All I have to do is look at my garden to know the season is changing. Time to try something new.....time to challenge ourselves.

I finally finished an art quilt that I started last March in a class at Asilomar in Pacific Grove, California. I was feeling very proud of myself and ready to sew a sleeve on and hang it in my sewing room.

I told a friend, you know her as our web mistress, she said, "Now Paint it." I was very surprised and overwhelmed. I had to let that thought sink in.



I had been in many classes where the teacher had talked about painting on fabric and demonstrated the technique. I had even bought the fabric paints... I never had the courage to try them. I had no experience.

I tried to hear my teacher's voice in my head and started practicing on muslin. I mixed colors on a plastic plate. I found a piece of fabric that was the color I was trying to get in paint. I held the fabric in one hand and a paint brush in the other..... I could do it. Once again fabric came to my aid. I then tried several brushes to get a feel for applying paint, still working on muslin. I needed control and experience.

Finally I turned on some music and found the courage to paint on my quilt. I timidly started. I realized if I was not happy with something I painted, I could wait until it dried and paint over it.

I learned a lot that first day, it mostly I practiced and gain some confidence. I learned not to just look but to SEE what was in my original photo. Where the shadows ...where were the highlights?

Just as I saw my summer flowers fading, I could see my quilt coming to life with the addition of paint. Change is happening.

Try something new in this new season.

This class is appropriate for the absolute beginner or the quilter with some experience who wants to improve their free motion quilting. Learn to free motion quilt in a supportive and fun atmosphere. Jenny will bring numerous quilts, photos and samples to illustrate what is taught in class. Jenny will be teaching this November at IQF Huston.

We will work on 5 beautiful and fun motifs that you can put on your own quilts using your home sewing machine!

Jenny says "I think the biggest barrier to successful free motion quilting is the internal critical voice. If you can let go of that, you can successfully free motion quilt. Really all we're doing when we free motion quilt is using thread, fabric and machine to quilt-no big deal. Sometimes just being in a classroom can cramp your style-I know it does for



me! So my hope, my goal, is for my students to let go of that fear and that critical voice and just have fun with it. So what if your class sample is not that great-you're learning something new and it may take a while."

About Jenny Lyon:

I have been joyfully teaching the art of quilting since 2006. My classes are encouraging, supportive, and light-hearted. I love seeing my students realize that they CAN quilt their own work on a domestic machine. I teach regionally, at various guilds, at IQF Houston and Chicago and throughout the US.

I have been working with fabric since I was a little girl trying to make my own clothes. I hail from a long line of traditional bed quilt makers, but I didn't take a formal class in quilting until 1983. I "re-entered" quilting in 1999 and that one class unleashed a *'need'* to create that has not stopped.

I use my domestic sewing machine to create art quilts and wearable art. I love to watch my machine stitches create line, texture and shadow as they merge on the surface of the fabric. My work has been juried into the Houston International Quilt Festival, Pacific International Quilt Festival, AQS in Paducah, the Curitiba Quilt Show in Brazil, and has shown in several art galleries as well as SAQA exhibits. Some of my work is held by private collectors.

I live in Northern California with my oh-so-patient hubby and our Basset boy. Our two grown sons have left the nest to become men, leaving more room for books, fabric and notions.

My current work is centered around whole-cloth pieces, with intricate free-hand free-motion quilting. Because there is little or no piecing, the story is told through the line of the thread. I consider this work to be "sculpting" the fabric, since the stitches create line and shadow upon the quilt's surface.

I call myself the Quilt Skipper because once while quilting my own quilt, I was so delighted by the unexpected beauty of it and what emerged from my needle, that I found myself cheerfully skipping around the house when I took my breaks. It is a joy to create art with free motion quilting.

SUPPLY LIST

☐ Machinein good working order. Bring the one you will really work with at home if possible.
☐ Manual for machine. Please know how to set up your machine for free motion before class by
reading your manual.
☐ Free Motion or Darning foot for your machine opentoed is best. Bring a closed toe darning foot if
that's what you have. The foot usually has a spring on it. You do need this for the classif you're not
sure, please call your machine's dealer to make sure you have the correct one.
□ Put the free motion foot on your machine before you come and lower the needle to make sure it fits
and works with your machine. Your quilt sandwich should move freely under a lowered presser foot. I
want to make sure you have the right one!
□ 68 quilt "sandwiches". Exact size is not important but they should be about 14" square or so1
5/8 yds. of fabric will yield 6 sandwiches. Fabric should be solid or near solid so that you can see
your stitches. Your sandwiches will have 3 layers: fabric, batt, fabric. A thin cotton batt works best.
Put a few pins in just to hold it together.
☐ Blue wash out marker or white marker if your fabric is dark.
□ Quality thread, preferred 50 weight or higher (higher number=thinner thread) (Aurifil, Mettler are
good). If you're going to go buy thread for class, I would suggest Aurifil 50 weightit behaves well.
□ Wound bobbin (same thread choices as above).
□ One extra bobbinempty.
☐ Size 80/12 needles for your machinetopstitch preferred; the new titanium coated ones are even
betterthey last longer.
□ Scissors or snips.
□ 4 paper towels (I'll explain!)
□ Pencil/paper for taking notes and practicing motifsunlined is much better than lined.
☐ Any other notions that you like to use for free motion quilting
Bring only if you already have (don't rush out and buy them):
☐ The bed extender that came with your machine if you have one. Or, bring your Sew Steady table if
you have one.
☐ Teflon machine bed cover such as Supreme Slider (makes the bed of your machine slippery so that
your quilt sandwich moves more smoothly).
□ Straight stitch throat plate.
□ Quilting gloves of your choiceno, you don't <i>have</i> to have them but it can help!

Calls for Entry

Continuing our notifications for ways to display your quilts and textile pieces to a wider audience... Entering shows is not difficult, but to begin here are a few guidelines:

- Always make sure you read everything in the call including the calendar, requirements, rules, etc. Especially the rules! Will save headaches and disappointment later on.
- Keep a record on your entries so you won't be caught with a quilt needing to go two places at once. Having to remove a quilt from a show or exhibit because you misread the exhibition dates is a no-no. Ask me how I know...
- Having a great photo of your quilt straight on, in focus, not on a bed or held up showing hands and feet, super important. There is lots of great info on quilt photography on line. Google!
- Don't be intimidated or depressed by a rejection! There are lots of different reasons why a quilt doesn't fit into a specific show. It is usually not because your quilt is bad!

WQ Member Articles:

IT'S A SMALL WORLD......by Perla Rothenberg

Today (9/15) I made my second visit to Days for Girls. This is an organization that puts menstruation supplies together and teaches girls in Third World countries how to deal with their periods. But, remember, we cannot send them tampons and/or pads as their customs will be different from ours, their disposals of products are different as is their treatments of the girls during their periods. Many countries have the



girls live in separate huts during their periods keeping them from attending school and as you can imagine, they are left behind in their studies.

This organization puts flannel to work like you would not believe. They try to use dark colored flannels with no depiction of faces or religious symbols. The flannel is used to make washable pads. In a gallon plastic bag goes a foundation pad which clips onto the underwear, a flannel pad is inserted in the foundation pad, additional 3-5 pads are added along with a wash cloth, a bar of soap, 2-3 panties and a small worksheet in which the girls use to keep track of their periods and an empty plastic bag which allows them to wash the pads without embarrassment. All of this is put inside a 12"x12" cotton bag. Sometimes the girls remove the supplies and use the bag as a backpack for school supplies. My mini-group, SOS (Sewers on Saturday), helped me make about 50 cotton bags earlier this year which I delivered to Days for Girls.

The group meets at the LDS Church on Manhattan Blvd. (Western & Pico) approximately once a month. I know for a fact there were more than 50 women, children and a few men in attendance today and everyone was put to work! I especially enjoyed watching the young girls put the packages together. Their enthusiasm was wonderful to watch. I was put to work cutting the flannel down to the pad sizes.

Now why it's a small world. The first time I attended I noticed a few Hispanic women sitting in an alcove and I asked one of the organizers what they were doing. She walked me over to the alcove and showed me they were making blankets for Dollies Making a Difference! I told her I knew of the organization as Westside Quilters, have made, I'm sure, at least 200 mini-quilts for them. I asked the organizer if the women would like a yarn donation? The response was yes and how quickly could I get it to them! I went through my own stash and found enough to fill two garbage bags full which I promptly delivered to the Chapter leader. Not much later I received a huge yarn donation in which again, I gave 5-6 garbage bags full to not only Days for Girls specifically to be given to the Hispanic ladies but to Binky Patrol, too (Sonja Daniels is a member).

Today, the Chapter leader, took me over to the alcove again, and showed me the ladies were busy churning out the Dollies blankets with my donated yarn. Then she asked me if I knew Dorothy? Dorothy, I said? It was Dorothy Miyake sewing flannel strips together. Dorothy, along with Cindy Simon had come to Westside Quilters to talk to us about Dollies and Dorothy remembered that we were still donating quilts via Patti Post! So that's my small world -- organizations that go outside their boundaries to help each other. Whether it's my mini-group helping Days for Girls, or Dorothy of Dollies Making a Difference helping Days for Girls, or Days for Girls helping Dollies making a Difference. You will find people generous with their time everywhere you turn.

Westside Quilters Executive Board Meeting Minutes

August 18, 2018

<u>President:</u> Roberta Wallley opened Westside Quilters' (WQ) Summer quarterly meeting on August 18, 2018 by welcoming guests and new members. She also thanked Hospitality for providing refreshments, and reminded everyone to make sure they had "raffle" tickets which had been given out at the membership table as people entered the meeting.

The minutes of WQ's May 23, 2018 Summer Quarterly meeting were printed in WQ's newsletter. Sally Wright moved that they be approved by the members, Sandy Abramowitz seconded the motion. The minutes were approved by voice vote.

<u>Treasurer</u>: The treasurer's report, printed in WQ's August Newsletter, showed a balance of \$8,671.94. The report was approved by voice vote. Also, following discussion, Westside Quilters' membership approved a \$300 donation to A Child's Dream-CA for fall school supplies.

<u>Membership</u>: Luann noted that new memberships continue to come in. The membership list is updated and available on the website.

<u>Philanthropy:</u> WQ's August Fabric Sale in the church's garden, coordinated by the Philanthropy chairs with the assistance of several other members, was, as always, very popular.

<u>Newsletter</u>: Debbie invited all members to think about submitting an article for the Newsletter. Topics could range from travel to experiences with other quilters, family members or pets. Debbie was commended for putting out a colorful and informative newsletter.

<u>Website</u>: Sally Wright reported that the website is continually updated with program information and Show and Tell photos. Additionally, she pointed out that Westside Quilters is now 8 years old!

<u>Programs</u>: Pat and Brenda encouraged members to visit them at the table in the back of the room to sign up for coming workshops: Spiderweb with Jean Impey, and Free Motion Quilting with Jenny Lyons. Future workshop information was also available.

<u>Showcase Speaker</u>: Vicki Bohnhoff gave a humorous and informative presentation on how to get your quilt packaged to send to a quilt show. No pet hair, no strong smells -- air out all your quilts before sending them. Quilts are evaluated after arriving at the show, and if they don't pass the tests, you pay to have them returned to you. Vicki recommends rolling your quilt around a "pool noodle" to send it, and she highly recommends taking photos and documenting the patterns and any other specific information relating to the quilt before you send it off.

Show and Tell: The following quilters showed their quilts: Karynn Dittmar -- a colorful Kaffe Fassett hexagon quilt; Elizabeth Morris -- several quilts for philanthropy; Roberta Walley -- a quilt inspired by Maria Shell; Luann Jaffe -- 4 colorful quilts; Bobbie Leung -- 2 Sunbonnet Sue quilts she had been given; Bobbie Blake -- 2 pillows for her grandchildren and a bear themed baby quilt; Sally Wright -- "Rings"; Matt Randall -- "Horses" and "Flower"; Aileen Cooke -- Glam Cam from Latifah Saafir's class; Sandy Abramowitz -- a pinwheel baby quilt; Nancy Sharpe's grandson's quilt -- "Columbia Blue"; Rachel Prentiss -- 2 summer samplers; Maureen Gardener -- black and white "Haunted Hounds"; Suzanne Woods -- orange and purple circles; Florann Ramsey -- "Playing on the Surf"; Barbara Maron-Pollack -- Coffee Cup from Sandra Bruce's Class; Cathy Seidman -- "Fantastic Flowers" still life; Pat Karasick - a pieced quilt donated to Philanthropy.

<u>Featured Speaker</u>: Our featured speaker, Velda Newman of Nevada City, CA, gave an awe inspiring talk. Her art background became the source of her experimenting with fabric and texture. She began her quilt adventures in 1985, and benefitted from Jean Ray Laury's encouragement. Her second quilt, "Iris", won Best of Show in Houston in 1989. While most people's quilts are described in inches, Velda's are measured in feet. Her Statue of Liberty -- "Freedom is Fragile", measures 6' x 6'. Velda's technique is to layer one piece atop the first and so she does not have a true background on her quilts. Most of her topics are taken from nature: flowers, butterflies or animals. The final quilt she showed, a varied flock of sea gulls, stretched all the way across the stage, a masterpiece.

The meeting adjourned at 12:15 p.m.

We would like quilts that are new and have not been widely shown – your latest work! The subject matter, techniques, and genre are up to you! Let's see what's emerging from your sewing studio these days! No Kit Quilts will be accepted. This exhibit will be juried by a team.

Entry requirements are as follows (please read carefully):

- Entry(ies) must have been finished in 2017 or 2018 and be in excellent condition.
- Entry forms available at www.sccqg.org and must be postmarked by November 1, 2018.
- Entries must include a stamped, self-addressed business-sized envelope.
- 4x6 (only) color pictures of both the full quilt and a detail (close-up) with the following information on the back of the photo: title of quilt, dimensions (width x height in inches), and your name.
- The entry form must be enclosed and filled out completely.

Entries missing any of the above will be eliminated from consideration.

Time Table

November 1, 2018 Entry form, pictures, self-addressed stamped envelope and entry fee must be received or postmarked no later than November 1, 2018. Photographs will not be returned for any entries.

December 1, 2018 Notification letters will be mailed by this date. Accepted entries will receive instructions for quilt shipment.

January 14, 2019 Accepted quilts must be received by New Quilts of Southern California for exhibition. Quilts may not arrive before January 14 or later than January 18.

January 23-27, 2019 New Quilts Exhibit at Road to California, Ontario Convention Center, Ontario, CA

January 29, 2019 Quilts will be shipped/returned to participants
