

Since early childhood, she has been instilled with the desire for and love of doing something with your hands, learned by observing the varied and beautiful items crafted by both of her grandmothers. Let Meg Cox, who serves on the board of advisors for the International Quilt Museum in Lincoln, Nebraska, open the vaults and reveal the treasures of this astounding place. Her PowerPoint lecture will show you masterpiece quilts, introduce you to curators and break down the steps in mounting an exhibition. IQM boasts a broad and unique collection of American quilts, including the red and white quilts that dazzled the quilt world when hung in Manhattan's Park Avenue Armory in 2011. But it has also collected quilts from more than 55 countries. Meg created this presentation to benefit the museum she loves, so she charges less than normal for this talk and donates every penny to the IQM. To make it even more fun, the museum will donate a fun door prize from its museum store to your guild.

Meg Cox Bio

Author and quilter Meg Cox is a sought-after speaker and teacher at guilds and museums and a staff writer for Quiltfolk magazine. Her journalism has been published by dozens of national magazines and the Wall Street Journal, where she was a staff reporter for 17 years. A past president of the national nonprofit Quilt Alliance, Cox serves on the advisory board of the International Quilt Museum in Lincoln, Nebraska. She writes a popular free monthly newsletter called Quilt Journalist Tells All! and wrote a bestselling resource guide, The Quilter's Catalog (Workman Publishing). Are you up for a new experience and technique?

Lauretta Crites will be teaching us Quilt Coloring. Did you know that you could color your quilts? Learn techniques for using colored pencils to make beautiful, washable quilts. Allow your inner child to rediscover the joy of effortless creating. The Program Committee has selected Sunflowers as the project. A way of shepherding Springtime.

Covid-19 restrictions have demanded that we alter this workshop to a Zoom format. Your kit for this project will contain preprinted image on fabric, a special box of colored pencils, and printed sheet of instructions. Later if you want, you can add liquid medium to your quilt. Instructions will be included. Postal restrictions will not allow us to mail any liquid.



How do I get my kit? First, you need to register for the class using the form on the Westside Quilters webpage. Timing is everything.

<u>Sign up by February 19th</u>. That will give us time to pick up kits and either mail or deliver them to you. Pick up at my house will also be available.

I hope you realize that your Program Committee signs instructors up 2 years in advance, as we did with Lauretta. This sounded like a fun day.

Lauretta Crites is an award-winning quilter with a rich textile history. "When we are busy doing what we love, who cares what everyone else is doing?"

"Did you know you can color your quilts? Of all the supplies available for art quilts by far my favorite and the easiest to use is

pencil colors. More precise than crayons, easier to control and blend than inks and paints. Add that they are inexpensive and with the application of "magic elixir" permanent on fabric, what's not to love! Come have the fun of reacquainting yourself with the joys of simple coloring. If you have learned to "color INSIDE the lines" you already have all the skills you need to launch right in and start creating!"

Calls for Entry February 2021

As we have learned recently most shows and exhibits this Fall and Winter have either been cancelled, postponed or have gone virtual. The virtual version of QuiltCon has announced its finalists for February. But international Quilt Festival is planning an in person show in Fall 2021 and their calls are below. However, before sending off your entry to any show, double check to make sure that the event is actually taking place. There are a few deadlines coming up soon and some listed below to get ready for next Spring and Fall. Hopefully as 2021 progresses there will be more opportunities. Watch this space!

Here are some suggestions for quilt entry photography from International Quilt Festival. PHOTOGRAPHING YOUR QUILT FOR SUBMISSION

Continuing our notifications for ways to display your quilts and textile pieces to a wider audience... Entering shows is not difficult, but to begin here are a few guidelines:

- Always make sure you read everything in the call including the calendar, requirements, rules, etc. Especially the rules! Will save headaches and disappointment later on.
- Keep a record on your entries so you won't be caught with a quilt needing to go two places at once. Having to remove a quilt from a show or exhibit because you misread the exhibition dates is a no-no. Ask me how I know...
- Having a great photo of your quilt straight on, in focus, not on a bed or held up showing hands and feet, super important. There is lots of great info on quilt photography on line. Google!
- Don't be intimidated or depressed by a rejection! There are lots of different reasons why a quilt doesn't fit into a specific show. It is usually not because your quilt is bad!

Hands All Around

Artists from all around the world incorporate influences from their own cultures into the design and technique of their quilts. This prestigious, long-running international showcase will include recent quilts by international artists who create works inspired by such.

- Limit two (2) entries per person.
- Each work must measure a minimum of 36" on each side.
- The guilt can be NO LONGER than 96" ON A SIDE.
- There is a \$20 submission fee per quilt.
- The works must be made between 2017 and 2021.
- Entry Deadline May 21, 2021

In Full Bloom

Just as quilters create beautiful pieces of art with fabric, florists and gardeners cultivate works of beauty from the soil. The International Quilt Festival will showcase floral quilts from across the spectrum in color and splendor in the special exhibit. This exhibit will premiere at the International Quilt Market and Festival/Houston, October 28 thru 31 – 2021. We would also like to retain quilts for a possible exhibit at International Quilt Festivals in 2022.

- Limit two (2) entries per person.
- Each work must measure a minimum of 36" on each side.
- The quilt can be NO LONGER than 96" ON A SIDE.
- There is a \$20 submission fee per quilt.
- The works must be made between 2017 and 2021.
- Entry Deadline May 21, 2021

In The American Tradition

Contemporary quiltmakers often look to the art form's rich tradition for inspiration in their own works. This exhibit features recently-made quilts that incorporate traditional blocks, styles, and/or techniques.

- Limit three (3) entries per person.
- Each work must measure a minimum of 36" on each side.
- The guilt can be NO LONGER than 96" ON A SIDE.
- There is a \$20 submission fee per quilt.
- There is no made by date.
- Entry Deadline May 21, 2021

Landscape Quilts

From valleys and volcanoes, and mountains to monuments, landscapes often inspire artists, including many in the quilt world. We invite you to submit your recently made landscape quilts to be featured in this exhibit.

Limit two (2) entries per person.

- Each work must measure a minimum of 36" on each side.
- The quilt can be NO LONGER than 96" ON A SIDE.
- There is a \$20 submission fee per quilt.
- Entry Deadline May 7, 2021

Tactile Architecture

Buildings have a long history of inspiring the creative designs of quiltmakers. In the 19th century, American quilters developed classic architectural patterns such as Log Cabin, Schoolhouse, and Brick Wall. This annual juried exhibit challenges quiltmakers to create works based on architectural themes and inspirations.

- Limit two (2) entries per person.
- Each work must measure a minimum of 36" on each side.
- The guilt can be NO LONGER than 96" ON A SIDE.
- There is a \$20 submission fee per quilt.
- The works must be made between 2017 and 2021.
- Entry Deadline May 7, 2021

Other entries coming up:

Sacred Threads 2021 has announced that the 2021 exhibit will be postponed until July of 2022. The Call for Entry for 2022 will open in the Fall of 2021.

A Better World: envisioning the future (IQF Houston, TX)

Entry Deadline Spring 2021

#### WHO ARE YOUR MONSTERS?

The art teacher leaned too far over my desk and erased the pencil outline of the desk that I had attempted. She drew the desk in perspective view as she had asked me to do and said, "That's how it's supposed to be drawn". She turned her back on me and walked away. I felt small and stupid that day in 8th grade, and I've never drawn since.

Have you had an experience that has blocked your creativity? Unfortunately, it's all too common. Even messages from childhood long ago can still be crippling as an adult. So, will we continue to be bound by the fears of the past or will we break out and choose to open our hearts to creativity?

What techniques have you seen but been afraid to try? Paper piecing looked much too complicated for me, even after watching lots of videos online. I had to take several classes to learn how to do the flip and sew method. Even for a new quilt today, I still have to make a couple of practice blocks to learn how to sew from the back side. But I have the completed quilts to prove that I've mastered this skill.

I rejoined Craftsy for the quilting videos and found out that there were drawing classes included in my membership. Now it's time for me to face this monster fear and add drawing to my box of tools for quilting.



### Featured WQ Member:

Sally Wright member since 2010

When did you start quilting? Why?

Around 1997 I would watch HGTV while I got dressed in the morning to go to work. The show that came on at 8:30 was Simply Quilts with Alex Anderson. The more I watched, the more I felt ashamed that although I owned a sewing machine and had always been a crafter - knitter- embroiderer, etc., I had never made a quilt. Alex made it seem doable... so I went out and bought a few books and started a quilt for our 7 year old son's bed.



I think of myself as primarily an art quilter, but sometimes and especially now with the pandemic I lose my creative mojo and just like to sew following a pattern.

How often do you quilt? What time of day?

I try to do something every day, maybe just an hour at a time. Mostly during the day. Too tired after a glass of wine dinner!

Why did you join Westside Quilters?

Well, actually I am one of the founders of WQ. Back in 2009 Tina Nord and I started ruminating on starting another guild - one that was more focused on education and personal development without the burden of producing a quilt show. In 2010 we had our first organizational meeting.

Who are your favorite teachers and lecturers?

My landmark teachers - those who really shaped my work - Diane Gaudynski (free motion quilting), Susan Carlson and Lenore Crawford (taking a photo and

interpreting it in fabric), Susan Brubaker Knapp for textile painting and Becky McClure from Sewing Arts who taught my first quilting class. For a lecturer I love Jane Dunnewold's approach to creativity and her lessons on quilt design concepts and surface design.

What are your favorite workshops or conventions in the past?

I love heading out to Ontario for a few days at Road to California and have really enjoyed two visits to Quilt Festival in Houston, but most of all those magical weeks of inspiration and natural beauty at Empty Spools Seminars at Asilomar.

Where does your inspiration come from?

From the natural world - a lot from our garden - and my varied interests. My art quilt subjects have been influenced by the decorative arts, archaeology, cooking, travel...

Tell us your favorite quilt story about receiving or giving a quilt Can't think of one... but my favorite quilt story in general:

It's the first day of a five day class at Asilomar with teacher Melissa Sobotka (remember that fabulous Best of Show quilt of hers at Road a few years ago! The one with the amazingly realistic Turkish textiles?) I am in total awe of her. She is doing her introductory slide show and showing quilts illustrating various points and puts one up illustrating a good use of color. It looks familiar, but I'm tired having driven up to Monterey that day and it doesn't register. Roberta turns to me, nudges and says "That's yours!". Melissa was embarrassed because she had been using it in her lectures uncredited, I was terrifically flattered and Roberta just laughed at the coincidence.


I thought this would be a cute Valentine's addition to a card.

#### You will need

- 3- (4" x 4") squares of fabric, they can match or be complimentary.
- 2- (4"x 4") squares of interfacing, fusible or glue it on
- Cut one square of interfacing in half, diagonally
- 2. Apply interfacing to the wrong side of the fabric triangle
- 3. Iron the square so that you have a fabric sandwich with the interfacing in the middle
- 4. Iron interfacing to the wrong side of the fabric you have chosen to be the back of the marker
- 5. Layer your fabric pieces, see photo
- 6. Bottom layer: interfaced fabric right side up, triangle in the middle, open corner facing top, interfaced square right side down.
- 7. Pin, leaving opening on side with only two fabrics
- 8. Sew ¼" seam. Trim corners, turn, poke out corners, topstitch
