### PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

#### A Colorful World

Color - it's the thing quilters love, but many of us also feel that we don't really know how to use well. Should we make a quilt with just a few colors or just two or go wild? Is there a color you always seem to use (mine is blue) or one that rarely shows up in your quilts (orange for me)? Is it better to use fabric from a



single collection so they work well together or find a focus fabric and use it for color inspiration? Or just look in your stash for ideas? All are good ways to start - just keep looking at and playing with the fabric, keep an open mind and see what looks good together. There are many books about quilts and color; one that is recommended by many quilters and I like is <u>Color Play</u> by Joen Wolfrom.

Last year I watched a Quiltfolk workshop about the quilts of Wales and recently finished the top demonstrated during the workshop. Recently there has been research connecting quilts from Wales with Amish quilts. It seems that the Amish might have been influenced by neighbors who immigrated from Wales. Amish quilts are more contained and not as scrappy, but there is a definite resemblance.

A book about this connection is <u>Making Welsh Quilts: the Textile Tradition that Inspired the Amish?</u> by Mary Jenkins and Clare Claridge. I've included a photo of my quilt top where I used color in a fun way to illustrate the idea.

A new book just published is by the master of color, Kaffe Fassett. <u>Kaffe Fassett's Timeless Themes</u> is a collection of 23 of his past quilts redone in new fabrics and colors. An inspiration to browse through.

### Supply list:

- Embroidery needles in a variety of sizes with needle threader, if needed
- Embroidery thread in different weights, colors and content (such as embroidery floss, Perle cotton, sashiko thread)
- Any other items you want to add, such as buttons and beads (Susanne will also provide beads)

## **Amazing Abstracts**

### **Julia Graves**

A Zoom link will be sent to all who register for the class Cost is \$70 for members, \$80 for non-members Registration opens July 1

<u>Class Description</u>: Create an abstract quilt that has amazing movement and drama, using the techniques pioneered by Ursula Kern. Go from inspiration to a simple sketch, then have fun "coloring" your sketch with bits of fabric to create a mock-up of your design – see before you sew! The design is gridded and blocks are foundation pieced using an easy sew and flip method with room for creativity and improvisation. Lots of discussion of design principles and how to use color and value to create the drama and desired effects.

Note: 1-day classes will use a basic angled shape as a starting point to design.



### Bio - Julia Graves

Julia Graves started her quilting business, Special Occasion Quilts LLC, in 2007 and teaches, lectures, designs patterns, makes commission quilts, longarms for others and sells & services APQS

longarm machines. She won Best Longarm Machine Workmanship Wall Quilt Category at the 2016 Mid-Atlantic Quilt Festival, has had quilts published in books by Gloria Loughman, Katie Pasquini-Masupust and MJ Kinman, was an Artist in Residence at Empty Spools in 2019, taught at Empty Spools Seminars in 2022 and will be teaching at Hudson River Valley Art Workshops in 2022 and Empty Spools in 2023.

Julia has been sewing since she was ten and always loved fabric, needle arts and the entire creative process. She did her apprenticeship as a quilter by making a quilt for each of her nieces and nephews (and thinks she should have counted them before making this promise – there were 32!). She has since made more quilts than she can count, many for charity, and is partial to scrap quilts

and working with color to achieve amazing results. Julia lives in Leesburg Virginia.







### Supply List:

- Pencil, eraser, fine tip Sharpie
- Scissors for paper and fabric
- Paper to write on and draw on (with lines and without just a few pieces)
- Sturdy paper to glue on (large index cards 4x6 or 5x7 or card stock just a few pieces)
- Double-sided tape or glue-stick to use with the sturdy paper to create your mock-up. Tape is preferred as glue stick sometimes dries before design is finished. An easier but more expensive option is Grafix doubletack mounting film, available from dickblick.com.
- Long thin ruler for drawing lines with Sharpie
- Square rotary cutter ruler 6 ½" square or larger; 8" square or larger gives more flexibility for block sizes
- Rotary cutter with new blade, mat
- Pictures for inspiration color schemes, design ideas, etc.
- Clear plastic at least one piece, such as plastic document protector sleeves (8 ½" x 11"), template plastic or large clear Ziploc bags (you will draw a grid over your design onto this clear plastic)
- Sewing machine and supplies (machine, power cord, foot pedal, needles, feet, bobbins, neutral thread (gray or beige), extension cord)
- Freezer paper or parchment paper, at least 12" by 12" (optional to cover any sticky spots on your mockup)
- Tweezers (optional for placing small bits of fabric on design)
- Portable light (optional)
- Portable pressing surface and iron (optional and if the room can handle multiple irons)
- Color wheel (optional; instructor has these for sale see website, https://soquilts.square.site/)

### Fabric Supplies:

- ½ yard (1 day class) or 1 yard (2+ day classes) foundation fabric (muslin, or white/cream fabric without pattern, as sometimes the foundation shadows through light colored fabric). This is enough for a small wall hanging.
- Fabrics in at least 2-3 colors for your chosen color scheme in a full range of value (light, medium and dark) and intensity (pure/clear colors and muted/grayed/toned colors), plus lots of neutrals (white, cream, beige, brown, gray, black & white, and black). Variety is better than yardage. Long narrow scraps work well (1-3" wide and 6"-12" long, but don't trim if you have larger pieces). Think mostly tone-on-tone blenders vs multiple colored fabrics, though fabrics that have just the colors of your color scheme can also work well.
- Extra fabrics if you have room, throw in small pieces of fabric in a wide variety of values and colors so you have more choices
- Avant-garde fabrics the foundation piecing method lends itself to using fabrics that are not traditional quilting cotton, such as silks, drapery fabric, polyesters, etc. So if you want to be adventurous, have at it! A woven fabric is easier to sew with than non-woven, such as knits. Use a ½" seam allowances vs the traditional ¼".
- If using an inspiration photo, look closely at all the colors in the photo and bring fabrics in all the colors. The color effect of a photo is often driven by the colors that hide in the background as much as by the bright colors that pop.

# Leadership.....

Have you joined the Slow Stitching Movement?

Years ago, Mark Lipinski jump started the slow stitching movement. He advised us to enjoy the process. Westside Quilters is offering a class in embellishing your quilt, wall hanging or just a block in July. The information is on the website: www.westsidequilterslosangeles.org under calendar. I hope to see you there. Wales quilt inspired quilt in honor of the Queen's passing in September.

Last month I joined a couple of ladies in Oxnard at a friend's beach house on Hollywood Beach to finish hand quilting one of the ladies Grandmother's hand pieced queen size quilt top. Her Granny used a Sears sheet on the back, and a flannel blanket for the batting. My friend had been given the quilt decades ago. Yes, she had worked on it occasionally, but really felt the need to get it done. "I'm not getting any younger". We spent four days hand quilting using my portable wooden frame and almost got it done! What a labor of love! The time was spent laughing and zooming on Friday with our usual group that has been meeting for the last three years on Zoom. The guilters live all up and down the California coast from Oceanside to Los Osos. Zoom has really enhanced our lives and increased my circle of friends.

Part of the retreat included meals out and stops at local quilt shops. Roxanne's, A Wish And A Dream in Carpinteria (919 Maple Ave. Carpinteria, CA 93013) was our initial meeting. Even though, she is trying to sell the shop, there was plenty of new fabric, yarns and novelty items. A visit is easy to do as a day trip from LA. She carries the full line of Kaffe Fassett!

Next was a shop in Ventura, Fabric Town USA

(2686 E. Main Street, Ventura, CA 90303, 805-643-3434). The shop is big with aisles of fabric from a big variety of designers and different types of fabric. Lots of



cottons suitable for quilting. Free parking in the back.

That's all the time we had for shopping; we had a quilt to quilt. The weather was cloudy, so we weren't enticed to walk on the beach for long.

App recommendation for finding shops is

NeedleTravel. The most complete listing of fiber and fabric shops in the United States. It really works! I have used it multiple times in multiple states and find it very reliable and accurate.

### Directions.

### **Half-Framed Four Patch Quilt**

60"x60"



Fabric Requirement: (2) 2 ½" Strip Rolls


### Sorting

Open the strip packs and sort the strips into like fabrics. Use one strip of two different colors for the four Patch, but keep two strips together of the same color for the frame.



### Step One:

Sew two strips together using a ¼" seam allowance. Press seams toward the darker value fabric.



### Step Two:

Cut into 2 ½" segments. From time to time, check to see that the end of the strip set is still straight by measuring from the seam.



#### Step Three:

Sew two segments together, alternating fabric. Press.



### Step Four:

Sew one side of the Four Patch to a contrasting strip. Trim. Press toward toward the rectangles. Multiple blocks may be chain pieced onto a strip, then cut apart, trimming the strip even with the block as shown below.



#### Step Five:

Using the same strip, sew it to an adjacent side of the Four Patch as shown below. Again, several blocks may be sewn to one strip and then trimmed apart.

Make 100 blocks.

#### **Quilt Assembly**

Layout the quilt arranging the blocks as you wish paying attention to scattering both color and values to different parts of the quilt.

Sew the blocks together into rows of ten. It may be easiest to pin the row of blocks to each other while they are laid out, then take the row to the machine to sew. Once sewn and pressed, return the row to the layout and gather the next row.

Finally, sew the rows together to complete the quilt top.

**Quilting Ideas:** The busy nature of this Four Patch quilt lends itself to an allover design, in other words, one pattern repeating over the entire quilt. Either a free-motion design using a hopping foot with the feed dogs dropped or a straight-line design using a walking foot works nicely.

Begin quilting in the center of the quilt working your way out to the edges. Once complete, sew a basting stitch along the edge of the quilt to secure the layers. Trim the quilt to the edge of the quilt top using a rotary cutter and ruler

Here are some suggestions for quilt entry photography from International Quilt Festival. PHOTOGRAPHING YOUR QUILT FOR SUBMISSION

Having a great photo of your quilt - straight on, in focus, not on a bed or held up showing hands and feet, super important. There is lots of great info on quilt photography on line. Google!

Entering shows is not difficult, but to begin here are a few guidelines:

- Always make sure you read everything in the call including the calendar, requirements, rules, etc.
- Especially the rules! Will save headaches and disappointment later on.
- Keep a record on your entries so you won't be caught with a quilt needing to go two places at once. Having to remove a quilt from a show or exhibit because you misread the exhibition dates is a no-no. Ask me how I know...
- Don't be intimidated or depressed by a rejection! There are lots of different reasons why a quilt doesn't fit into a specific show. It is usually not because your quilt is bad!
