PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

As summer is officially over and fall is with us, I find myself enjoying the wonderful colors that comes with this season. Colors of fall boost my ambition of creating a vibrant quilt. I'm always exploring new ideas for taking a simple quilt design or pattern and transforming it to express either my mood or inspirations from the past.

Recently I was asked by a young future quilter... how did quilts come to be? Although I've read a little about quilts of the past, I didn't really know much about the history. So. I decided to really dig into guilt origins.

To my surprise and maybe yours, I found that "patchwork" dates way back to roughly 5,000 years to early age China and Egyptian tombs. Most patchwork quilts have

become a popular piece of global history, telling stories or as a documentation and being found in all cultures of the world symbolizing resourcefulness. Quilts have different meanings to each individual social institution.

What does a quilt mean to you? Some artists make quilts for therapy, some make them as a source of income, and yet there are some who make quilts as a labor of love or just because they can while others just enjoy the process of making one. Quilters used what resources they had to make a quilt as coverings which also symbolized heritage, as they are created using fabrics that represent a moment in time.

With American culture, patchwork quilts often symbolized the family, and the connection between our past and present. In most cultures, a patchwork quilt represented creativity and a thrifty way to keep warm, with repurposing pieces of old clothing.

Patchwork guilts have become popular, and at one point in time was considered a sign of poverty, but now beloved treasured heirlooms. As the improvements to the textile manufacturing industry during the 18th century, the making of guilts expanded and people started using printed cotton fabric. The 1960's brought Patchwork and became a street fashion as it is continuing today.

The "Crazy Quilt" is probably the oldest of quilt patterns as the creator used any scrap or remnant available,

regardless of its color, design, or fabric type.

It's amazing that one of the earliest existing decorative works is the Legendary Tristan Quilt. It was made around 1360 in Sicily. It is one of the earliest surviving quilts in the world and at least two sections survive, located at the V&A Museum (London) and in Bargello palace (Florence).

The history of quilting as exciting as it sounds, may date back as far as 3400 BC.

I encourage members to read, research and visit quilt history.



Featured WQ Member:

Del Walker Member since 2018

When did you start quilting? Why?

I've been stitching since I was a small child. In the 70's America seemed to be bit by the quilting bug. My grandmother took up quilting, and since she had taught me most of my other needle work skills, it was natural that I would follow her into the world of quilting. I mostly dabbled until the mid-90's when I started taking a lot of classes and joined a guild – or two.

What types do you make?

I make a variety of quilts, mostly traditional quilts in bright colors. My first love is hand-work, either needle-turned applique, hand-piecing, or hand-quilting. Quilting led me to the world of Wearable Art and during the pandemic, I was happy to reconnect with my No Cal Wearable Arts enthusiasts.

How often to you quilt? What time of Day?

I try to quilt every day, usually in the afternoons. If the day gets away from me, I can always grab a hand project to work on in front of the TV after dinner. When I was working full-time, I would often get up early to get a little stitching in before work. I found the day was better if I started off doing the thing I loved most.

Why did you join Westside Quilters?

I moved to LA area 4 years ago. I didn't know any quilters here, so I did an on-line search to find a guild. The Westside Quilters website showed such a variety of workshops and lectures. I also liked the emphasis on Philanthropy. BONUS: No Quilt Show and No Opportunity Quilt.

Who are your favorite teachers and lecturers? There are some great ones, I can't choose a favorite.

What are your favorite workshops or conventions in the past?

AQS Quilt Week in Paducah, KY is something that every quilter should experience. The entire region celebrates Quilt Week and welcomes quilters. Paducah also is home to our Nation's Quilt Museum and it is easy to visit while enjoying Quilt Week.

I'm looking forward to the International Quilt Festival returning to Long Beach in 2022. In the past, it's been one of my favorites. A great, international show in a good venue, close to home.

Where does your inspiration come from?

Sometimes from nature or other art forms. Most typically, from the quilters that came before me.

Tell us your favorite story about receiving or giving a quilt?

A co-worker approached me and asked if I could teach his wife to make a quilt. I said 'sure', as I knew and liked his wife. When she and I met, she explained that her Native American husband had committed to participate in Sundance. The quilt would be an important part of the 4-

year journey. After some discussion, it was obvious she was not physically able to do the stitching required and I offered to make the quilt. There were some requirements – the Shaman dictated the colors – and it needed to be the Morning Star pattern. I bought the fabrics and after they were blessed by the Shaman, I set to work. Each time I worked on this project, I focused on my friend and what he would need on his journey. This quilt would be his only protection on his Vision Quests and during the Sundance. The Shaman also used the quilt as part of a binding ceremony between my friends. Typically, at the end of the 4-year commitment, the quilt is left as an offering. The shaman said my friend should take this special quilt home.





Calls for Entry November 2021

So happy to say the quilt shows and exhibits are slowly coming back to life! We're looking forward to a live Road to California in January and International Quilt Festival is opening for an in person show this week! However, before sending off your entry to any show, double check to make sure that the event is actually taking place. There are a few deadlines coming up soon and some listed below to get ready for next Spring and Fall. Hopefully as 2021 progresses there will be more opportunities. Watch this space!

Here are some suggestions for quilt entry photography from International Quilt Festival. PHOTOGRAPHING YOUR QUILT FOR SUBMISSION

Continuing our notifications for ways to display your quilts and textile pieces to a wider audience... Entering shows is not difficult, but to begin here are a few guidelines:

- Always make sure you read everything in the call including the calendar, requirements, rules, etc. Especially the rules! Will save headaches and disappointment later on.
- Keep a record on your entries so you won't be caught with a quilt needing to go two places at once. Having to remove a quilt from a show or exhibit because you misread the exhibition dates is a no-no. Ask me how I know...
- Having a great photo of your quilt straight on, in focus, not on a bed or held up showing hands and feet, super important. There is lots of great info on quilt photography on line. Google!
- Don't be intimidated or depressed by a rejection! There are lots of different reasons why a quilt doesn't fit into a specific show. It is usually not because your quilt is bad!


WQ Members Immortalized in Print!

Quarantine Quilts: Creativity in the Midst of Chaos.

WQ member **Betsey Barker's** quilt "Corona Virus Blues" was selected from 225 entries for publication in <u>Quarantine Quilts: Creativity in the Midst of Chaos</u>. Sandra Sider, Curator of the Texas Quilt Museum and Editor of Art Quilt Quarterly, produced this anthology as well as a show at the New England Quilt Museum

The design is based on the traditional 9-patch quilt layout, with three blocks across and three down. "No" is repeated three times across the top to signify that we were forbidden to be near our friends, to go to the beach, or to travel.

The images were cut from "novelty" or "conversation" prints made from 100% cotton yardage that Betsey has been collecting since she began quilting in 1985. Betsey chose the Exuberant Applique class to experiment with using fabric to tell a story. The large pieces for the quilt top and back were machine pieced. The cutouts were appliqued to the quilt top with fusible webbing. Machine quilting around the border of each fabric picture ensured that it was attached to the top, and stabilized the three layers.


Social Justice Sewing Academy Pop-up Exhibit

On October 11, my daughter and I went to Sewing Arts Center to see the Social Justice Sewing Academy (SJSA) Remembrance Project. We knew that this would not be a comfortable experience, but one where we would witness the many lives that have been unjustly ended in communities across the nation. Throughout the store, we saw banners that honored individuals who were murdered by police brutality, race-based or domestic violence, gender discrimination, or other violent means. These banners were made by volunteers who were assigned the name of an individual who lived in their local community. It was a sad, sobering experience to view these banners and reflect on the many lives lost to senseless violence, while appreciating the loving care and attention that the volunteers gave while they crafted these exquisite banners in remembrance of them.

We also met the dynamic and impressive Sara Trail, SJSA founder, who has combined her love of sewing and quilting with her passion for advocating against racism, discrimination, and injustice. Sara learned to sew at a young age and is a published author and sewing teacher, and pattern and fabric designer. She is a graduate of UC Berkeley and the Harvard University Graduate School of Education and now works as a high school teacher at a juvenile detention facility in the Bay Area. She is the dynamo behind SJSA.

In addition to the Remembrance Project banners, SJSA organizes volunteers to make memory quilts for the victims 'families. Victims' families often send clothing, like favorite jeans or a jacket, or photos printed on fabric to incorporate into the quilts. During our visit, we were happy to meet Latifah Saafir, superstar quilt designer and cofounder of the Modern Quilt Guild, who shared with us her experience in making a memory quilt of Steven Taylor, a 33-year-old man who was tragically shot and killed by a police officer in a Walmart in April 2020. Latifah made quilts for Steven's grandmother Addie, who raised Steven and has described Steven as a lovable goofball, amateur barber, and aspiring rapper. It was touching to hear Latifah describe the overwhelming emotions she felt when she met Grandma Addie and delivered the four quilts she made from Steven's clothing.

They are looking for volunteers to make banners and memory quilts, or you can make a donation of cash and supplies. You can also support them by purchasing their book, Stitching Stolen Lives: the Social Justice Sewing Academy

Remembrance Project, published by C&T Publishing, through Sewing Arts or SJSA's website. All proceeds go to SJSA programs. SJSA does not have paid staff—all are volunteers. In the future, they are hoping to restart their community quilt workshops to engage high school students and young adults in textile art to express their voices. Although it was a difficult morning, I felt encouraged and touched by the humanity shown through the banners and how they can show the families that their loved ones will not be forgotten.



Immersive Van Gogh Los Angeles

What has 90,000,000 pixels? No, not a pixelated quilt. It's the Immersive Van Gogh Exhibit. There are 500,000 cubic feet of monumental projections incorporating music to form a multisensory experience of animating Vincent Van Gogh's most Masterminded by creative director famous paintings. Massimiliano Siccardi and soundtrack by Luca Longobardi, who both pioneered immersive digital art experience in France.

Why am I telling you this? As quilters, there is inspiration everywhere. This is eye candy in vivid color. The brushstrokes happen before your eyes. The detail may influence your next thread painting or color decisions for your next quilt. The paintings are projected in chronological order. But the scale is what is so impressive, 30 feet high of sunflowers, bedroom scenes and windmills. The paintings surround you. There are two rooms of identical projections. There is also a downloadable audio voiced by Stratford actor, Com Feore.

Safety Covid protocols were observed. Seating areas are available and there are painted bubbles on the floor delineating more areas to stand or sit.

Where do I park? There is a garage underneath the building. The day I went, parking was \$8.00.

Tickets can be purchased online. There are different prices for peak and non-peak hours.

The exhibit will run through until January. This is a way to experience Van Gogh in a completely new and unforgettable way.

I was intrigued by how he gave new life to mostly functional quilts that had a lot of wear and gave them new life as mixed-media paintings and sculptures done directly on or made from pre-1900 antique quilts.

The gallery is spacious and during my weekday visit, there were very few people there.


