Recently, I took a trip to Naperville, Illinois just outside of Chicago to visit my nephew and his family. I took the train into Chicago for an adventure through the city with my sister and one stop we visited was the Art Institute of Chicago to see the Obama Portraits.

As I looked at the museum map, I was not aware their Textiles exhibit was closed but was informed by a curator that they had the first solo museum exhibit of **Bisa Butler: Portraits**! What a wonderful treat that was. I had seen her amazing quilts online, but was totally blown away to see them in person.



As I walked up "The Woman's Board Grand Staircase" to her exhibit, I could feel my heart racing as I approached the first of her pieces, "Southside Sunday Morning" 2018. It was as if her images would just walk off their backgrounds and it was incredibly special to see these up close.

Bisa's quilted portrait colors are extremely vibrant to say the least, and the composition of each appliquéd piece is a dramatic interpretation of what she creates from photos in history and personal family images with fabric. Each and every quilt has such a beautiful story to it and you can almost feel the excitement she must have been going through to bring out the tale of each. I have such admiration and completely impressed with Bisa Butler's work...the detail, the story behind each, the quilting and of course her palette of colors!

I've taken several collage classes and have been working on my own versions of collage portraits and I couldn't wait to get home to work on the few pieces I've started.

I encourage you if you can, to visit this incredible display of these extraordinary quilts...they're on display until September 6th in Chicago. I hope this exhibit makes it to California. I'm not surprised the quilts are called "technicolor textiles".

And also, don't forget about the exhibit in Santa Monica at the California Heritage Museum featuring some of the works of our own members. The exhibit goes on until September 19th.

In Memorial...

Christine Nord - September 10,1942 - August 23, 2021

We learned this week of the passing of our longtime WQ member and friend Tina Nord.

I say member, but in actual fact Tina was the leading light of our guild for many years. I was the first president, but WQ was Tina's inspiration. One day early on 2010 she called me and said "Let's have lunch to talk about something. What if the two of us started a quilt guild?" In fact, it was all her... she had the inspiration, organized our first organizational meeting at a restaurant in Marina Del Rey, wrote our initial by-laws, guided our application for non-profit status through the labyrinth of the IRS and was our first Treasurer. She had strong opinions on how WQ should be run with an emphasis on organization and education and she was usually right. WQ was her creation.

I first met Tina in an early class I took at Sewing Arts Center. I think it was making pineapple blocks with Becky McClure. We bonded over quilting - she had been making quilts for years and I was a relative newcomer. We started meeting for dinners before Santa Monica Quilt Guild meetings and taking classes together. She dragged me up to Pacific Grove for our first mutual class at Empty Spools with Sally Collins. We never looked back and went together every year for a long time.

Tina was a talented quilter, always a perfectionist in her cutting and piecing, loving her varied tones of blue and lavender. She loved trying new patterns, but was sometimes irritated with the designer's directions. She knew how to do it better. She tried art quilting, but put it aside for piecing saying she had no talent for it. She was wrong, but she was stubborn. She hated free motion quilting. She had definite opinions! She adored making quilts for other people including pieces for WQ philanthropy, friends, family and especially the medical teams who helped her through some health issues. One of her recent quilts was a gift for our WQ audio visual wizard Fred Zerez.

In her other life she was a graduate of UCLA, a longtime executive assistant both in New

York and Los Angeles. She had no children but doted on nieces, nephews and cousins and her devoted brother Bill. She was an entertaining companion, an enthusiastic listener, generous to a fault and one of the smartest women I have ever met.

In recent years beset with some health problems we have seen her less and less at our guild, but she has kept up with friends, kept on sewing making quilts for our philanthropy projects and gifts for friends. She remained interested in what WQ was doing and always wished us well.

She will be missed.

Quilt samples and photos are used to show how quilters can expand the possibilities of the conventional T-shirt quilt to include anything that can be washed, sewn and made to lie flat. Using interesting items is a focal point of the lecture. In addition, the design and construction of a variable layout quilt is discussed as well as the use of partial seams in construction of unique quilt designs.

Workshop: Walking Foot Quilting- Beyond the Ditch

Learn how to finish your quilts on a domestic machine while enjoying all the control of your walking foot. We will start with a brief discussion of preparing your tops for quilting including marking and basting. Then we will make stitched samples of different styles including modern grids, matchstick quilting and spirals. Finish with a look at Catherine's work to inspire you to go home and turn your tops into quilts.

Biography

I was brought up in the Northwest of England, the "middle child," with an older brother and a younger sister. I learned to knit and sew at an early age and kept my family's Barbie Dolls and Action Men well dressed.

University took me to Reading where I met my future husband, Steve. Knitting him a long "Doctor Who" style striped scarf and making needlepoint pictures gave welcome relief to the chemistry and microbiology courses demanded for

my degree in Food Science. We married two weeks after I graduated and 35 years later have four grown children.

We moved to Naperville, IL from London in 1995. I had been teaching cross-stitch and just had my first pattern accepted for publication when we moved. Buying warm coats for the Illinois winters and making new friends kept me busy for a while and then in 1998 I discovered quilting.

I took my first class at Stitches and Stuffing in Naperville. There seemed to be lots to learn. Five years later I started teaching classes at Pieceful Heart Fabrics in Lisle, just 10 minutes from my home for 10 years until the shop closed in June 2013. I am now teaching and speaking at Guilds around the country and continue to learn.

I'm a member of my local quilt guild, "Riverwalk Quilters Guild," where I have served as program chair, vice-president, co-chair of "the Gathering" committee, and also a 2 year term as president. I am also a member of the Fiber Art Divas, an art group that meets at Naperville Art League and of PAQA, the professional art quilt group. In 2012 I co-founded the Naperville Modern Quilters Guild to further explore the modern quilt aesthetic.



In 2013 I was invited to appear on Quilting Arts TV and have since taped several segments on various topics. I am a regular contributor to *Modern Patchwork* magazine and am the author of two Modern Machine Quilting QATV workshop DVDs.

A class with Phil Beaver in 2005 challenged me to take my art further and I have been creating more of my own original pieces. I have also developed lectures and workshops of my own and am available to visit your shop or guild. After taking many different classes locally my style could be described as "eclectic" but I am known best for my originality and innovation when completing my projects, particularly in the realm of free-motion quilting and embellishment.

I believe we all have an innate need to create in some sphere of our lives, being made in the image of a creator God. Quilting is my outlet of choice. I share my love of quilting as an inspiration to others. I have found that as I pass on the knowledge, I have gained on my journey I learn more tips and techniques that take me still further.

Quilting is a choice and as such I think that all quilters have the right to choose the elements of their craft that bring joy to them. There are always parts of our lives that we just "have to do" in pursuit of our long-term goals. It's the same when we quilt. I always encouraged my children to try a new vegetable but could accept that there were some that they would never learn to love. I encourage my students to try all the processes involved in finishing a quilt but accept that there will be some people that find their joy in making tops by machine whilst others enjoy handwork and still others love to machine quilt. That's OK! That's where teamwork comes in and there's a whole community of quilters out there willing to help.

So happy to say the quilt shows and exhibits are slowly coming back to life! We're looking forward to a live Road to California in January and International Quilt Festival is planning an in person show in Fall 2021! However, before sending off your entry to any show, double check to make sure that the event is actually taking place. There are a few deadlines coming up soon and some listed below to get ready for next Spring and Fall. Hopefully as 2021 progresses there will be more opportunities. Watch this space!

Here are some suggestions for quilt entry photography from International Quilt Festival. PHOTOGRAPHING YOUR QUILT FOR SUBMISSION

Continuing our notifications for ways to display your quilts and textile pieces to a wider audience... Entering shows is not difficult, but to begin here are a few guidelines:

- Always make sure you read everything in the call including the calendar, requirements, rules, etc. Especially the rules! Will save headaches and disappointment later on.
- Keep a record on your entries so you won't be caught with a quilt needing to go two places at once. Having to remove a quilt from a show or exhibit because you misread the exhibition dates is a no-no. Ask me how I know...
- Having a great photo of your quilt straight on, in focus, not on a bed or held up showing hands and feet, super important. There is lots of great info on quilt photography on line. Google!
- Don't be intimidated or depressed by a rejection! There are lots of different reasons why a quilt doesn't fit into a specific show. It is usually not because your quilt is bad!

Virginia Marshall Founding Member 2010

In Junior High we were required to take 2 years of Home Ec., my introduction to sewing. We had to make our graduation dresses, mine was yellow dotted Swiss, the beginning of many years of clothing construction for my husband and three children. I stopped sewing for 10 years, got divorced, remarried and always planned to take a quilting class when I had time, but why wait. I could find time. I took a class at Crazy Ladies and made my first Rail Fence baby quilt for my oldest grandson born in 1992.



I am most inspired by a quilt top pattern; I tend to make traditional quilts but also like to skew the traditional pattern in some way. I tend to head to the brights when in a quilt shop and usually don't buy fabric unless I have something in mind. I usually work on something every day, so most of my work in the afternoons, when working it was most evenings. My husband has built great studios, redesigning one of the kids' old bedrooms in Santa Monica and in New Mexico a large room with everything the right height and wonderful views out of wide windows when I sew. The house in NM has become a

"quilt museum" as we have lots of white walls! I participate in a Studio Tour in NM for 10 years sharing my passion with quilts hung inside and out.

I joined WSQ because of their forward thinking in quilting, great group of very talented women, and interesting programs/workshops. Some of the workshops seemed a stretch for me but I always learned something and enjoyed sharing time with other quilters.

I took a workshop at Road to CA in 1999 from Mary Lou Weidman, it was a Story Quilt (see photo) "David Builds a House in NM", it was a different process as you had a yard of fabric in the center, then did the border before you started the design which is hand applique, everything on the quilt is part of that journey.



My nephew and wife have 4 children and for each I made a baby quilt, they had a house fire and Noelle was able to save all four quilts (by now the kids were no longer young) she washed and sun dried the quilts many times to get the smoke smell out. They still treasure these baby quilts even though 3 of the kids are now in college! I have a doll quilt my grandmother made, she wasn't a quilter so never asked her how this happened but I treasure it in my SM Studio.

So quilting is my passion and my husband and I are also avid bike riders, (just the two of us, to groups) we have ridden across the US, both Coasts, Mississippi river from head waters to New Orleans, Erie Canal, Ice Fields Parkway out to East Glacier, I could go on and on as it has been a wonderful way to see the world and a reminder that there are lots of very nice people wherever you go.

Westside Quilters - Virtual Quarterly Meeting - August 7, 2021

<u>President</u>: Marianne Simpson welcome everyone, including a few new members, to WQ's quarterly meeting. Sally Wright moved and Luann Jaffe seconded to accept the minutes from the May 1 meeting and the membership passed the resolution.

<u>Vice President:</u> Barbara Marom-Pollack urged everyone to consider volunteering to serve on the Executive Board next year.

<u>Membership</u>: Luann reminded all that anyone who does not renew by August 31 will be dropped from the membership roll. 65 members have renewed so far.

<u>Programs</u>: Pat Karasick said the September 4th speaker will be Beth Sullivan who will speak about different ways to make t-shirt quilts.

<u>Philanthropy</u>: Lisa Drew reported on the June virtual sew-in - everyone made pillowcases to donate. She also mentioned that the committee had rolls of Minky if anyone wanted to use it for backing. There will be donations to Para Los Ninos and Upward Bound later this year.

<u>Newsletter:</u> Debbie Nussbaum welcomes any articles a WQ member would like to submit - have you visited a great quilt shop, learned a new technique, attended an interesting class? Write an article about it!

<u>Website:</u> Everything is up to date on the website. Sally asks if anyone posts quilts on social media to use hashtags to promote our group. #westsidequilterslosangeles is an example.

Quilters' Showcase: A small one this month. Roberta Walley - Star quilt in red, white & blue; Sally Wright - two small quilts from the National Quilt Museum's block of the month, two golf-themed Minky baby quilts, along with matching hats, another baby quilt for a baby due this month.

Demonstration: Pat demonstrated how to sew a holder for an IPad/iPhone.

<u>Prize Drawing:</u> Mac MacNamara donated a quilt to WQ after his workshop/presentation in February 2020. A drawing was held for the quilt or a free workshop at this quarterly meeting. Nancy Kawahara won the workshop and Sally Madsen won Mac's quilt.

Featured Speaker: Norene Skiles talk was about the website Spoonflower and how to use it, both to create your own fabric, sell your designs, or to purchase others' (including a way to get a half yard instead of the yard the site defaults to).

Spoonflower is located in Raleigh, North Carolina and prints fabric and wall paper on demand. You can buy 8" squares, fat quarters or yardage. The yardage is a true 42" fabric - it doesn't include the selvedge.

Norene spoke about how to use photos for fabric, using collage programs to import images to Spoonflower, make custom labels and order them on fat quarters, design your own fabric for memory quilts, and fill-a-yard (how to get 1/2 yard pieces of fabric instead of an entire yard). She also recommended ordering samples of the different fabrics Spoonflower stocks to get an idea of their qualities.

The site's Help button is a good thing to try if you have questions. There are design ideas, videos and patterns. And if you are interested in designing your own fabric the "Design and Sell" section is good to check out.

It was an interesting and informative talk.
