Luke will guide us as we take old discarded clothing or just our

own stash and work organically to create a small quilt top. He will walk the class through a series of steps that will deconstruct and reconstruct fabric into something greater than the sum of its parts. We will be working with abstract forms and learning how to harness fabrics that may be a little outside of the normative quilting oeuvre."

## **PHILANTHROPY**

We're continuing to move forward in preparation for the November 7<sup>th</sup> workshop and thanks to many of you we have 14 children's quilts and 2 Wounded Warrior quilts "in progress". Additional donated squares that were received will be "matched up" for Wounded Warrior or the children's quilts. Of the fabric from the August sale we have been able to assemble some additional combinations, with larger pieces set aside to be used for backs; these will be available at the November workday.



<u>For the October meeting:</u> Please continue to bring completed squares, tops etc. **Batting is needed**. Wounded Warrior quilts need to have cotton batting. Cotton, cotton blend or poly may be used for the children's quilts (smaller pieces can be joined).

#### **PROJECT INFORMATION:**

1. <u>Wounded Warrior Project:</u> FOR SHARING/EXCHANGING: Create patriotic themed blocks (**finished block size 12"x12"**) that can be mixed and matched with other blocks for sampler style quilts or tops that finish 48" x 78". Wounded Warrior Quilts also need a pillowcase.

2. <u>Children's Quilts:</u> FOR SHARING/EXCHANGING: Bring blocks with a finished 5" center square (cut at



5 1/2") made from "kid friendly" fabric then surrounded by single 1" (cut 1 1/2" to allow for seam allowance) frame using a "smallish" print or solid color fabric. This assembled block will be **7 1/2"x7 1/2"**. These blocks may be shared/exchanged and mixed with other blocks to create quilt tops. If you prefer to complete a top it can be any "kid friendly" design – blocks, strips, panels, etc. Quilts should finish at  $36" \times 48"$  approximately.

NEEDS FOR A SUCCESSFUL WORKDAY:

- 1. Batting- 100% cotton and 80/20 blends are acceptable
- 2. Appropriate 100% cotton fabric for backing and finishing all the quilts
- 3. 2 <sup>1</sup>/<sub>2</sub>" binding folded and lightly pressed
- 4. This year we do not have access for the quilting to be done prior to the workshop. WQ members who are comfortable bringing sewing machines to the workshop to finish sewing quilts, adding the bindings and doing the quilting will be greatly appreciated.

At the November Workshop, we will assemble all pre-prepared quilts (you can bring these to the WQ meeting or contact one of us to arrange for pick-up), cut and piece tops, have ironing/pressing stations, binding assembly and binding sewing stations, all working together to make our time at the Workshop as productive as possible.

#### T shirt quilt

#### One member asked for help with a T shirt quilt. Here is my reply

T shirts are usually made of cotton jersey knit and the knit or stretch character is what scares quilters away. While I haven't sewn a quilt with only knit fabrics, I'm sure it can be done if one were careful not to pull or stretch the fabric. A far easier technique is to fuse the shirt with a lightweight interfacing then treat it just like a woven cotton. Cut and fuse a piece of the fusible larger than the area of the T shirt you want to use and trim it down to the desired area of the design. The trick comes in adjusting the blocks to a common size as the printing you want to preserve can be in all sizes. I have used "coping strips" as Sharyn Craig calls them, to increase the size of a small block up to a common size. (Sew strips around the block, log cabin style to grow the block size up). You can sew the T shirt blocks together or you can add sashing around the blocks to give the quilt a unifying look. If, there is an interesting logo or something on the sleeve, it might be used for a cornerstone. Any leftover blocks can go on the back.

A light polyester batting or no batting might be considered as this quilt can get heavy quickly. Use a 90/14 needle for quilting.

### **Sewing Chatter**

After a few years, my husband agreed that if the Monster was such a problem, I should replace it. Hallelujah. I bought a new P\_\_\_\_\_ that can stitch sleeping cats. It was hard to decide on various models and makes but being a cat person, the design cinched the decision.

I gave my old trusted Bernina to my daughter who learned to sew on it. She was happy to get it and sometimes sews. But I still own a Featherweight (FW), the monster, a new Pfaff, and a Brother 1200 (which only sews straight but can do it fast and is a favorite of mine for machine quilting). All but the FW are set up in two rooms, so with the issue of wasting thread every time I want to change thread color, I move to a different machine when possible. Remember, last month I said the monster won't sew for awhile if I back out the top thread. Always cut the thread at the spool and remove the old thread out the needle. I could sometimes cheat by changing only the bobbin thread and have that be the finish side of whatever I was sewing (Being careful to match cotton to cotton or poly to poly --per previous column).

How many machines do you use or own? What machine is your choice to take to workshops? Sometimes, a class requires a blanket stitch or zigzag and the old FW won't do. #### WESTSIDE QUILTERS QUARTERLY GENERAL MEETING -AUGUST 15, 2015

The general meeting of Westside Quilters (WQ) was held on August 15, 2015 at St. John's Presbyterian Church.

**Introductory Remarks:** President Perla Rothenberg brought the meeting to order at 10.05 am welcoming everyone. Kathy Strelioff was introduced as a new member and guests were welcomed. Perla encouraged shopping at the fabric giveaway and registering for workshops during the break.

**Minutes:** A motion to pass the minutes of the May 25<sup>th</sup>, 2015 meeting was made by Perla, and seconded by Betsy Barker.

**Showcase Speaker:** Sally Wright showed a selection of beautiful art quilts from the Studio Art Quilt Associates' 25<sup>th</sup> anniversary travelling trunk show. SAQA is an active and dynamic organization with over 3000 members worldwide. There are 407 10x7 inch art quilts in the trunk show, created by artists from all over the world. These are divided into 8 trunks and we were able to view the 50 quilts that are travelling around California and Nevada. SAQA has annual conferences and regional meetings that include show and tell, talking about art, and members helping each other with advice and critiques. There is a website: SAQA.com where more information can be found. Another Westside Quilters member, Sherry Kleinman also spoke about how inspirational SAQA is and it being an exciting place to meet and talk to fellow art quilters online and in person. The annual SAQA benefit auction is currently online.

**Treasurer:** The current bank balance is \$6090. Members have very generously donated \$1695 so far and this has exceeded the original \$1200 projection.

**Membership**: Karynn Dittmar reported that approximately 75 members have renewed so far. The new roster will soon be on the website, non-renewing members will be removed from the roster. Members were asked to renew at the meeting if they had not already done so.

**Programs:** Sally Wright talked about the exciting workshops the Guild has coming up. A color brochure was available listing future programs confirmed through June of 2017. In September Larene Smith will teach "Jammin' Jelly Sensations", Mark Lipinski visits in October. His workshop teaches his "Stars and Stripes" quilt and he will lecture at the Quarterly General Meeting on his "Slow Stitching Movement". In February there will be a Luke Haynes "Clothing to Quilts" workshop and he will present his lecture "ArchQUILTexture" at the February meeting. In March we have Kathryn Pellman's "Fashionistas: Paper Dolls for Grown Ups" workshop, and in April Cindy Myers, a certified Judy Neimeyer" instructor, teaches her techniques with a paper pieced "Cactus Star" pattern. Jerry Granata will host his workshop "Quilting with Unusual Fabrics" in May and will talk at the General Meeting about "The Man-tality of Quilting". In June, Kay Kahn will teach her "Quilted Jewelry" workshop. There will be a two-day Lura Schwarz Smith workshop in August and she will present her lecture "New Journeys of an Art Quilter". In September 2016, Latifah Saafir will teach her "Glam Clam" quilt. Jan Krentz 's workshop "Lone Star" will be in October and she will talk at the Quarterly Meeting. In February 2017, there will be a Marcia Stein workshop "Photo to Fabric" and lecture "It Helps to Have a Camera: Finding

Photographic Subjects and Using Them in Your Quilts". Cathie Hoover will teach "Intersecting Rings" in March and in April, Grace Errea will teach "Heat Set Machine Applique". There will be a Rami King workshop and lecture in May 2017 and in June, Sylvia Davis will teach a workshop.

Roberta Walley thanked Kathryn Pellman and Fred Zerez for the slide show highlighting the upcoming programs. Roberta asked for members' support in signing up for classes to keep top speakers and workshops coming to Westside Quilters. Kathryn Pellman asked members to complete the workshop feedback survey they had received.

**Philanthropy:** Sue Woods reported that the information posted in the newsletter regarding the children's philanthropy quilts was incorrect. A flyer containing the corrected version, along with requests for what to bring to both the October meeting and the November workshop, was available at the meeting. Nominations for recipients of a scholarship for one of the WQ workshops were requested. Sue talked about the upcoming Philanthropy workshop; baby quilts will need to be quilted ready for binding. There is a basket with donated fabrics available to take home and prepare blocks or quilt tops for the workshop.

**Show and Tell:** Cathy Seidman showed her elephant applique quilt; Pepper Libow, her disappearing hour glass quilt and a Kaffe Fassett kit quilt; Mary Ann Sereth a Matisse inspired Grace Errea quilt; Bobbi Leung a Wounded Warrior quilt and 2 rows of her "Row by Row" quilt. Guest, Melissa Wilkins showed her "Row by Row" quilt as did Carollee Schuegraf whose quilt won her a prize of 40 fat quarters. Carollee also showed a Wounded Warrior quilt and "Storm at Sea". Kathryn Pellman showed "Love Wins" and "Midnight at the Oasis"; Kim Ryan, her art quilt "Hip Hip Hooray". Sally Wright, Roberta Walley and Marianne Simpson shared their projects from the Jane Tenorio-Coscarelli workshop. Sally showed "Red Caboose BBQ" and her entry for SAQA – "Zerzura". Marianne also showed her project from the Irena Bluhm workshop. Evi Neumann shared a philanthropy quilt. Sherry Kleinman showed "Still Life Pigeon" and an abstract quilt inspired by a class she took with Elizabeth Busch. Debbie Nussbaum showed her family quilt that was inspired by Sherry Kleinman. Tanya Heldman shared "Separation Anxiety", her own published pattern that she is teaching at Sew Modern. Lita Greenberg showed a philanthropy quilt.

**Featured Speaker:** Roberta introduced our featured speaker, Irena Bluhm, and thanked her for a fun class the day before.

Irena presented her lecture "A Quilter's Life in a Whirlwind of Events" and shared many of her wonderful quilts. Irena was born in Communist Poland in 1948 and lived there until she moved to West Germany in 1981. She is fluent in 7 languages and learnt how to sew and made a living from sewing in Poland.

Irena moved to the US in 1991, initially moving to the Mojave Desert and then Oklahoma, where she worked with her Chiropractor husband and tried many hobbies. Irena tried to make a living through her art but found this difficult until she discovered long arm quilting. Without any prior experience she began working, initially for free while she trained, in her local quilt shop. Frustrated with having to wait for more work she purchased her own machine and started a business, taking samples of her free motion work to guilds. Irena dreamt about entering one of her quilts in a show and her first entry was accepted, won second place for long arm quilting and subsequently received 17 ribbons. Irena talked about her process when making a quilt. She explained techniques and the importance of design, visual impact and workmanship. Irena began teaching at shows in 2006 and has had numerous books published.

Perla thanked Irena Bluhm and the meeting was adjourned at 12.48.
