
PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

Lloyd is a popular vendor at Road to California. He will be teaching us how to maintain and prevent problems with our Singer Featherweight machines. He will also have machines for sale. His knowledge of featherweights is incredible. He has been selling, repairing and giving clinics for the past 25 years.

About Lloyd

Twenty-five years ago, Lloyd's wife *just wanted* a Singer treadle machine for "decoration" for their home. As they hunted for the machine, Lloyd became "hooked" on the history and background of the industrial revolution and the early Singer machines. His interest than evolved in to a business which he started while still working in the corporate world. He has since retired from his corporate job but continues to maintain his *Aspire* business that includes a Featherweight Museum in his home in Anaheim, California. He has on display over 100



machines dating back to the 1850's (pre-Civil War) as well as antique cabinets and other early Singer products.

Leadership.....

One of the exercises in Creative Strength Training (by Jane Dunnewold) is to write about "...the first cloth in your memory-how old were you, who made it, why was it significant to you, etc." My memory is of a 'teddy bear' coat designed and sewn by my mother when I was four or five. We had gone to a church function where all the little girls (except me) were sporting stylish, wooly (teddy bear) coats. That evening she drew a pattern on brown butcher paper, disassembled a camel hair coat of her own, as well as a fuchsia dress of soft The next morning I woke to a wool jersey. coveted teddy bear coat at the foot of my bed-complete with button holes bound in fuchsia wool and a hood lined in the same The gold buttons (with a iewel-tone fabric. brushed flower relief) that belonged to her dress now closed the front of that fabulous I was ecstatic! At the time I didn't understand the skill required to design and construction that coat, but I knew that her favorite coat had been forfeited for my happiness. Boy howdy, how I loved that coat! I don't remember how long I was able to fit into it, but I hung on to it tenaciously and no other item of clothing ever came close to pride of place as that coat. (Maybe my white velvet wedding dress—another coat, this time floor length—comes close.) The blend and hand of the fabrics, the color combination, the fit, the dedication of her time to work through the night before going to work as a nurse has kept that coat crystal clear in my mind's eye. It was probably then I unknowingly fell in love with fabric—it would be another twenty years before I tried my own hand at being a sewest; I need a good while to cogitate on matters. But once I got going, the floodgates opened.

Few other skills allow such latitude. Halloween costumes to christening gowns, wedding dresses to country curtains, religious vestments to mended jeans, slipcovers to

silken drapes, potholders to what we hold dear—quilts and more quilts. And those quilts run the gamut from simple pet blankets to museum worthy works of art. Many of them leave a record of who we are. In the book Quilts—California Bound, California Made 1840-1940 the author writes:

"...They were pioneers—mothers and daughters, sisters and sisters-in-law, wives and widows. Some were educated and others were illiterate. Some were married to alcoholics, others to men of great ambition who would own, and California's. develop their They had packed little of a wealth. personal nature, but they possessed a set of abilities—brought or acquired that assured their survival. Important among these was the ability to sew, plain and fancy."

Literally and figuratively, sewing by hand or by machine be it computerized to the nth degree or an ancient Singer has altered our vistas. A Doll Like Me, The Linus Project, Days for Girls, Binky Patrol, Dress a Girl Around the World, the AIDS Quilt Project (just to name a few) have increased our awareness of the lives of our brothers and sisters here and abroad, and gives us the opportunity to reach out and support and aid in a demanding and oft times unsettled world.

I wonder if someone will think it worthwhile to write a book covering 1940-2040 California (or elsewhere) to explore how the ability to sew

has enriched, comforted, and sheltered lives in this modern, iPhone age. I hope so.

Calls for Entry

Continuing our notifications for ways to display your quilts and textile pieces to a wider audience... Entering shows is not difficult, but to begin here are a few guidelines:

- Always make sure you read everything in the call including the calendar, requirements, rules, etc.
 Especially the rules! Will save headaches and disappointment later on.
- Keep a record on your entries so you won't be caught with a quilt needing to go two places at once.
 Having to remove a quilt from a show or exhibit because you misread the exhibition dates is a no-no.
 Ask me how I know...
- Having a great photo of your quilt straight on, in focus, not on a bed or held up showing hands and feet, super important. There is lots of great info on quilt photography on line. Google!
- Don't be intimidated or depressed by a rejection! There are lots of different reasons why a quilt doesn't fit into a specific show. It is usually not because your quilt is bad!









Recap of Mel Beach's Class

Editor's Note:

I heard some sad news of the recent passing of Gwen Marston, it made me sad even though I never had a class with her. My first awareness of Gwen was that she was the coauthor (with Freddy Moran) of "Collaborative Quilting – Talking It Over" a book that in my mind is pure magic and is probably one of the reasons I call myself a quilter and belong to a guild. In the book Gwen talks about design how she reinterprets ideas from the classical period of quilt making and how she makes unstructured compositions, based on improvisational design technique that shuns templates.



I was filled with excitement the first time I saw one of Gwen's "liberated" quilts in person, it was at Back Porch Fabrics in Pacific Grove. Of

course, I bought Gwen's "Liberated Quiltmaking II" book that day, so impressed by the bold freedom with color and shape.

Gwen was the featured exhibitor and key speaker at QuiltCon a few years ago and I was lucky enough to attend her talk. I was charmed, enthralled, and inspired as I listened to Gwen. Her quilting style and techniques were significantly colored by her first teachers a group of Mennonite women in Hubbard, Oregon in the late 1970's. Her love of nature and color was evident in all the quilts she shared.

Sometimes little details stick with you. Looking close up at the quilts Gwen had on display at QuiltCon I was puzzled by the way she bound her quilts. Her corners weren't mitered! At her lecture that evening she explained she bound her quilts the same way her Mennonite teachers had and that they lay flat, detail explained. I recently used this style of binding on a quilt I was making when what I was trying to do didn't lend itself to mitering. Gwen had my answer! I plan on finally getting around to making a colorful liberated quilt.

Westside Quilters – February 29, 2019 Executive Board Meeting

<u>President:</u> Roberta called the meeting to order at 10:05 a.m. She asked for approval of the Board's January 19th minutes. Sonja moved to accept the minutes, Linda seconded the motion. The minutes were approved by acclamation.

A discussion of Libby Williams's workshop, held at West Hills Congregational Church, concluded that the location was good for her workshop, but may not work if more tables are needed. Workshop participants considered Libby a generous and creative teacher.

<u>Treasurer</u>: Karynn noted that Westside Quilters (WQ) has \$8,789.58 in our account. We have received a "thank you" for our Christmas donation to Westside Food Bank. Karynn also encouraged everyone to refer to WQ when they order from Amazon. Our account is credited by Amazon when WQ is owed \$5 or more.

<u>Vice-President</u>: Sonja opened a discussion regarding the WQ Board positions which are open for election. Debbie, Luann and Karynn are willing to continue as Newsletter, Membership and Treasurer, while Virginia and Lisa need a third person to assist with Philanthropy. WQ also needs to fill the positions for Vice President and Secretary.

Membership: Luann has updated the roster to include WQ's newest member, Cindy Gee.

Website: Sally W. was absent; there was no report.

<u>Newsletter</u>: Debbie asked that articles be sent to her on or before February 24th. She also noted that Mel Beach's workshop date will be corrected to April 6th, not the 9th as previously published.

Philanthropy: Virginia has received a donation of 2 boxes of fabric. The large pieces will be kept for quilt backings for philanthropy quilts, and smaller pieces will be made available to members at quarterly meetings, workshops and "sew-ins" on a take it or leave it basis.

<u>Programs</u>: Members will be specially reminded by e-mail that WQ's March quarterly meeting location is the Senior Center in Westchester,. WQ will not be charged a fee for the use of the Sr. Center. However, WQ will make a donation to the Senior Center's copy service. Discussion then moved to pricing for future workshops. For several years, WQ has used "Early Bird" pricing to encourage members to sign up for workshops. The Board decided to return to 2 tier pricing for workshops: member pricing and non-member pricing, beginning with the April 2019 workshop. Pricing always reflects the costs associated with providing the workshop. If attendance is negatively affected by this pricing change, the issue will be revisited.

Dinner arrangements were discussed for Jenny Bowker, who will be here for a two day workshop and lecture on March 8 and 9.

Future Business: The next WQ Board meeting will be April 27th, 10:00 a.m. at Sally Wright's home.

There being no further business, the WQ Executive Board Meeting adjourned at 11:30 a.m.

<u>President:</u> Roberta Wally opened Westside Quilters (WQ) March 9th Spring quarterly meeting by welcoming guests and new members. She also commended everyone for finding WQ in its new location, Westchester Senior Center. She asked for a motion to accept the minutes of WQ's October 13, 2018 quarterly meeting, which had been printed in WQ's Newsletter. Jennie Kraft moved to accept the minutes; Sue Woods seconded the motion. It was approved on a voice vote.

Roberta introduced WQ's Board Members and noted that WQ's elections occur at the May quarterly meeting. There will be 3 positions to fill on the Board: Vice President, Secretary and 1 on Philanthropy. She encouraged all members to consider stepping forward to volunteer.

She noted that Quilters By the Sea of Long Beach had an opportunity quilt at the meeting. Tickets could be purchased by mailing \$5 to Quilters by the Sea in the envelope provided. Last but not least, Roberta gave a special "thank you" to Fred Zerez, our Mr. I T, who handles all WQ's electronic systems regardless of location.

Showcase Speaker: Perla introduced Roxanna, an energetic and compelling representative of Days For Girls, a group which sews and delivers menstrual supplies, as well as educational materials, to girls in Kenya and other countries in Africa, Asia and Latin America. She invited WQ members to go to the Days for Girls website, to join a Days for Girls group and assist in making supplies.

Treasurer: Karynn reported that WQ's balance is \$8,789.58. Karynn also encouraged everyone to refer to WQ when they order from Amazon. Our account is credited by Amazon when WQ is owed \$5 or more.

Membership: Luann noted that the Membership List is available to WQ members on our website.

<u>Programs</u>: Pat encouraged members to sign up for Mel Beach's April 6th workshop — Modern Mandalas, and to take advantage of the Early Bird discount today. She also noted that information about all workshops and meeting speakers is available on WQ's website. Brenda was assisted by our speaker, Jenny Bowker, in drawing 3 tickets: Nancy King won a fabric bundle, and two guests won a free WQ class, and tickets to the Long Beach guilt show.

Show and Tell Quilts: Kim Ryan opened with quilts from workshops of Jane Sassaman, Libby Williamson and Susan Brubaker Knapp. Marianne Simpson followed with a Susan Brubaker Knapp quilt, a table runner, a Nativity quilt and Madeline's Stars and Stripes; Debbie Nussbaum - two group challenge quilts: High Fiber Diet and Sun Bonnet Sue 2.0+; Karynn Dittmar - 3 philanthropy scrap quilts; Anita Witherington -2 modern quilts, and a children's cat quilt; Melanie Dreike - Carpenter's Star, "Vinyasa", quilted by Matt Randall; Virginia Marshall - Hexagon Shuffle; Matt Randall - Kentucky Derby horse; Eva Killingsworth - Royal Red; Maureen Gardner - Mid Century Modern and a 1930's Dresden plate quilt; Vicki Bonhoff and Matt Randall - Blue Hearts, a Houston "Sapphire Exhibit" submission in cotton, satin and silk.

Featured Speaker: Jenny Bowker's talk, "Pack and Follow — My Life in Quilts", was a wonderful opportunity for all of us to join Jenny as she travelled through the Middle East and met a variety of fascinating people including a gilt chair maker, a glass blower, and a tomb caretaker, whom she was able to make the focus of her quilts, including many of the religious and local symbols that circumscribed their lives. Her quilts seem to meet her goal of showing the goodness and kindness of the Arab people. As we viewed her quilts, it was evident that her use of traditional quilt work enhanced the quilt. Jenny does not believe in separating traditional quilting techniques from art quilt techniques, and she often uses free motion quilting to extend the designs in fabric. The floral quilt shown at the back of the room was an excellent example of this technique. Jenny was one of the first to be fascinated by the work of the tentmakers who work on a street in Cairo, and their goal to "honor the thread by letting it show a little bit." For a while the tentmakers' street lost craftsmen, but it is growing again and changing as it needs to. The tentmakers have appeared at many quilt shows, sell wall hangings and smaller pieces on Etsy, and are the subjects of the film The Tentmakers of Cairo.
