Laura says "I combine vivid fabrics and whimsical stories to make pictorial art quilts. My colorful, hand-dyed fabrics inspire me, as do stories of my family, friends, and home. These pieces often chronicle my life. Each wall piece I make is of my own design, of fused appliquéé, and machine quilted. Creating with fused fabric allows my work to be joyful, organic, and more inventive. It is the most direct route from a design idea in my head to the realization of that idea in fabric. The art of quilting gives me the freedom to express myself and play at the same time. It's the best job in the world!"

Laura's teaching is done with style, verve and humor, plus a little music. After all, she is the Dean of Corrections of the Chicago School of Fusing!

You'll also enjoy her presentation on Saturday August 5th, at our Quarterly Meeting "I Quilt, Therefore, I am".

Southern California's own Tina Curran will join us for a special Saturday workshop quilt project she will be debuting for Westside Quilters "At The Beach". You remember that she came to us a while ago and talked about her Christmas Flag quilt that

was featured in Quilters Newsletter - well she has come up with something equally charming and vibrant. "At The Beach" It is her latest quilt. Each umbrellas is sewn and then appliquéd on top of a block of four beach towels (with sand in-between them). The blocks end up in the quilt at 6-1/2" x 6-1/2". This quilt finishes at 31" x 38-1/2".

Of course with additional blocks and/or increasing the size of the blocks, it could be as big as you might want. This will be a lively quilt to remember summer 2017 and a jumpstart on a quilt to display next year!

#### **About Tina:**

"10 colors don't work, but 100 do." - Freddy Moran, famous quilter and one of her favorites

"My interest in making art quilts was jump-started by seeing my dear friend Sara take a variety of patterned fabrics, cut them into pieces and combine them in such an artistic way. As a life-long sewer (having experienced my first sewing triumph with a skating skirt I made in Girl Scouts), I took to quilting quickly. One of the great thrills with this art form is that my options are as infinite as those of a painter working on canvas -- landscapes, portraits, geometric patterns, abstract impressions, etc. I enjoy both the deep American roots of traditional quilting and the unlimited possibilities today's art quilts present. Combining elements of both extremes is great fun, as I often use contemporary fabrics in century-old quilt patterns. "

Tina's art quilts have been on display in multiple art shows and quilt shows as well as in national quilt magazines ("Quilters Newsletter" magazine and "Quiltmaker") over 20 times and in three books (including Ricky Tims' "Kool Kaleidoscopes").

While I have no formal art training, I have taken some wonderful classes over the years. However I know my greatest learning has come in the over 10,000 hours I've spent making more than 125 art quilts to date. And it's exciting to realize that there seems to be no end to this learning curve. "

### PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

Summer schedule, full swing. Lovely sunny mornings, slower pace with time for relaxed reading, staycations and of course quilting.

I want to escape the daily and political news of our modern days. So I decided to return to reading a classic. One that has young hopeful heroes, humor and adventure, so I am reading *The Three Musketeers* by Alexandre Dumas. Of course I realized pretty quickly there is a lot of political intrigue here especially between the Cardinal and the King, but historically it's far enough removed to be entertaining and a delightful summer read.

My creative reading involves reading and journaling. I am reading and following *Creative Strength Training* by Jane Dunnewold. One of the first exercises is "Working With Memory". She asks a series of questions regarding the first cloth in memory. My grandma Alma made clothing for me. She lived on the East coast and I didn't get to see her often, my connection to her was the cloth she sent me. Some of my memories are from photographs with me wearing the dresses. One photo shows me wearing a burgundy corduroy jumper with my name hand embroidered on front in gold thread. To this day I have a small stash of corduroy that I try to put into my quilts. Another photo memory is an Easter dress that was hot pink, bright yellow and lime green. The photo brings back a physical memory of the fabulous reversible cape she made to go along with it in bright yellow and hot pink jersey, I loved that cape! A memory, with no photo to back it up, was a quilted reversible vest. Navy calico on one side and red floral on the other, with navy blue gross grain ribbon ties. I was eleven, entering a new middle school in the early 1970's, in southern California and trust me when I tell you a quilted vest wasn't cool, but I loved that piece and think my love for making quilts today was inspired by my grandmas handmade cloth gifts, cool or not.

At our last Board meeting, our new Newsletter editor, Debbie Nussbaum thought it might be a good idea to have members submit articles for the newsletter. I think that's a great idea and so if you would like to start with something small just by answering the same question, "What is the first cloth in your memory?", you can email your reply to me, maybe just a sentence or two and we can use them in next month's newsletter, It would be fun to see all the ways fabric, fiber, and textiles have influenced us all.

### PHILANTHROPY

Hello, WQ Members.

We hope you will be as excited as we are about supporting two new organizations worthy of your hard work: Upward Bound Family Place (transitional housing for homeless families) and A Child's Dream (www.achildsdream-ca.org) (servicing low income families). I hope you will join Virginia Marshall, Lisa Drew and myself, Perla Rothenberg, in creating fun and exciting quilts for these two organizations.

**Upward Bound Family Place** is an outreach program connected to United Methodist Church in Santa Monica which helps families transition from homelessness into shelter. These are families that would appreciate quilts in all sizes but would especially appreciate twin or larger sized quilts.

**A Child's Dream** holds two yearly distribution programs to assist poverty level families. One distribution program is held in August to help with a child's school needs and the other distribution is in December to help the entire family celebrate the holiday with dignity and love. Since we are quilters, A Child's Dream will take all quilt sizes and would particularly like quilts for babies, toddlers and older children, along with receiving blankets for babies (a chance to use your flannel), and for those who want to use their knitting/crocheting skills, hats of all sizes.

At our August 5 General meeting, we will have different kits available for pick-up to assist you in getting started:

- 1. Pre-cut packages of a simple quilt top (pattern will be included!).
- 2. Paper blocks with fabric center strip provided to create strip piecing blocks. We would like WQ members to <u>use the strip provided as their center diagonal strip</u> and ask that members finish these blocks off with their own scrap fabric strips. Please return the blocks **uncut** and we will trim them down to the size needed.
- 3. We are the lucky recipients of 19 <u>donated</u> quilts tops which need to be quilted (we will provide batting for some of the tops) but we are asking WQ members to provide a backing. The tops range in size from 40"x45" to 60"x60". If you can take one or more of these donated quilt tops, add a backing, quilt it and add binding, it would be greatly appreciated.

In early November, when we celebrate philanthropy day (date/place to be announced soon), we hope to see many of the strip blocks, pre-cut kits and completed "donated" quilts tops returned. We hope to see many WQ members on that day to continue to join, pin and bind more quilts.

We will continue to support the small 16"x16" quilts for **Dollies Making a Difference** as we know many WQ members enjoy making the small quilts. I know I have several more in my sewing room that I want to complete.

We will also continue supporting **Wounded Warriors quilts** for anyone who has an unfinished quilt that they would like to complete or perhaps start a new one?

We look forward to a very fruitful year! Thank you for continuing to support the Philanthropy Committee and all its worthy causes.

# Calls for entry

I've long hoped that more WQ members would consider entering their work in both national and local quilt shows and exhibits. Sharing your work with the world outside of your own family and acquaintances can be very meaningful. The goal need not be winning a prize, but experiencing the acceptance and the feedback for your work. To that end I'm beginning a monthly column in this newsletter listing upcoming opportunities to show your work.

Entering shows is not difficult, but to begin here are a few guidelines:

- Always make sure you read everything in the call including the calendar, requirements, rules, etc. Especially the rules! Will save headaches and disappointment later on.
- Keep a record on your entries so you won't be caught with a quilt needing to go two places at once.
   Having to remove a quilt from a show or exhibit because you misread the exhibition dates is a no-no.
   Ask me how I know.
- Having a great photo of your quilt straight on, in focus, not on a bed or held up showing hands and feet super important. There is lots of great info on quilt photography on line. Google!
- Don't be intimidated or depressed by a rejection! There are lots of different reasons why a quilt doesn't fit into a specific show. It is usually not because your quilt is bad!








Additionally, there is an exhibit of old guilts in the American Gallery, always inspirational.

# 2017 Westside Quilters Quarterly General Meeting May 13, 2017

Westside Quilters (WQ) spring quarterly meeting was opened by President Kim Ryan on Saturday, May 13, 2017. New members and visitors were welcomed by Kim, and the minutes of the February 4, 2017 quarterly meeting, previously printed in WQ's Newsletter, were approved by acclamation.

Vice President Debbie Nussbaum then introduced the following nominees Officers for election to the open offices of Westside Quilters Executive Board:

Vice President -- Sonja Daniel Membership -- Luann Jaffe Treasurer --- Karynn Ditmar Newsletter -- Debbie Nussbaum Philanthropy -- Perla Rothenberg, Lisa Drew, Virginia Marshall

There were no further nominations and the nominees were duly elected to the Westside Quilters Executive Board by a voice vote.

Outgoing Treasurer, Patti Post, said that WQ's workshops have done well. They are not money makers, but they "break even." The overall budget estimate is close to \$14,000 and will be published in WQ's June newsletter.

Our members continue to impress WQ's Philanthropy chairs with their generosity. All quilts donated will be delivered to the intended charities. Our new Philanthropy chairs will be reviewing and perhaps adding new charities to WQ's list.

Sally Wright encouraged members to sign up for upcoming workshops including Sylvia Davis on June 10th, Laura Wasilowski on August 4, and Tina Curran on September 16th.

During a break, while members conversed and looked over items on display, Kathryn Pellman demonstrated the changes that can be made to fabric with added stitching.

Member Stephania Bommarito alerted WQ to the *Emerging Light* special exhibit being collected for the 2018 Road to California show, and encouraged everyone to check out the requirements on the SCCQG website.

Our Showcase Speakers, Roberta Walley and Sally Wright took us on a photo journey with them as they adventured into Japan for a two week textile trip to Tokyo and Kyoto this past January. They were treated to museums, indigo dyeing and the World's Largest Quilt Show. We were glad to be given this opportunity to see another side of the fabric and quilting world.

Show and Tell gave us another chance to see what members are creating: Luann Jaffe -- Untitled in browns; Marianne Simpson -- Ribbons using orange, yellows and greens, Warm Wishes in burgundy and pink, and Stacked Blocks in grays and reds; Karynn Dittmar -- Geraldine, giraffe in multi-pieced style; Bobbi Leung -- Cone flower, oranges and yellows, Ocean - multi-colored; Stephanie Wexler -- Disappearing Pinwheel, multicolor; Virgina Marshall -- Grace Errea workshop morning glories; Debbie Nussbaum -- Into the Woods, confetti style using a photo of her grandchildren; Kathryn Pellman -- Five Calls a Week, real and imagined; Barbara Maram-Pollack -- Jellyfish, blue/multi; Diane Marks -- Orange Crazy Quilt, orange/yellow; Sally Wright -- Huan Shrine, Rabbit, Circles; Perla Rothenberg -- 18 fat quarters, 3 City of Hope Quilts; Lisa Drew -- Circles from Kathy Moore's class; Lita Greenberg -- Child's giraffe, orange green and yellow, Village in raw edge style; Evi Newman -- baby quilt for philanthropy.

Westside Quilters featured speaker, Rami Kim, had everyone laughing and watching wide-eyed as she drew us into her life of ever expanding homes and interests leading, eventually, to quilts and clothing. Rami was taught Korean paper folding, "Chopkey", by her mother. She has used those skills in the fabric folding found in her quilts and clothing, with stunning effect. By the time the meeting ended, everyone was ready to attempt Chopkey.

The meeting adjourned at 12:15 p.m.
