The Executive Board of Westside Quilters is pleased to introduce you to our new Board of Directors. These kind friends have agreed to serve as advisors in their areas of expertise and in the furtherance of the mission of Westside Quilters – and without remuneration of any kind. Patrick H. Ela is an Accredited Senior Appraiser of the American Society of Appraisers. Patrick has Studio Art and Art History degrees from Occidental College and an MBA from UCLA. After curatorial experience at three museums, he became Director of the Craft and Folk Art Museum,1975-1996. Since 1984, Patrick has been an art advisor and consultant and has organized more than 140 exhibitions of contemporary art for museums, art centers, corporations, institutions and commercial galleries. Patrick's community involvement includes service on the boards of the Sam and Alfreda Maloof Foundation, the Millicent Rogers Museum in Taos, New Mexico, the Friends of the Schindler House. He's also served on numerous grant panels for the National Endowment for the Arts, Institute of Museum Services, California Arts Council, the Los Angeles Cultural Affairs Department, and more. He's a lecturer and a traveler. He has a special affinity for graphics, local artists, textiles and quilts.

Barbara Harrison has been a resident of Santa Monica since 1978 having transferred from the Washington DC/Maryland area. The relocation was job-related, as she worked with the Veterans Administration and became the Director of the newly established Western Region Office of Inspector General. In 1988 Barbara accepted a position with a local non-profit social service agency as Director of its transportation and mobility program. For 21 years this position provided Barbara with many opportunities to embrace and implement critical services which enhanced the lives and independence of Santa Monica seniors and persons with disabilities. Barbara claims to be limited in her own artistic skills although she excelled in dressmaking and arts and crafts through college. She remains an avid knitter, and enjoys making Prayer Shawls and other items to be donated for use by others most in need. Barbara says, "I believe that no talent is too small to use in benefiting others. The work that is generated should be displayed for all to see and to share in honoring the blessings bestowed upon each person."

Fred M. Zeres grew up in Hollywood (Hollywood High 1977) and found that two subjects interested him in high school – Math and Art. Along with Math came computers and the very first programming language. He painted in oil and did well enough to win awards. At UCLA he explored Physics, Chemistry, Biology and Psychology before earning a degree in Math/Computer Science. He went to work for the Southern California Gas Company and simultaneously earned a master's degree in Computer Science from USC. He even collaborated on a computer programming book published by Random House, and taught at UCLA Extension. In 1991 Fred became Manager of the Information Systems Group at the Gas Company but he decided to leave to create his own computer consulting company. After five years, Fred down-sized the consulting company and began working for one of his clients, Transamerica Investment Management in Information Technology. Fred is still available through his consulting company, Mouse Domain. Fred says that he loves art and music, and is fascinated by the art of quilting, and the extraordinary beauty that is created by its practitioners.

HERE'S WHAT YOU DIDN'T KNOW ABOUT TANNER'S SEWING & VACUUM CENTER

Editor's Note: This is a brief profile of one our local vendors. Periodically we'll feature those retail establishments that enable us to keep quilting. Your suggestions for subjects for future profiles will be appreciated.

Tanner's is located at 6230 West 87th Street in Westchester (Los Angeles 90045), 310/670-2429, website www.tannersewandvac.com. (You can sign up for the Tanner's newsletter by going to the website.) The owner is Ian Gittins. Those are the basics.

The story is about how Ian went to work at Tanner's 28 years ago, how he purchased the store outright in 1989, how he purchased his building in 2007, and that he's become a fixture in our sewing machine scene in Southern California. Ian has been a good friend to all local guilds. He services all brands of sewing machines, and is a dealer for Husqvarna Viking, Pfaff, BabyLock and Singer. Also vacuums and even Miele appliances. He carries Sulky rayon and cotton blended thread, Robinson Anton rayon and cotton/poly thread, and Mettler threads.

You don't know Tanner's unless you know his staff. There's Jackie and Lisa – teachers, and of course Johnny. Teri Gittins is the software and machine embroidery expert. Check out their website for classes. They block out time for "help and assist" sessions unrelated to classes. Tanner's also is well known for their sessions for young, teen sewers and beginning children's sewing camps.

When asked about the most popular quilting sewing machines, Ian mentioned the Pfaff Expression series, the Viking Sapphire series, and the new Viking Ruby. BabyLock has a new Sashiko machine.

Ian and his staff can usually answer all your technical sewing machine questions. Beyond that, Ian collects Singer Featherweights, and builds remote control airplanes such as 1/5-th scale World War II war planes. In the store, hanging over the repair department, is an 84-inch wide wing span fuselage of some plane or other.

MINUTES OF THE

WESTSIDE QUILTERS EXECUTIVE BOARD MEETING

AUGUST 5, 2010

A meeting of the Executive Board of Westside Quilters ("WQ") was held on August 5, 2010, at the home of Sally Wright.

The following Directors were in attendance: Sally Wright, Tina Nord, Veronica Grey, Rosemary Dresser, Joann Killen, Madeline Ehrlich and Sandra Lauterbach.

Sally Wright called the meeting to order at 7:30pm and Sandra Lauterbach recorded the minutes. A quorum of Executive Board members was present.

Treasurer's Report: Tina Nord reported that:

- 1. Articles of Incorporation were approved as July 24, 2010 and are effective as of June 17, 2010.
- 2. WQ has a federal ID number:
- 3. All donations to WQ are fully tax deductible for first 27 months from incorporation of its existence even without tax exempt status approved;
- 4. Bank resolution is prepared;
- 5. Bylaws provide that unbudgeted amounts over \$300 must be approved by the board.
- WQ will open a bank account at Bank of America. Use of debit card once per month will cause monthly fee to be waived.
- 7. Tina will prepare an expense reimbursement form;
- 8. Final bylaws and form 1023 are in process. Package to IRS should include signed rental agreement, programming for next 12 months (tentative and definitive), and name probable charitable recipients of WQ;
- Proposed Budget attached hereto as Exhibit A was reviewed. WQ has a high membership fee and lower workshop fees. Intent is to have workshops pay for themselves. Approximately 8 workshops or events per year. Dues will pay for speakers and space rental.
- 10. Immediate payments that need to be made include: a)So. California Council of Quilt Guilds—benefit include insurance for WQ--\$30/yr plus \$2.75/member. Tina will estimate 50 members; b) reimburse Betsy Barker \$200 for domain name.

A motion to approve the bank resolution (a copy of which is attached hereto as Exhibit B) was approved unanimously. Tina proposed the motion to approve; Madeline seconded it.

Board of Directors and Appointed Directors: Sally stated that the federal 1023 application assumes a Board of Directors whose members are not related to the guild members. Sally recommended three directors: be Barbara Harrison (educational background), Fred Zerez (computer consultant), and Patrick Ela (fine arts appraiser and consultant).

Sally read the description of the responsibilities of the appointed positions of philanthropy and educational directors. She requested suggestions for the position of historian/photographer.

Membership: Veronica presented the membership form. It was reviewed and revised. The changes included: the term "active membership" will be changed to simply "Membership". Annual dues of \$50 were approved at the May 21, 2010 organizational meeting. The meaning of "general WQ service" was discussed. Tina will prepare language on this point for the Standing Rules which are attached to the bylaws and can be changed by the Executive Board.

Sally will email everyone on our contact list the membership form. Veronica proposed laminated name tags which might include special ribbons for officers and new members.

Programs: Rosemary discussed the tentative Program Schedule attached hereto as Exhibit C. The date for Fowler Museum has been changed to August 28, 2010. She is attempting to arrange a one hour docent tour from

11-12. UCLA is charging \$50 for docent, no admission fee. Sally said we will provide drinks and dessert. It will be a brown bag lunch. The Board agreed that if a docent tour is not possible the event will be cancelled.

The Board decided to cancel the proposed September workshop.

The cost for Carol Taylor's lecture at the October 9th meeting is \$550 plus approximately \$97 for the hotel; WQ may share airfare costs with the San Fernando Valley Quilt Association. Carol lecture is about "So many quilts so little time" lecture and will include a trunk show.

Tina moved that when guild members give a workshop they should be paid \$100. Rosemary seconded the motion. It was passed unanimously.

On February 12, 2011, Zena Thorpe will talk about women and their stories and present a trunk show. Reylene Salazar of Quilters Haven will not charge for her August presentation because she will bring retail items to sell.

Sally discussed the purchase of 2 quilt or photography stands per the budget.

Fundraising: Discussion on charging \$20 for the Fowler docent tour. If there is no docent, the event will be cancelled. Tina suggested asking if we can get a percentage discount at the gift shop.

Sally asked for fundraising ideas. The budget includes \$1250 income from a fundraiser. Ideas discussed included an opportunity quilt, a reception at an art gallery selling quilts donated by WQ members with an admission charge; selling tshirts, etc., with the WQ logo.

Website: Sally reported that WQ has a rudimentary website. Tina volunteered to write newsletters until a communications chair is appointed. Newsletter will be on the website and will be sent to paid members by the first of the month, but at least 2 weeks before a quarterly meeting.

Promotion: Joann presented the final logo version. She will have 4 format files ready on Friday August 6. Ideas on ways to promote WQ included distributing WQ information to F&S, Tanner's, Candy's, Lincoln Fabrics, etc., via pamphlets and business cards. Joann will check out pricing for WQ business cards and larger size cards and will set up Facebook and Twitter accounts for WQ as well as on community calendars, etc.

Board Meeting: The next executive board meeting is scheduled for Saturday, September 25, 2010 at 1pm at the home of Sally Wright.

The Executive Board Meeting was adjourned at 10pm.
