

You'll be transported to a tiny island — just 13 acres — in the central Philippines as you enjoy images and stories of the colorful quilts and the more than 100 quiltmakers of Caohagan Island. You'll see photos of more than 50 of these handmade, one-of-a-kind quilts plus be introduced to the unique techniques developed by these quiltmakers whose tools are simply fabric and scissors, needle and thread. I spent more than a month on the island, quilted with the residents, went fabric shopping with them on nearby Cebu Island, and snorkeled the reef that surrounds Caohagan. Those who view the quilts come away smiling, inspired by the creativity of these women and men.

### Dana E. Jones

After too many years of dreaming about making quilts, I decided it was time to live into that dream. While many folks gradually drift into quilting, I claim a specific date when I declared I was a quilter: September 14, 2003. That was the final day of a three-day Martha Pullen quilt event in Huntsville, Alabama, at which I encountered today's quilt world for the first time. I spent the next three days driving home — I lived in White Plains, New York, at the time — stopping at more than a dozen quilt shops en route. I was hooked.

It was a few years before I could give quilting much attention because I had a more than full-time job, but I did take classes at shops in New York City and surrounding areas and attended quilt shows, exhibitions and events whenever possible. When I was able to step away from full-time


employment in 2007, I finally had time to quilt and soon began teaching at Quilter's Crossing in West Nyack, New York, a wonderful shop that sadly is no more though its owner Colleen Nunes continues as a skilled long-arm quilter. I thank her for taking a chance on me as a new quilting teacher.

In 2009, I moved to Colorado where I landed a job as an editor with *Quilters Newsletter* magazine, and less than a year later, I was running the magazine. I also had the opportunity to do a two-year stint as editor of the *SAQA Journal* (Studio Art Quilt Associates) before stepping down from that position to research and write my book, *Pagtinabangay: The Quilts and Quiltmakers of Caohagan Island*. I spent several years on the road telling the amazing story of the more than 100 women and men on this tiny, 13-acre Philippine Island who have created a form of art quilting that supports themselves and their families. That effort pulled together my fascination with fiber and art, my commitment to justice for all

people, and my work as a journalist devoted to telling stories that don't make it into the mainstream, for-profit media.

I was honored to assist in mounting exhibitions of the island quilts at the National Quilt Museum in Paducah, Kentucky; the San Jose Museum of Quilts and Textiles in San Jose, California; and Rocky Mountain Quilt Museum in Golden, Colorado.

I now live at 9,200 feet in Colorado in the Rocky Mountains where I watch the wild critters — elk, moose, bobcats,



I have a special passion for foundation piecing so many of my quilts and classes incorporate that technique. I'm also addicted to insetting circles and find great joy when I help others see how easy it is to do. I'm a regular teacher at multiple quilt shops in Colorado and have taught at Rocky Mountain Quilt Museum.

My current pursuits reflect my formal studies. I'm a graduate of the University of Illinois' journalism school with a minor in home economics. I studied business administration at Webster University in St. Louis and theology at McCormick Theological Seminary in Chicago. I completed 30 hours of fine-art instruction at Belleville Area College, now Southwestern Illinois College, where I was named one of the college's top 50 students during its first 50 years. I was named United Methodist Outstanding Communicator of the Year in 2005 and artist in residence for the library in Gilpin County, Colorado, in 2012.

I began writing and editing in high school when I was hired for a part-time position with my hometown newspaper in Libertyville, Illinois. I owe my long and fulfilling career in journalism to my high-school

English teacher Mary Louise Humes, who mentored and encouraged me for years, and to my first editor, Art Peterson, who had faith in the future of a high school student who wanted to be a reporter. I owe my love of design and type to Professor Glenn Hanson, who taught typography in the University of Illinois journalism school for years. I owe my love of all things quilting to my paternal grandmother, Gertrude Jones, who made sure all her grandchildren slept under covers of love pieced from remnants of her house dresses.

"My talk will take you on a journey along the quilt trail, beginning with the very first barn quilt, which stemmed from Donna Sue Groves and her wish to honor her mother's quilting art. The presentation features over one hundred stunning photographs of barn quilts, some of which rival cloth quilts in their intricacy. A zoom link will be sent to all members

I stumbled across my first barn quilt in 2008; I immediately looked for a book with more information on barn quilts, I found that none existed--so I decided to write one! Quilt trail founder Donna Sue Groves provided me with lots of contacts and background information, and I set out. After two years of weekends and my summers off while teaching, I finished the book, "Barn Quilts and the American Quilt Trail Movement." The book follows the quilt trail as it expanded and tells the stories of those who have created barn quilts. Within two years, so many new quilt trails had merged that it was clear that another book was in order. I set out again and traveled all of the way to California and back, visiting quilt trails. "Following the Barn Quilt Trail" was released in May of 2016.

### A history of quilting in books

I've been meaning to weed through all my quilting books for ages. So, during the last huge rain storm when power in my neighborhood went out for hours, I decided it was a good time to give the shelves a look. And I found my history in quilting there. Starting with The It's Okay if You Sit on My Quilt Book by Mary Ellen Hopkins - I think there are probably many of us who took classes with Mary Ellen at her Santa Monica Shop, Crazy Ladies - and continuing into today I found books I was interested in at one point in my quilting journey. And since I was a librarian, they are all organized together by subject! Maybe you also bought books in some of these areas.

General how to quilt books like *Quilts, Quilts, Quilts!* and updated versions. I purchased a lot of this type of book through the years. This led to books about rotary cutting, collections of block patterns, precuts and strip piecing. Scrap quilting, books featuring stars or baskets, and log cabin patterns are also on my shelves. Using color in quilts is one area I have continually collected. Machine quilting, books on Japanese quilts, Sashiko and Shibori dyeing are relatively new additions.

I have also collected many books on the history of quilting, some on one state or period in history or color. Books on Amish quilts are there. My big love of quilts using reproduction fabrics from the 1800s is well represented. There are books from the teachers of classes I have taken. Joining Westside Quilters has exposed me to so many areas of quilting. And my collection of quilting books now reflects that with books on different techniques, Improv quilting and modern quilts.

I don't buy as many books as I used to but then there is Kaffe Fassett. Who can resist his quilts photographed in beautiful settings? I think it is time to finally get down to figuring out which books to keep and which to send on to new owners!



Here are some suggestions for quilt entry photography from International Quilt Festival. PHOTOGRAPHING YOUR QUILT FOR SUBMISSION

Having a great photo of your quilt - straight on, in focus, not on a bed or held up showing hands and feet, super important. There is lots of great info on quilt photography on line. Google!

Entering shows is not difficult, but to begin here are a few guidelines:

- Always make sure you read everything in the call including the calendar, requirements, rules, etc. Especially the rules! Will save headaches and disappointment later on.
- Keep a record on your entries so you won't be caught with a quilt needing to go two places at once.
- Having to remove a quilt from a show or exhibit because you misread the exhibition dates is a no-no. Ask me how I know...
- Don't be intimidated or depressed by a rejection! There are lots of different reasons why a quilt doesn't fit into a specific show. It is usually not because your quilt is bad!


