

As Quilters we need to plan PLAY TIME.



Westside Quilters presents a workshop with quilt artist and teacher

At a Saturday workshop popular Southern California teacher <u>Jean Impey</u> returns to WQ to give us her "Spider Web Quilts" Workshop. The Spider Web design is an old quilt block sometimes called a String Quilt. Jean has fallen in love with this design and continues to make it again and again, each time making it a bit differently. In this class, anything goes and everyone is successful. It's a bit of old-style quilting, mixing it up with the fascinating use of color and design and making it your own. We will start sewing almost immediately and Jean will teach techniques for accuracy and speed. Weave strips of fabric into a new quilt full of surprises. You will lose yourself into the rhythm of stitches and repetition while making a work of art. Make a quilt, make a pillow... it's all fun and colorful!

Bring your favorite fabrics and scraps whether it's contemporary, modern, traditional, hand dyes, tonal, batiks, or thimbleberries – it looks best when you throw in everything...." My first Spider Web

has over 280 different fabrics – not including the crazy pieced kites. It was so exciting that I have made more than a dozen more."

In this one-day class, you will have enough time to make a pillow and then if you love the process, you can continue on and make the whole quilt. Its fun, it's creative, and you'll learn techniques that you will continue to use on other quilts you make. There is a \$12.00 Kit Fee which includes your own Plexiglass Kite-Shaped Template.

Supply List

There is a \$12.00 Kit Fee which includes your own Plexiglass Kite-Shaped Template.

- Sewing Machine and Basic Supplies
 It's always best to test your machine before class. Bring your favorite 1/4" foot for piecing and your FMQ/Darning foot. Basic Sewing tools include the items you like to have when sewing... a seam ripper? LOL, stiletto, marking tools, pencils, spare bobbins, scissors, rulers, pins, spare sewing machine needles (70 sharps are my favorite) bring anything portable that makes you happy.
- IF YOU WANT TO MAKE A PILLOW: Bring a Zipper Foot for your Machine, for your pillow back - 22" of

Bring a Zipper Foot for your Machine, for your pillow back - 22" of selvage to selvage fabric (do not cut off the selvage) and a 20" pillow form (IKEA sells these for \$6.99)

• FABRICS

KITE SHAPES - Scraps of fabric (any size – all 100% cotton), in many different colors and patterns (for kite shaped crazy pieced parts) A charm pack works great for these crazy pieced kite shapes and provides some overall continuity

STRIPS - If you are making a traditional 7-ring spider web, you will need 1-1/2" strips... If you are making a 5-ring traditional spider web, you will need 2" strips. If you are making a "liberated" spider web, bring scraps. If you don't know, just bring fabric and we can make that decision together.

- 50W Cotton Thread Neutral colored cotton thread for piecing
- Muslin

We use muslin for your foundation. You will need four 11" x 11" squares, to start with for this class. If you are making something other than a pillow, you may want to contact me and talk about what size muslin squares you would want to start with.

- June Tailor's Shape Cut JT-796 This is a must for squaring up your blocks. After this class, you will use it to square up everything.
- June Tailor's Grid Marker (JT-717)
 I highly recommend this tool for marking your muslin
- OPTIONAL: 20 x 30" foam core board

We use it for a portable design wall. When space is limited, it gives you a place to work with your designs; it doesn't have to be new or fancy.

- OPTIONAL: A special "dead blow" hammer made of resilient plastic used to flatten seams and joints in quilting A dead blow hammer is a specialized mallet helpful in minimizing damage to the struck surface and in controlling striking force with minimal rebound from the struck surface. The minimal rebound is helpful in avoiding accidental damage to precision work, especially in tight locations. Its material is used and does not damage fabric.

 - Seams Perfect's "Wacker"

This class is appropriate for the absolute beginner or the quilter with some experience who wants to improve their free motion quilting. Learn to free motion quilt in a supportive and fun atmosphere. Jenny will bring numerous quilts, photos and samples to illustrate what is taught in class. Jenny will be teaching this November at IQF Huston.

We will work on 5 beautiful and fun motifs that you can put on your own quilts using your home sewing machine!

Jenny says "I think the biggest barrier to successful free motion quilting is the internal critical voice. If you can let go of that, you can successfully free motion quilt. Really all we're doing when we free motion quilt is using thread, fabric and machine to quilt-no big deal. Sometimes just being in a classroom can cramp your style-I know it does for



me! So my hope, my goal, is for my students to let go of that fear and that critical voice and just have fun with it. So what if your class sample is not that great-you're learning something new and it may take a while."

About Jenny Lyon:

I have been joyfully teaching the art of quilting since 2006. My classes are encouraging, supportive, and light-hearted. I love seeing my students realize that they CAN quilt their own work on a domestic machine. I teach regionally, at various guilds, at IQF Houston and Chicago and throughout the US.

I have been working with fabric since I was a little girl trying to make my own clothes. I hail from a long line of traditional bed quilt makers, but I didn't take a formal class in quilting until 1983. I "re-entered" quilting in 1999 and that one class unleashed a **'need'** to create that has not stopped.

I use my domestic sewing machine to create art quilts and wearable art. I love to watch my machine stitches create line, texture and shadow as they merge on the surface of the fabric. My work has been juried into the Houston International Quilt Festival, Pacific International Quilt Festival, AQS in Paducah, the Curitiba Quilt Show in Brazil, and has shown in several art galleries as well as SAQA exhibits. Some of my work is held by private collectors.

I live in Northern California with my oh-so-patient hubby and our Basset boy. Our two grown sons have left the nest to become men, leaving more room for books, fabric and notions.

My current work is centered around whole-cloth pieces, with intricate free-hand free-motion quilting. Because there is little or no piecing, the story is told through the line of the thread. I consider this work to be "sculpting" the fabric, since the stitches create line and shadow upon the quilt's surface.

I call myself the Quilt Skipper because once while quilting my own quilt, I was so delighted by the unexpected beauty of it and what emerged from my needle, that I found myself cheerfully skipping around the house when I took my breaks. It is a joy to create art with free motion quilting.

SUPPLY LIST

Machine--in good working order. Bring the one you will really work with at home if possible.
 Manual for machine. Please know how to set up your machine for free motion before class by reading your manual.

□ Free Motion or Darning foot for your machine-- open--toed is best. Bring a closed toe darning foot if that's what you have. The foot usually has a spring on it. You do need this for the class--if you're not sure, please call your machine's dealer to make sure you have the correct one.

□ Put the free motion foot on your machine before you come and lower the needle to make sure it fits and works with your machine. Your quilt sandwich should move freely under a lowered presser foot. I want to make sure you have the right one!

□ 6--8 quilt "sandwiches". Exact size is not important but they should be about 14" square or so--1 5/8 yds of fabric will yield 6 sandwiches. Fabric should be solid or near solid so that you can see your stitches. Your sandwiches will have 3 layers: fabric, batt, fabric. A thin cotton batt works best. Put a few pins in just to hold it together.

□ Blue wash out marker or white marker if your fabric is dark.

Quality thread, preferred 50 weight or higher (higher number=thinner thread) (Aurifil, Mettler are good). If you're going to go buy thread for class, I would suggest Aurifil 50 weight--it behaves well.
 Wound bobbin (same thread choices as above).

□ One extra bobbin--empty.

□ Size 80/12 needles for your machine--topstitch preferred; the new titanium coated ones are even better--they last longer.

□ Scissors or snips.

□ 4 paper towels (I'll explain!)

□ Pencil/paper for taking notes and practicing motifs--unlined is much better than lined.

Any other notions that you like to use for free motion quilting

Bring only if you already have (don't rush out and buy them):

□ The bed extender that came with your machine if you have one. Or, bring your Sew Steady table if you have one.

□ Teflon machine bed cover such as Supreme Slider (makes the bed of your machine slippery so that your quilt sandwich moves more smoothly).

□ Straight stitch throat plate.

Quilting gloves of your choice--no, you don't have to have them but it can help!


MEMBERSHIP

Calls for Entry

Continuing our notifications for ways to display your quilts and textile pieces to a wider audience... Entering shows is not difficult, but to begin here are a few guidelines:

- Always make sure you read everything in the call including the calendar, requirements, rules, etc. Especially the rules! Will save headaches and disappointment later on.
- Keep a record on your entries so you won't be caught with a quilt needing to go two places at once. Having to remove a quilt from a show or exhibit because you misread the exhibition dates is a no-no. Ask me how I know...
- Having a great photo of your quilt straight on, in focus, not on a bed or held up showing hands and feet, super important. There is lots of great info on quilt photography on line. Google!
- Don't be intimidated or depressed by a rejection! There are lots of different reasons why a quilt doesn't fit into a specific show. It is usually not because your quilt is bad!

Quilting Green, By Pat Karasick

I like Starch! But, I don't want to add hydrocarbons, compassed gases and volatile organic compounds to the air contributing to smog so I make my own starch and spray basting solution.

Homemade starch recipe

Boil 1 cup water, Mix 1 Tablespoon of cornstarch with 1 cup cold water. Add to hot water, mix well Add one shot of vodka You may want to add more water if you want a lighter starch finish. Optional: add aromatic oil: Lavender or jasmine Put into a spray bottle. Easy, just a couple of minutes and pennies.

Tips: Spray back of fabric, allow to sink in before pressing

Ironing without steam is supposed to extend your iron's life

Homemade Spray Basting Solution

Put ½ teaspoon salt into 1 cup of water, heat to boiling Remove from heat Mix 3-4 Tablespoons of flour in 1cup cold water, mix well or shake in a container Add to salty water, whisk over low heat until mixture thickens to a glue-like consistency Cool Add 1 cup rubbing alcohol.

Using a funnel pour into a spray bottle.

To use: Lay out backing, spray Add batting, iron Spray batting Spread out top, iron again Viola, you have a quilt sandwich. I like this best for small projects. No need to spray outside, but you do need to protect the surface that you are spraying on.

<u>Out of the Attic and Onto the Catwalk</u> a May 10, 2018 NY Times article by Max Berlinger states "Quilts have been rediscovered yet again; the fashion world's love affair has hit a fever pitch." Calvin Klein showed classic American quilt motifs in its fall 2018 collection, including in dresses and men's shirts. Evoking traditional craftsmanship and the comforts of home, quilts have made their presence all over the fashion landscape of late, especially in high-end men's wear. Prices reach into the thousands.

Designer Emily Bode says there is a physical and emotional comfort from quilts that resonate with her customers, who pay \$1,500 for her one-of-a-kind boxy jackets made from dead-stock or found fabrics. Quilts are also highly personal, said Amelia Peck, a curator of American decorative arts at the Metropolitan Museum of Art. "Quilts are interesting because people can put their own spin on them," she said.

While quilts have been documented all around the world, the form blossomed in America as the cotton industry exploded in the mid-1800s.

Quilts enjoyed a comeback in the late 1960s. "It was very much linked to outsider hippie culture and going back to the land, so it had a political message," Ms. Peck said.

If you had run in to me in 1970 I might have been wearing my red, white & blue patchwork long skirt, similar to the one pictured at the left. Remember the print fabrics of the time? Thought I was so stylish, loved that long skirt paired with custom handmade leather flat sandals, the type with a toe loop! And, the skirt probably was my first patchwork project.

Westside Quilters Executive Board Meeting Minutes

Westside Quilters (WQ) Executive Board met at Sally Wright's home on July 7, 2018. President Roberta Walley called the meeting to order at 10:00 a.m.

<u>President:</u> Roberta called for a motion to approve the June 2nd Board meeting minutes. After correcting the spelling of two names, Sally Wright made the motion, Brenda Gottfried seconded it, and the minutes were accepted by voice vote of the Board.

The Board then discussed Sandra Bruce's Material Matrix class: "Wake Up Cup". Board members who had taken the class felt that Sandra answered questions thoughtfully, was well prepared and patient. They liked beginning to sew right away, and that Sandra topped off the workshop with a trunk show of her work.

<u>Vice-President</u>: Sonja will be attending the SCCQG meeting on 'The Business of a Quilt Guild' next week. She welcomed others to attend with her. Karynn noted that Sonja's trip would be a reimbursable expense.

<u>Treasurer</u>: Karynn indicated that WQ's June 26th balance was \$8,671.94. Checks for future venues have been taken care of. There may be a reimbursement from St. Andrews which will be worked out in the future. She noted that Roberta has been successfully added to WQ's account.

<u>Membership</u>: Luann indicated we have 60 members. She will be sending a note to those who have not yet renewed. The Membership form was in the June Newsletter and is on the website.

Website: Sally W. has updated the website with photos from Sandra Bruce's Wake Up Cup" workshop.

<u>Newsletter</u>: Board members commended Debbie for a "Great" Newsletter. Presentation and graphics evoked especially positive comments. Debbie will notify members when articles are due for the August newsletter.

<u>Philanthropy</u>: The Philanthropy team will be handling the August fabric sale with the help of members. If there is fabric left over, Luann and Kathryn will be able to store it. WQ was notified by a lady who has fabric to donate. Perla will visit her and determine whether it is fabric our members can use, and will get it to the sale. There is also a Husqvarna-Viking sewing machine available. It was suggested that Sue Woods be contacted about the possibility of using that machine in her daughter's class. The Board recommended that an e-mail be sent to all members to remind them of the fabric sale and to encourage them to bring donation fabric early. The Board agreed that the suggested donation for the fabric would be \$2 per yard, as in previous years.

<u>Programs</u>: 1) Pat wanted to clarify that a minimum of \$600 paid to a speaker triggered the need to provide them with a W-9. Sally and others agreed. 2) Arrangements for Velda Newman's August visit were discussed. She will be staying with Roberta, and Pat will pick her up at the airport. The two-day workshop will be held at St. Albans. Sally will check out the availability of tables, and if necessary, will request that they be moved to the room downstairs that WQ will use. The Board agreed that \$30 can be paid to have that done. It was also recommended that workshop attendees be reminded to carpool, as parking is difficult at St. Alban's. 3) The fee for Jean Impey's spiderweb workshop in September was revised to reflect the \$300 subsidy voted by the Board in June. The revised fee is \$45 for members who register early, 1 month in advance, \$50 for registration after that deadline, and \$65 for non-members. 4)There was a discussion about how to handle workshops that are under subscribed. It was recommended that advertising to other guilds be fully explored before cancellation of a workshop is considered.

Future Business: No specific items were identified.

WQ's July 7th Board meeting ended at 11:45 a.m. The next Board Meeting will be August 11, 2018 at Sally's home.
