Workshop: Walking Foot Quilting- Beyond the Ditch

Learn how to finish your quilts on a domestic machine while enjoying all the control of your walking foot. We will start with a brief discussion of preparing your tops for quilting including marking and basting. Then we will make stitched samples of different styles including modern grids, matchstick quilting and spirals. Finish with a look at Catherine's work to inspire you to go home and turn your tops into quilts.

Biography

Catherine Redford was born in England where she learnt to knit and sew as a young girl. After relocating from London to Naperville, Illinois, she learned to quilt and never looked back. She's an award-winning quilter, an active member of her local guilds, and a popular teacher at the local and

national level. Catherine is a frequent magazine contributor and has enjoyed being a guest on Quilting Arts TV. She is enjoying the resurgence of interest in handwork with a new embroidery book, Butterfly Stitches, published Fall 2020, and with two DVDs and a book on Modern Machine Quilting techniques, Catherine delights in finishing her own quilts on a domestic machine!

Supply List

Materials:

- 10, 10" squares solid color fabric
- 2, 10" square pieced blocks of any design
- 6, 10" squares low loft cotton batting
- White 50 wt. cotton thread for quilting (e.g., Aurifil, Wonderfil, Superior....)

• Colored 12 wt. cotton thread (e.g., Aurifil, Wonderfil, Superior....)

Equipment:

- 50, size 1 safety pins
- scissors
- low-tac painters' tape
- Rotary cutter, mat and ruler (12" or longer)
- #80 and #100 sharp (Microtex) or topstitch sewing machine needles
- Sewing machine with walking foot, open toed appliqué foot, with any acrylic surround, knee lift and instruction book you have
 - *(if your machine has an integrated dual feed system or similar you do not need a walking foot.
 - Please use open toed appliqué foot that works with the system)
- paper and pen for notes

- Kwik Klip
- Ball point stiletto

At the end of the day, research has shown that quilting can be beneficial for your emotional wellbeing. The <u>Journal of Public</u> <u>Health</u> has shown that quilting helps with cognitive, creative and emotional wellbeing for people of all ages.

I started quilting over 35 years ago. I don't remember why I started, other than the fact that I loved looking at quilts and decided I wanted to learn to make them; but I do know that it contributed – and continues to contribute – to my emotional wellbeing. Remembering that is enough to motivate me to get started again.

What motivates you? Perhaps you, too, have felt stuck. I hope that Carlolina Oneto's

comments help you as much as they have helped me.

Words of Wisdom from Our Treasurer

There are many easy ways to pay for membership dues and workshops but some might need clarification.

The best way to pay which doesn't cost the guild fees is by Zelle. Check with your bank to see if they are set up to use Zelle and then all you have do to is send money to treasurer@westsideguilterslosangeles.org and it's immediately credited to our bank account. I have my account at a credit union which doesn't currently have Zelle available. But it does have something called P2P or dash cash. I have been able to send money to WQ using the same treasurer@westsideguilterslosangeles.org address: and there are no fees generated. So, check your bank to see what they offer for sending money easily and give it a try.

Another way to pay is through PayPal. You need to have a PayPal account and then you can send money to Westside Quilters using <u>westsidequilters@yahoo.com</u>. There is a minimal charge to us for accepting money.

Of course, you can pay with your credit card number, either by writing it on your form or by calling me if you feel safer doing it that way.

And, lastly, you can pay by check (or cash if we are meeting in person).

So happy to say the quilt shows and exhibits are slowly coming back to life! We're looking forward to a live Road to California in January and International Quilt Festival is planning an in person show in Fall 2021! However, before sending off your entry to any show, double check to make sure that the event is actually taking place. There are a few deadlines coming up soon and some listed below to get ready for next Spring and Fall. Hopefully as 2021 progresses there will be more opportunities. Watch this space!

Here are some suggestions for quilt entry photography from International Quilt Festival. PHOTOGRAPHING YOUR QUILT FOR SUBMISSION

Continuing our notifications for ways to display your quilts and textile pieces to a wider audience... Entering shows is not difficult, but to begin here are a few guidelines:

- Always make sure you read everything in the call including the calendar, requirements, rules, etc. Especially the rules! Will save headaches and disappointment later on.
- Keep a record on your entries so you won't be caught with a quilt needing to go two places at once.
 Having to remove a quilt from a show or exhibit because you misread the exhibition dates is a no-no.
 Ask me how I know...
- Having a great photo of your quilt straight on, in focus, not on a bed or held up showing hands and feet, super important. There is lots of great info on quilt photography on line. Google!
- Don't be intimidated or depressed by a rejection! There are lots of different reasons why a quilt doesn't fit into a specific show. It is usually not because your quilt is bad!

I always smile when I think of my dad helping me figure out how to do the batting and binding for it – the end result was stuffing the quilt with loose polyester craft batting and gluing on a satin ribbon blanket binding!

MAKING MEMORY AND T-SHIRT QUILTS

As Sherri Lynn Wood says on her blog, "Memory Quilting Heals the Heart". For those of us who have lost loved ones during the pandemic, a memory quilt can literally wrap us in the love of someone who has passed. Using the same principles, T-shirt quilts can celebrate happy life events such as birthdays, graduations or wedding anniversaries. Whatever the reason for making a memory quilt, there are design options available from teachers who specialize in creating these heirlooms.

For a beginner-friendly introduction to making T-shirt quilts, Missouri Star offers a low-cost video class. This video covers all the main concepts (trimming, stabilizing, and combining blocks of different sizes), so it provides a quick start for an experienced quilter as well. Once purchased, the video is yours forever to watch again and again. <u>Tackling T-Shirt Quilts</u>

Making memory quilts and t-shirt quilts can be a very emotional process. Assembling a quilt from treasured fabrics can seem overwhelming. For many families, finding a quilter who specializes in making memory quilts can take the project from dream to reality. These quilters offer guild lectures, workshops, and commission services for creating fabric treasures.

Sherri Lynn Wood's book <u>The Improv Handbook for Modern Quilters</u> helps quilters to look at new ways to express their creativity. Recently, Sherri has been focusing on <u>"Passage Quilting"</u> workshops where she helps guide quilters to make their own memory quilts. She recently spoke at the International Quilt Museum about her process for the passage quilts that she made for her family. <u>Lecture at the International Quilt Museum</u>

Liberty Worth is a Los Angeles quilter known for her compassion in making memory quilts from the clothes of loved ones who have passed away. As a member of the Los Angeles Modern Quilt Guild, her ideas are innovative while still being respectful. For examples of her memory quilts (and her other wide-ranging projects), view Liberty's website.

Cyndi Zacheis is the author of <u>Creating Celebration Quilts</u>, and is known for her distinctive designs. The cover of her book shows a memory quilt based on the Chinese Coins pattern and using small pieces of clothing. The stacks of coins appear to be exploding with positive celebrations of the man who passed. Cyndi's recent workshop for the Quilt Alliance presented a well-organized and comprehensive guide with many examples from the commission quilts she has created. <u>View Cyndi's</u> website

Beth Sullivan's business offers more traditional t-shirt, memory, and baby clothes quilts. Her workshop showed a variety of examples for combining different-sized blocks cut from t-shirts. She has used men's sweaters, ties, and work shirts to make a coherent design. In addition, she has helped families sort through baby clothes to prioritize the most meaningful items. <u>View Beth's website</u>

Imagine wrapping yourself in a warm, soft quilt made from the favorite clothes of someone you have loved and lost. It would be almost as if they were still with you, hugging you. Or perhaps you have a wall hanging of your child's baby clothes, remembering their baby sweetness now that they are a teenager. I was recently playing with the arrangement of 9 colorful blocks that are part of a baby quilt I'm making to welcome a good friend's first grandchild. It's a sweet little nostalgic old fashion quilt made with 1930's reproduction fabrics that I had on hand. The block has a center star bordered with 6 of the 9 fabrics I'm using, and I'm trying to not have any two identical border fabrics touch each other.

All the blocks are sewn and laying on the dining room table. And, I'm playing with the layout before sewing all the blocks together. I've switched this block for that block or turned it 90 degrees, you all know that game! I've achieved the final layout!!! Time to start sewing.

I took 2 blocks off the table, pinching the block edges together to be sewn and walk over the sewing machine to secure the seam. Easy breezy! Place it back on the table and grab 2 other blocks to sew together, repeat with other blocks. Taking a look at the all the blocks laying on the table, "What happened to my well-planned layout?" Did a demon-sewing-fairy mix up the block placement once I walked to the other room to sew the blocks together? I'm sure it wasn't me sewing the wrong edges together!

This is where taking a picture of the layout before starting to sew the blocks together would have provided a reference to refer back too. I've learned my lesson!

Treasurer's report: There is currently \$9410.16 in the bank account. There was discussion about auto fill forms but we are unable to do it at the present time. SCCQG insurance will be paid in September and any required taxes filed in October.
