LETTER FROM HOUSTON

A report on the International Quilt Festival, Houston, Texas 2014

One thinks BIG when thinking of Texas. So fittingly, this 40th Anniversary Quilt Show was Texas BIG! Forty years is the ruby anniversary, and as the convention center doors opened, we quilters were greeted by a display of quilt "rubies." Dozens upon dozens of red and white quilts, hung three levels high, similar to the NYC Armory Show a few years ago. While "awesome" fits, that is such an overused word. Perhaps "excitingly theatrical" is a more fitting description. The display was surrounded by dozens of miniature red and white pieces on adjacent aisles.



I arrived on Friday, and thanks to a dear Texas friend, went directly from the airport to the Convention Center in the faithful bus that made continuous round trips all day from our hotel. Since there are fewer guests at the show Friday evening, we wanted to catch a close-up glimpse of each big award winner. The \$10,000 first prizewinner hung proudly under a huge sign Handi Quilter Best of Show Award, "On This Winters Day" by Nancy Prince and quilted by Linda French. It seemed to be an interesting combination of photo processing, thread painting, and appliqué. Next to it hung two appliqué entries, one more ambitious than the other, claiming the \$7500 prizes for the Founders Award and eQuilter.








A personal favorite was our friend David Taylor's "Beneath My Wing" of a mother swan and her gosling. It claimed the \$5,000 Fairfield Master Award for Contemporary Artistry. For a view of all the winners, see www.quilts.org.



However, as the evening wore on and in the two days that followed, one wondered how just these few winners could be singled out. Our own Sally Wright's entry (left), "Down in the Grove" was so lovely and well done. As was this contemporary delight (right), "Dotting Inside the Box," by Sandi Snow, who took a first place in Art Abstract Small.



There were so many different categories, something for every taste and wish list. Some more examples are the familiar iconic photograph, "Worry," heavily thread-painted, by Virginia Greaves, and "Chasing Bubbles" by Hiroko Miyama (both right).

I should also mention the showstopper, "Frame of Mind" by Flora Joy. One quilt with three views—left, center and right (below).











Equally thrilling were entries that were finalists from Quilt Week Yokohama 2013; a series of art quilts inspired by just about every Beatles tune; quilts from Australia and Mexico; and Quilts de Legende, the French Guild's reproductions of antique quilts. All of which I have no memory!! There was sooo much to take in! Additionally, there was 300 entries from the book "500 Traditional Quilts," and nearly 150 masterpieces from the Studio Art Quilters, none of which one could photograph. So we just stood mesmerized memorizing!! I get excited just picturing the experience.

For the big budget crowd, there were over 500 vendors in the adjacent hall. I thought I could get what was on my shopping list Saturday morning, but several items had already sold out!! As we say, it was a feeding frenzy. There were so many happy people, all with huge shopping bags filled like Santa's sack. What can you expect of 60,000 visitors?

On Saturday, we attended a luncheon with an interesting speaker who told of her success in entering the publishing world. She gave us a book entitled "Where Women Create," which gives inspiring details of creative women in our field and related others. Oh how we have climbed that success ladder!

Sunday at the close of the festival, the festival founder Karey Bresenhan invited all to a champagne and cake reception, with lots of giveaways. You could also elect to participate in a dinner in the park across the street from the convention center. We had signed up, but our common sense was rather allergic to long lines by that time, and we had fallen into that ennui that is the companion to fatigue (as represented by these weary showgoers on the right). But oh, what a time we had. \odot

WESTSIDE QUILTERS EXECUTIVE BOARD MEETING November 15, 2014

A meeting of the Executive Board of Westside Quilters was held on November 15th, 2014 at the home of Sally Wright.

President Perla Rothenberg called the meeting to order at 10:15. Other officers attending were Sally Wright, Tina Nord, Lisa Redmond, Debbie Nussbaum, Roberta Walley and Lisa Drew.

The motion to approve the minutes of the September 27th meeting was made by Tina Nord, seconded by Sally Wright, and approved.

President's Report: Perla talked about her and Sally Wright's visit to the SCCQG. There was a discussion about how to encourage volunteering by members. Perla discussed this in relation to the Newsletter and how to solicit articles from members. The guild is interested in members' news - vacations, new family members, visits to quilt exhibits, comments on meetings, lectures etc. and would like to encourage members to share via the newsletter.

The Holiday Tea was discussed. The date is Saturday December 6th. It will be held at the home of Roberta Walley. Members are asked to make a donation of \$10 to attend which will be donated to a local charity. A motion to make Westside Food Bank the recipient this year was moved by Sally Wright, seconded by Lisa Redmond and approved by all. A Westside Food Bank representative will be invited to speak at the Tea. Members are asked to bring finger foods, sweet or savory, for 8-10 people on a serving plate. Tina Nord offered to supply paper napkins and take out containers.

Membership Report: Sally Wright reported that there are now 87 guild members. New or returning members may now take the half yearly membership rate of \$30.

Sally reported that there were 53 quilts entered for Road to California by 30 members. Each person has at least one quilt that will be shown. Labels with the quilters' name and address need to be affixed to each quilt. Sally will provide labels and distribute at the Tea. The quilts will not be available for pick up from the venue until the Monday afternoon. Sally offered to stay an extra day to be able to retrieve the quilts. A motion to approve the cost of a hotel room was made by Lisa Redmond, seconded by Perla Rothenberg and approved by all.

Sally also talked about the SCCQG meeting and the venue it was held at, the Mar Vista LDS center, which could be a potential back up venue for future meetings or workshops. Patti Voyles had requested philanthropy quilts for the Painted Turtle Camp. Quilts measuring 69x80 in bright colors are needed. Liability insurance was discussed and it needs to be clarified as to whether members are covered or just speakers and guests. Ways to encourage members to attend meetings and tips for recruiting and keeping new members were discussed. It was suggested that Westside Quilters have a "Greeter" posted at the door to welcome new attendees.

Treasurer's Report: Tina Nord reported that the checking account balance is currently \$6,792.39. The Ann Turley workshop had a net loss of \$81.76. The Culver City facility room rent was \$252.50, an increase from the usual \$200.00. The cancellation of the Coulombe workshop of October 24 did not cause any financial loss to the guild.

Newsletter: The deadline for the December newsletter is November 22nd. Lisa Redmond requested some assistance with writing articles from Board Members and will also ask for articles from group members. A "comments" section will also be included in the newsletter.

Philanthropy: Debbie Nussbaum talked about the very productive November 8th Philanthropy workshop. A total of 76 quilts were made. The early prep work paid off – the cutting, assembling and quilting of the quilts prior to the workshop. Debbie and Tanya thank everyone who participated, both prior to, and on the day. Debbie and Tanya were thanked and congratulated by the Board.

Programs: The first annual UFO sewing day is scheduled for Saturday January 10th at Westwood Presbyterian Church. Pat Karasick will be on hand to help with any quilting or sewing questions. It was decided that a \$100 honorarium and the \$200 room rental fee would be paid by the Guild to allow members to attend for free.

The next Executive Board meeting will be held at Westwood Presbyterian Church at 9 am on January 10, 2015, prior to the UFO workshop.

The meeting was adjourned at 12:20.
