A Friday Workshop with David Owen Hastings "Indi–Go-Modern" Friday, May 13, 2022 10am - 4pm

The lure of indigo is strong — the classic blue and white combination found in many Japanese textiles is cool, crisp, and so appealing.

CLASSIC, COOL BLUE AND WHITE PAIRED WITH MODERN DESIGN

6 hours: From classic kimonos to denim jeans, indigo

has been used by many cultures for dyeing cloth, and the Japanese have refined the use of indigo to an art form. This is the class to use all those lovely blue and white shibori fabrics you've dyed yourself, or use carefully curated blue and white fabrics from your stash.

Each participant will develop a simple geometric block design based on unfolded origami shapes, set a theme and create variations, and combine them into the beginning of a fresh and modern mini quilt top.

We will start out by stitching practice blocks from blue and white paper, to explore composition using minimal, modern shapes inspired by origami. A PDF will be supplied with blue and white images of fabric, which you can print at home or at a local copy center.

We'll then translate our ideas to fabric, and I will demonstrate simple pattern making using cereal box cardboard. If you don't have any Japanese-inspired blue and white fabric already, I recommend purchasing vintage Japanese yukata cotton fabric from OkanArts.com. Please stick to the blue and white theme. You will want to have some solid dark blues plus some whites/creams to blend with the patterned fabrics.

This workshop is a 6-hour live-stream event, conducted on Zoom, consisting of live instruction (no recording, please). You should have the current version of Zoom installed on your computer or laptop. Guidance for getting started will be sent in advance of the workshop.



ZOOM WORKSHOP DETAILS

- Look at how to take inspiration from unfolded origami paper
- Stitch some practice blocks using blue and white paper, and explore composition using your smart phone or digital camera to take photos along the way
- Keep the lines and shapes very simple and spare for a modern look
- Transfer your design to cardboard, label and cut out pattern pieces
- Select blue and white fabrics for your simple block design
- Audition fabrics for contrast, pattern, texture and placement
- Use cardboard pattern pieces to cut out fabric, leaving a generous amount of extra fabric for seam allowances
- Sew 9-12 blocks, and explore how multiple blocks interact with each other, creating new shapes
- Sew more blocks as time allows to build up a mini quilt top
- Discuss surface design options: hand stitching and machine quilting
- Watch a demo of facing a quilt for a modern look, and joining finished quilt blocks

David will provide full hands-on instructions in class. Bring blue and white fabrics, including some solids, that you would like to use. If you've done some indigo dyeing, or have some vintage Japanese yukata fabrics in blue and white, they will be perfect for this workshop!

This is an all-levels workshop. You should be comfortable using your sewing machine, and it should be in good working order. I look forward to sharing and sewing with you!

Workshop: Indi-Go-Modern

MATERIALS LIST

- **PDF Paper Kit** Please print out the supplied PDF on quality laser paper before class.
- 10-12 indigo blue and white fabrics, in a range of values, patterns, and textures. Fat quarters work great for this project. They can be prints, wovens, or fabrics you have dyed with indigo yourself. Please stick to exclusively blue and white. Also include at least one solid dark blue fabric, and one solid white or off-white. You will select a few fabrics to use, but you will want a range to choose from. You may want to purchase vintage Japanese yukata cotton fabric in blue and white from OkanArts.com be sure to order at least 2 weeks before the workshop.
- **Standard cotton quilt batting** for a design wall, about 24" x 24". Tape this up so you can experiment with your composition, and step back to see the results. Have your phone/camera handy to take pictures of your progress!
- **Cotton sewing thread** for piecing in a neutral color, like light or medium grey. I prefer 40 or 50 wt. thread.

TOOLS/EQUIPMENT

- Domestic sewing machine with quarter-inch seam allowance foot, or standard foot
- Fresh machine sewing needles: I like to use Klasse' Quilting needles 80/12
- Rotary cutter with a fresh blade
- Utility knife or X-Acto knife

- Scissors for paper and fabric shears
- Seam ripper (just in case!)
- Cutting mat (medium size, about 12" x 18" or 18" x 24")
- Quilting ruler (6" x 18" or 6" x 24")
- Chalk pencils and/or Chaco Liner
- Black Sharpie and a pencil with eraser
- Pins
- Smart phone with camera or digital camera to take photos as you work
- Iron and ironing board
- Paper and pencil for sketching: simple copy paper will work, but a larger newsprint pad is nice.
- Post-It pad, small size you will only need a few Post-Its.
- Thin cardboard for pattern making: a flattened cereal box is perfect for this, but any thin cardboard that you can cut easily with scissors or a utility knife will work.





Westside Quilters Quarterly Meeting features guest speaker: David Owen Hastings

"Exploring Nature with Paper and Stitch" Saturday, May 14, 2022

At our Quarterly Meeting <u>David Owen Hastings</u> joins us for a lecture "Exploring Nature with Paper and Stitch". David says "In this lecture, I talk about my work as a visual artist, and how there are similarities to how I now work as a quilter. This talk starts with a review of my stitched paper artwork, which I have been creating for over 20 yrs.

I give examples of where I get inspiration, and what my process is like. I first print my paper using a monotype technique, then sew many layers of printed paper together with a sewing machine. I then talk about how quilters can find inspiration in the world around us, and how my journey as a maker has taken me from gallery artist into the world of modern quilting.

<u>Bio</u>

David is a modern quilter, graphic designer, print and textile artist, and was the 2020 President of the Seattle Modern Quilt Guild. He creates richly layered contemporary artwork and modern minimal quilt and textile designs. For over 20 years, David has exhibited his stitched paper artwork in galleries and juried shows and worked exclusively with nonprofit organizations on their branding and communications.

David's creative approach to modern quilting has led to a busy schedule of workshops and lectures on quilting, branding for artists, fine art and textile techniques. Sharing knowledge, encouraging creativity, and teaching new skills are personal passions. He also loves to travel, especially in Asia, and enjoys sharing his experiences and inspiration through travel photos and stories.

Some have extended their deadline dates. Please see the listing below. Right now, as always, before sending off your entry to any show, double check to make sure that the event is actually taking place. See below. Hopefully as 2022 progresses there will be more opportunities. Watch this space!

Here are some suggestions for quilt entry photography from International Quilt Festival. <u>PHOTOGRAPHING YOUR QUILT FOR SUBMISSION</u>

Continuing our notifications for ways to display your quilts and textile pieces to a wider audience... Entering shows is not difficult, but to begin here are a few guidelines:

- Always make sure you read everything in the call including the calendar, requirements, rules, etc. Especially the rules! Will save headaches and disappointment later on.
- Keep a record on your entries so you won't be caught with a quilt needing to go two places at once. Having to remove a quilt from a show or exhibit because you misread the exhibition dates is a no-no. Ask me how I know...
- Having a great photo of your quilt straight on, in focus, not on a bed or held up showing hands and feet, super important. There is lots of great info on quilt photography on line. Google!
- Don't be intimidated or depressed by a rejection! There are lots of different reasons why a quilt doesn't fit into a specific show. It is usually not because your quilt is bad!

ALICE BEASLEY - QUILTS EXHIBITION

The California Heritage Museum is pleased to present a 30-year retrospective by Oakland quilt artist Alice Beasley. The exhibition will open on Friday, March 11th and conclude on Sunday, June 12th, 2022, open Wednesday to Sunday from 11am to 4pm. There is FREE parking for this event directly behind the Heritage Museum's building.



Quilt artist Alice Beasley has been making quilts since 1988. Fabric is her chosen

medium of expression through which she creates realistic portraits of people and objects. She finds color, light, shadow, line and value in the pattern of ordinary household fabrics. From these materials she snips small pieces which she arranges and fuses into a figurative composition. As such the work grows from within rather than being applied to the surface of a canvas by paint, pencil or similar drawing tools. When the image is complete, Beasley sews it together with the stich line constituting the final "drawn" line.

Ms. Beasley presents many subjects in her work, among them she often completes artwork that displays a rare look into the world of politics and how it affects the Black community. Ultimately, the artist's goal is to celebrate the human condition in work that both intrigues and inspires the viewer.

Alice Beasley's work has been exhibited in many venues throughout the United States including the California Heritage Museum, the American Folk Art Museum, Rutgers University Art Museum, the National Afro-American Museum, the Textile Museum of Washington D.C. and the Smithsonian Anacostia Museum as well as abroad in Madrid, France, Japan and Namibia. Her work has been purchased or commissioned by a number of individuals and public entities including the DeYoung Museum, the City and County of San Francisco and County of Alameda.

Color Courage Workshop Recap By Pat Karasick

Jenny Kae presented Westside Quilters with ideas for conquering indecision in selecting fabrics for your quilts. She suggested going to a paint store and selecting paint chips. Many have gradients of color on the same chip. Narrow your color palette down. Lime green is a neutral, did you know that?

Use a color wheel. Her favorite is Color Play by Joen Wolfson 3-1 Color tool. Make a complimentary color quilt using

opposite sides of the wheel. This is Jenny's favorite. Analogous uses 3-5 colors that are next to each other on the wheel.

Jenny had students go through a series of exercises using small fabric squares. There was enough time to share and examine each board that Westside quilters had created. She challenged everyone to see how color works in nature. It is not cheating to use the selvage edge where the manufacturer has put color dots of the colors used to create the fabric design. Note, digital fabrics do not have this. Jenny is a Cherrywood ambassador, so her demos were pulled from her color coordinated buckets of solid fabrics, easy to see on the screen.

Take a photo on your smart phone. You can manipulate the values, remember Judy Cleveland taught us how to do this. This may show what you are missing. Use equal amounts of lights, medium and darks for depth.

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Is your foot pedal always slipping?

Well, with a bit of shelf liner and some binding, fiber fill and a big scrap of fabric you can make a foolproof holder for your foot pedal. Full disclosure, I saw this on Pinterest. Measure your foot pedal. They are not all the same. Cut the shelf liner a little bit bigger. Bind it with some cheerful fabric to go with your space. Make a small "pillow" of some more fun fabric. This is attached with big stitches to one end. This creates a



"stopper" for your foot pedal. Easy-peasy, no more chasing your foot pedal around creating more sewing time.
