<u>Mike "Mac" McNamara</u> joins us for a workshop on "Techniques: A Day of Making Fabric". Mike says "I have learned many techniques and presumptions about quilt-making from various teachers: Nancy Crow, Sylvia Einstein, Rhoda Cohen to name a few. I put my own spin (read: shortcuts) on what I've learned and I have a lot to show people. Students should look to add new tools to their toolbelts; along with having a sense of fun."

#### Biography

First of all, I go by "Mac." I grew up in New England. My many influences come from seashore life, the White Mountains of New Hampshire, ice storms, floating in the Atlantic, and living in Jamaica Plain - a lovely crazy quilted section of Boston. I also enjoyed the famous autumnal foliage, especially since I know my trees - my favorite is the tulip tree, Liriodendron tulipifera. And who can't but be influenced by people in our lives: my mom's mother was a state senator; my mom's father was a vaudevillian. My dad's mother was a creative person in the Arts & Crafts Movement: she painted, and she crafted jewelry and furniture. My folks were also creative. I developed blue-collar humor while working at my dad's tire company. His slogan was, "Invite Us to Your Next Blowout!" In college, my English degree gave me a love of the metaphor, symbolic irony, the zeugma, and other writing tools that I translate into imagery, visual puns, ironic humor, and other poetic expressions. My second degree is in Art History and it gave me the appreciation for iconic imagery, signs and signets that represent an emotion, a person, or a place, a person, or an emotion - for example, an anvil can be read as hard-hearted; a set of teeth can signify St. Appolonia; or an oak tree can mean Connecticut.

I made my first quilt in 1976. Later in Boston, I worked on the NAMES Project - an ongoing memorial of sewn panels for people who have died of AIDS. I made many panels for friends and loved ones, along with helping other folks make panels for their loved ones. I joined a small quilt group which was true influence on my quilt-making. I later joined the local quilt guild, and am still a long-standing member of the Quilters' Connection in Watertown, MA. I moved to California and am a member of the Pajaro Valley Quilters' Association of Santa Cruz, CA.



Other quilt-making influences come from my friends and associates and certainly other teachers, such as: the incredible Rhoda Cohen, Ann Schroeder, Sylvia Einstein, Nancy Crow, Nancy Halpern, Nancy Crasco, Sandy Donabed, Tafi Brown, Paula Nadelstern, Tracey Brookshier, Susan Else, Billie Street, and the inimitable Joe Cunningham.

I like to re-invent blocks or give them a new setting, such as Double Wedding Ring, Sunbonnet Sue, Pickle Dish, Drunkard's Path, Broken Dishes, Sunrays, to name a few. I don't care as much about color as I do value - I like the idea of the eye flickering as it goes across the plain of the quilt.

I think I have created a successful quilt if someone says, "Hey, that looks like some kids made that."

#### Artist Statement

I love working on puzzles: crosswords, acrostics, cryptograms, and other teasers that challenge the mind. This sense of solving problems also extends to family, community, and the world at large. In my community, I help to make sure that those in need of quilts get them: flood victims, veterans, children, women's shelters, etc. I also donate quilts for fund-raising groups: my guilds, schools, San Francisco's Gay Men's Chorus, to name a few.

Quilt-making gives me that outlet to make poetic statements. Sometimes it's simply a way to provoke a question, such as: "Why is that pig in that quilt?" and the response is: "I date my quilts by the year of the Asian animal - made in the Year of the Pig." I may include other literary elements: puns, metaphors, riddles, personal history, rebuses, and plain ole jokes - do you know the joke about the three-legged pig? Ask me.

I also make rugs using the twining method. And I make tin people out of recycled cans, lids, wire: any tinware! On weekends I run a tasting room at a winery in Capitola, CA.

Back to quilt-making - sometimes I like using the block design. Sometime I layer fabric, and just cut out the block and mix the layers to recreate the blocks - no measuring. I also like to reinterpret a common block, such as Double Wedding Ring, Lone Star, Sunbonnet Sue, Pickle Dish, Broken Dishes, etc. People often ask me where do I get my fabric? My response: "It comes to me." And finally, I feel as though I've made a successful quilt if it makes people laugh, or if it makes people say, "Hey, that looks like kids made that quilt." I love kid art.

- Sewing machine with accoutrements
- Normal sewing supplies
- Large cutting mat and rotary cutter
- Large and small rulers

**Fabric:** fat quarters and half yards. Lots. Bring in fabric you like to sew. Don't bring in your worst stuff to get rid of in a class, but do challenge yourself with fabric you like, but don't usually use. A piece of ugly fabric any size - there will be a contest!

Please bring in a Show & Tell piece - not mandatory, just to share - any size, in any stage of sewing, not necessarily a quilt if you have something to share in another art form.

Design walls if there is room - a piece of flannel or foam core

#### <u>Bio</u>

I have been quilting for 20+ years. I retired from working in the medical field 4 years ago and am now working fulltime doing what I love. Once I made my first quilt I was hooked. Teaching is my passion and therapy.

I love my beginning quilting classes. It is always so amazing to me helping new quilters picking fabrics and seeing the finished results. Fabrics I would never pick myself, but I have yet to see a finished quilt I didn't like. Just like me after my first quilt, the majority of students get hooked and want to make more.

Of course, there are the few who just need a quilt for the new baby in the family or a kid graduating. Having done it for 15 years I am constantly trying new techniques and making my own patterns. I have done piecing, applique (both machine and hand stitched), embroidery, sashiko, pillows and bags. Lately I have been doing paper piecing (both foundation and English paper piecing), as well as tiny piecing. My favorite thing, though, is Free motion longarm quilting and recently mastered programmed longarm quilting.

### **Craft In America: Quilts**

If you are like me, you have watched many episodes of the award winning PBS series Craft In America. Of course, some of my favorite episodes were those that featured quilters such as Faith Ringgold, Joe Cunningham, and the quilters of Gees Bend. On December 27, 2019, a new episode of this program premiered: "Craft In America – Quilts". The **Glendale Quilt Guild** will present a quilt show at the Glendale Civic Auditorium on March 28/29, 2020. The show will include a special exhibit, **The Thread of the Story**, quilts with narratives. The stories of these quilts will have particular historical/cultural/social significance for the families who treasure them. We want to exhibit quilts that illustrate a historical event or journey or pilgrimage or celebration or natural wonder, as examples. If your family has a story quilt and you are willing to exhibit the quilt and its story, please contact **Hester Bell** by email or phone **(hbell@rsabg.org or 626-794-1790)**. Please be prepared to send dimensions and a photo or photos of your quilt along with a brief summary of the quilt's story. Quilts will be exhibited in a secure, air-conditioned facility. There is no submission fee to exhibit story quilts. Glendale Quilt Guild will not pay to exhibit a quilt. All decisions about inclusion of a quilt in this exhibit will be made by Hester Bell (exhibit organizer) and Rasa Read (quilt show chairwoman).

Here are some suggestions for quilt entry photography from International Quilt Festival. <u>PHOTOGRAPHING YOUR QUILT FOR SUBMISSION</u>

Continuing our notifications for ways to display your quilts and textile pieces to a wider audience... Entering shows is not difficult, but to begin here are a few guidelines:

- Always make sure you read everything in the call including the calendar, requirements, rules, etc. Especially the rules! Will save headaches and disappointment later on.
- Keep a record on your entries so you won't be caught with a quilt needing to go two places at once. Having to remove a quilt from a show or exhibit because you misread the exhibition dates is a no-no. Ask me how I know...
- Having a great photo of your quilt straight on, in focus, not on a bed or held up showing hands and feet, super important. There is lots of great info on quilt photography on line. Google!
- Don't be intimidated or depressed by a rejection! There are lots of different reasons why a quilt doesn't fit into a specific show. It is usually not because your quilt is bad!

#### MOVIES AND MUSICALS: HOORAY FOR HOLLYWOOD!

Hollywood's rich artistic history has inspired moviegoers and fed their fantasies ever since the Silent Era. And everyone seems to have their own list of favorite films, actors, actresses, and directors. Quilts submitted for this exhibit should be inspired by those celluloid dreams – and the people who helped make them come to life across the decades.

#### **ART DECO INSPIRED QUILTS**

#### Registration will open early Spring 2020

Inspired by geometric designs, streamlined forms, and sometimes offbeat colors, the Art Deco movement was stylish, influential, and omnipresent from 1925 through the 1940s. Art Deco was reflected in paintings, crafts, fine arts, and even architecture. Quilts submitted for this exhibit should be inspired by this much-loved style.

#### ART NOUVEAU - CRAFT AS ART

#### Registration will open early Spring 2020

From the 1880s until World War I, western Europe and the United States witnessed the development and ascent of the Art Nouveau style. Taking inspiration from the unruly aspects of the natural world, Art Nouveau influenced art and architecture, the applied arts, graphic work, and illustration. Some of its best-known practitioners include Toulouse-Lautrec, Tiffany & Company, Alphonse Mucha, and William Morris. Quilts submitted for this exhibit should reflect Art Nouveau themes and style.

#### BEST OF THE WEST COAST GUILDS: AWARD-WINNING TRADITIONAL QUILTS

Registration will open early Spring 2020

The west coast of the United States is home to scores of guilds and groups where members meet to share friendship, experiences, and create new quilts. This exhibit features some of the best traditional work done by quilters of all styles – appliquéd, pieced, wholecloth – and skill levels. Entrants should have previously won an award in a guild competition/show. Quilts submitted for this exhibit should have been completed in the past five years or less. \*WQ does not sponsor a quilt show, but a lot of you belong to a number of guilds that do\*

#### **QUILTING AS THERAPY**

#### Registration will open early Spring 2020

Art Therapy uses the creative process – and works of art created during a patient's therapy – to help those in treatment develop self-awareness, explore emotions, address unresolved emotional conflicts, improve social skills, and raise self-esteem. Quilts submitted for this exhibit should stem from the quilter's own therapeutic journey or practices in their own lives.

## Editor's Note: Happy New Year

The most unusual item that I have ever seen that is completely constructed using fabric and sewn is now on display at LACMA, a complete life size apartment made out of organza! Yes, polyester organza!!! It's a "do not touch" exhibit, but you do get to walk through it. It's constructed with beautiful flat-fell seams, french seams, free motion stitching, and the detailed embroidery of the electric boxes is unbelievable!!!

I had never heard of the artist: Do Ho Suh before my recent visit to LACMA. A wall placard tells his story: Do Ho Suh: 348 West 22<sup>nd</sup> Street

"Do Ho Suh (South Korea, b. 1962) is best known for his full-size fabric reconstruction of places he has lived, which function as physical manifestations of memory. Through reproductions of his homes in Seoul, Berlin, Providence, London, and New York, Suh explores how personal history, cultural traditions, and belief systems are connected to the architecture of domestic space.

In 348 West 22<sup>nd</sup> Street (2011-15), Suh replicates his ground-floor residence in New York. Visitors are invited to experience an ephemeral representation of the artist's daily life by walking through the immersive collection of conjoined rooms. Suh creates the dreamlike spaces with swaths of translucent polyester, which are held up by stainless steel. The corridor, stairs, apartment, and studio are each rendered in a single block of color, with fixtures and appliances recreated in exacting detail. Fusing traditional Korean sewing techniques with digital modeling tools, Suh balances intricate with monumentality.

Suh moved to the United States in 1991 and currently lives between London, Seoul, and New York. Inspired by his own history of migration, Suh's ethereal and malleable architecture presents a world both deeply familiar and profoundly estranged."
