me all the basic quilting skills and, over the years, encouraging me to try new projects

and helping me when I get stuck. In one of her "mystery quilt" classes, we made one of her original quilt patterns with over 1,600 pieces, including many, many tiny 1-inch squares. It did turn out well and I'll treasure it forever, but never again!

I also love Carolyn Friedlander's amazing patterns and fabric. I especially love her original appliqué quilts and have made several of them.

### Where does your inspiration come from?

I love looking at old quilts from museum collections and books and learning about quilts from different parts of the U.S. and the world. I have books featuring quilts from the 1600's to1800's, Gee's Bend, the Amish, Hawaii, Japan, and India. I look through these books for inspiration and marvel at the beauty and craftsmanship of these quilts. I made a goldfish block from a wedding album quilt from the 1800's just for fun. Maybe one day I'll make more blocks and the quilt.

### Tell us your favorite quilt story about receiving or giving a quilt.

My interest in quilting also came from a quilt I was gifted when I was going through chemotherapy for breast cancer in 2006. A friend from church made a quilt for me during that time and I'll never forget the love and support I felt when I opened the package and ran my fingers over the patchwork and stitching. What an incredible comfort! I'm sure you'll agree, quilts are magical.

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# Calls for Entry January 2022

So happy to say the quilt shows and exhibits are slowly coming back to life even with the Omicron variant threat. Right now, as always, before sending off your entry to any show, double check to make sure that the event is actually taking place. There are a several deadlines coming up this Spring. Notably, Quilt Festival Houston and Quilt Festival Long Beach both have opportunities with upcoming deadlines. See below. Hopefully as 2022 progresses there will be more opportunities. Watch this space!

Here are some suggestions for quilt entry photography from International Quilt Festival. <u>PHOTOGRAPHING YOUR QUILT FOR SUBMISSION</u>

Continuing our notifications for ways to display your quilts and textile pieces to a wider audience... Entering shows is not difficult, but to begin here are a few guidelines:

- Always make sure you read everything in the call including the calendar, requirements, rules, etc. Especially the rules! Will save headaches and disappointment later on.
- Keep a record on your entries so you won't be caught with a quilt needing to go two places at once. Having to remove a quilt from a show or exhibit because you misread the exhibition dates is a no-no. Ask me how I know...
- Having a great photo of your quilt straight on, in focus, not on a bed or held up showing hands and feet, super important. There is lots of great info on quilt photography on line. Google!
- Don't be intimidated or depressed by a rejection! There are lots of different reasons why a quilt doesn't fit into a specific show. It is usually not because your quilt is bad!
