They turn their blocks in to the committee who puts them together and gets them quilted. When the need arises, the quilt is brought to a meeting where everyone signs on the muslin and sends good thoughts and prayers to their unfortunate colleague. They always have some quilts ready with the hope that they won't need them! Shirley makes blocks when she has no other projects, and has just finished 16 blocks. She has strips of the correct size cut and sorted by lights and darks and ready to use at any time. It sounds as though this is a great idea that can be extended to any situation and is a great way to use up leftover strips for a good cause!

Operation Gratitude

Roberta Walley tells us that she currently is knitting scarves for this project. Operation Gratitude collects scarves 5-7" wide by 45-50" long during September through early December and mails them in Holiday packages to our troops. Lauren Hawley is the owner of the new store. She has a blog, uppitygirl.com, and if you scroll way down to the blogs, check out November 8 and October 24 for some photos and snippets of news. Watch the blog for progressive news leading up the store's opening. A website is coming soon. The store will emphasize both the Modern Quilters sensibility toward bright modern prints and garment sewing. The store will stock every single solid color of the Kaufman Kona line. Lauren will have a long-arm available to learn on and to rent time on as well as 8 other sewing machines for classes or rental time. Classes start up in February for all levels and types of sewing and quilting. And it's about time we had some good store news.

THE COTTON SHOP EXTENDS CLOSE-OUT SALE

Hah! We knew they couldn't just offer 30% off fabric. Now they have reductions of 50% for fabric, trimmings and buttons. Interfacing, notions, batting, pillow inserts, and books now are on sale at 30% off. There's a 1-yard minimum for all fabric. Unfortunately, the quilting fabric is fairly well picked over. In Redondo Beach on Artesia Boulevard just east of Aviation Boulevard.

MEMBERSHIP

Our membership is at 70 founding members. Of that number over 30 members have indicated they are members of a mini-group or quilting friendship group; additional members may be part of a group but did not indicate so on their application form. As Membership Chair, I encourage everyone who can do so to try to be part of a mini-group. Quilting mini-groups take on different formats—most combine social time with planned projects such as learning new techniques, making a group philanthropic quilt or project, creating block exchanges, encouraging each other to finish UFO's, working on auction quilts, etc. One year my mini-group, Loose Threads, did a Round Robin project just within our mini-group. Most of us gave the resulting quilts to a guild philanthropy outreach. Groups usually meet once a month – some meet in the evening and other groups meet during the day in a member's home or in a non-member location, such as "Quilts from the Heart" which meets at a public library community room.

In early January, I will be contacting those members not currently in a mini-group and who expressed interest in joining a group or helping to start one. I'll be asking for preferences of meeting days and time, etc. I also will be contacting existing mini-groups to see if any are able to take on new members. It is a good idea to keep groups that meet in members' homes small enough so all in the group can be accommodated and have opportunity to participate fully.

Those who indicated an interest in a mini-group, look for an e-mail from me in early January. If you are interested in joining a group, and are not sure you indicated such on your application form, just send me an e-mail, and I'll make sure you are on the list.

WHO DO YOU CALL FOR PROFESSIONAL LONG-ARM QUILTING ?

We wanted to offer options for professional machine quilting and, on an informal unscientific basis, asked several WQ members for personal recommendations. This grew in scope and produced 14 names. Those listed here have been consulted directly and information used with permission. *If you have a name to add, please contact <u>Newsletter@WestsideQuiltersLosAngeles.org</u> and we'll continue the process next month.*

Long-armers want you to furnish the top and backing fabric. Sometimes you furnish the batting. But your quilt should not be layered and pinned (that defeats one of the purposes of a long-arm). Exact pricing is not quoted here but rather the basis for each calculating fees are given.

DOTTIE ALLISON of El Segundo. Prefers hand-delivery to her home. Usually charges per square inch; unusually large quilts and appliqué or special custom work extra. Batting charged separately. Thread included unless King Tut used. Does basic stippling, custom, pantograph, freeforms, stitch-in-the-ditch ("SID") on borders or small custom work. Turnaround time averages 2 to 3 weeks. Contact via <u>Newsletter@WestsideQuiltersLosAngeles.org</u> and we will furnish direct telephone number.

SUSAN DAVIS in San Diego. Accepts quilts by mail, phone consultations. If hand-delivered, can see completed quilts and determine density and complexity of quilt designs. Charges by the hour. Batting extra, or can supply your own. Thread (Superior King Tut and So Fine) included in price. Has 2 Gammills, computerized one used for pantographs, SID, custom borders/blocks/sashings. Non-computerized one used for free motion. Turnaround time usually 3 weeks. See website www.susankquilting.com. Email <u>quiltingsensei@gmail.com</u>.

ANN MURPHY of Little Black Dog Quilt Studio in Canoga Park. Accepts tops/backs by mail or in person; willing to meet at quilt shop to give estimates or to show work. Fees based per square inch. Rates vary by types of quilting desired. Batting extra. \$5 fee for thread (\$8 for specialty thread) per quilt. Pantograph designs, custom, SID, free motion. Turnaround about 4 weeks Pantograph work and 8 weeks for custom. See website <u>www.LBDQS.com</u> which includes contact info.

ALEKSANDRA NEEDLES of Westchester. Prefers hand-delivery but will accept by mail. Fees based per square inch, complexity of design work, and number of M size bobbins used. Batting extra. Pantographs, SID, free motion, custom design. Turnaround is 1 to 2 weeks. Recommended by Quilts from the Heart and others. Contact via <u>Newsletter@WestsideQuiltersLosAngeles.org</u> and we will furnish direct telephone number.

RAGS TO RICHES QUILTERS (Robert Olsabeck, Tim Caldera, Susan Caldera) in Whittier. Accepts by mail or hand-delivery. Charges flat rates based on size of quilt (crib, twin, queen, etc.) for edge to edge quilting. For custom quilting, charges by square inch. Batting is extra. Cost of thread included. Uses Statler Stitcher for edge to edge, SID and custom designs. Doesn't do much free motion. Turnaround usually 2 weeks. Website is <u>www.ragstorichesquilters.com</u>; email is <u>olsabeck@whittier.edu</u>; business phone is 562/693-1654.

PAT ROLLIE of Pasadena/Glendale. Award winning quilter and teacher who also quilts for others. Prefers hand-delivery at a quilt shop for first-time clients; mail delivery fine for repeat customers. Fees based on estimate considering size of project, type of quilting desired, quilting density. For Pantograph work, charges per square inch. Batting extra. Thread cost included. \$10 charge to square and trim. Does all types of quilting. Aims for turnaround of 3 to 4 weeks. Contact at business phone, 323/224-8207.

BARBARA SPENCER of Chinese Camp, California. Accepts by mail only – top, backing, and batting. Fees based on size of quilt (starts at \$25). No charge for thread. Uses pantographs in edge to edge quilting. Ususally a 2-week turnaround. Contact by phone 209/984-5538.

HOUSTON INT'L WELCOMES 4 WESTSIDE QUILTERS

There were 255 vendors and 15,768 attendees at the Long Beach show in July. By comparison, at the recent Houston International show, the count was 546 vendors and 60,162 attendees. Among those at Houston were 4 members of Westside Quilters: Kathryn Bernstein, Sandy Lauterbach, Miyoko Nakamura, and Sally Wright. We asked for reports!

SANDY LAUTERBACH

Houston is an *experience*! 141 regulation basketball courts could fit on the convention floor! One half of the gigantic convention center is filled with quilts; the other half with vendors. My system is to spend the first half of the day (when I have more energy) viewing quilts and the second half (when my resolve is weaker!) strolling the vendor aisles. This is the first time I saw two vendors from France--sewing supplies and French magazines. I met people who flew in from Australia, France and the Netherlands just to attend the show.

There is something to appeal to every style of quilter--from traditional to Art Deco Baltimore Albums, to Hawaiian guilts, painted pieces, guilts incorporating printed images, wholecloth. A wide range of techniques are incorporated. I took only one two hour class--a roundabout--as there is so much to see and do! The artist walkthrough of SAQA (Studio Art Quilt Associates) exhibits was one highlight. Many of the accepted artists flew in from around the world to be at Houston. Hearing their stories made the pieces come alive. One special event was seeing in person many of the quilts in the book 500 Art Quilts. Another highlight was seeing guilts made by members of the Westside Quilters -- Sherry Kleinman, Sally Wright and I all had several pieces on display!

SALLY WRIGHT

I've always wanted to go to the Houston Int'l Quilt Festival and since this year I was lucky enough to have a quilt accepted into the judged show and a few others in various traveling shows being exhibited there, I decided if I was ever to do it, this was the year. I was too late to book at the Hilton Hotel next door to the Convention Center, so given a good rate at the Four Seasons I decided to stay in the lap of luxury across from Discovery Green. The pampering was welcome at the end of long days on the show floor. It took me three full days plus the Preview Night to cover all the quilt exhibits and the vendors -- hundreds and hundreds of vendors. IQF very thoughtfully provides a service to ship your purchases home and believe me, I used it.

I attended two classes: One short evening class with Susan Cleveland who has a great new technique for mitering corners on blocks and borders and a full day with Australian quilter and teacher Pam Holland – one of my Quilt Goddesses – doing a small travel journal quilt which I hope to show at a WQ meeting soon. She is a truly inspiring artist, traveler, photographer, blogger and quiltmaker – check out her website at http://web.mac.com/pamholland3/Pam Holland De signs/Welcome.html. She is a Renaissance woman!

Perhaps my best two hours at the show was a luncheon and talk by Kaffe Fassett. He was delightfully entertaining, his quilts and colors inspiring, and the lunch and a few hours off my feet very welcome, but the best was the delightful group of very traditional-quilter ladies from Indiana I met while standing in line who adopted single me to sit with them at their table. I never got all their names, but I won't forget their kindness and generosity. Quilters are the best!

MIYOKO NAKAMURA

Miyoko is new to quilting and eager to learn everything she can. Her indoctrination to Houston was overwhelming and stimulating all at the same time. Miyoko's first ideas of quilting have been greatly expanded and now include uses to showcase her love of photography. -Editor

KATHERINE BERNSTEIN

Every quilter has a story. Never has this been more evident than at the 2010 Houston show; the creativity and technical expertise of the quilts on exhibit were stunning and intimidating for a relative beginner like me. This year was my first trip to the Festival and it was with a great deal of excitement (no cooking or dishwashing for 5 days!) and trepidation (what if my husband blows up my house trying to heat up a frozen pizza?) that I set out on my adventure. At the airport, it became immediately apparent from the number of women toting patchwork bags that a lot of quilters were flocking to the Festival. I never felt safer on a flight – can you imagine anyone foolish enough to hijack a flight loaded with determined women all packing $4\frac{1}{2}$ " embroidery scissors?

My crazy girlfriend, Anne, also a naïf quilter, drove down from Dallas to take in the show with me. Anne is still so new that she thinks Moda is a type of fabric despite my patiently explaining to her repeatedly that Moda is a fabric company that hires designers and then prints and distributes fabric. Every time she sees the Moda label, she squeals, MODA! I LOVE MODA! Honestly, it's a little embarrassing, but she buys a lot of Moda, so the vendors apparently tolerate her. The Festival is enormous and it can be a little overwhelming. Anne and I took three days to see the exhibits because we wanted to appreciate each and every quilt. Oddly enough, we managed to run through all the vendors and our credit limits in only one day. However, I very cleverly sold my coveted Thursday class for cash to a lady from San Angelo, so it was really like free extra money with the added benefit of more shopping time. While Anne cornered the market on Moda fabric, I focused on buying gadgets. I bought some very cool stuff: 007 fabric bonding powder; a bodkin; every marking pen and pencil on the market; Clover Black Gold needles (they are wonderful!); a full set of Fabrico fabric pens; and a set of 12 Drunkard's Path acrylic templates (I don't even like that pattern but the

guys at Curve Master are really persuasive). By Friday morning, Anne and I were starting to drag a little. The woman from San Angelo came staggering down for breakfast with a glazed look in her eyes from all the shopping and exhibits. I helpfully pointed out that she had forgotten one of her earrings. She blearily told us that in the middle of putting on her earrings, she decided she better take her pills before she forgot. So she counted out her pills into the glass in which she had put her earrings the night before and chugged them down, along with the back to her earring. Her first stop of the day was going to be one of the wonderful jewelry vendors for a new earring back and then on to CVS for some ExLax.

It was with a great deal of pride that I pointed out to Anne that Westside Quilters members had a number of quilts on exhibit. It is remarkable that our guild has so many gifted quilters! By Sunday, Anne and I were happy to return to our homes, our husbands and our sewing machines. Anne is now figuring out how to put binding on her first quilt and hide all that Moda from her husband, and I am trying finish a quilt before Christmas. Regardless of our level of expertise, we took away lovely memories of beautiful quilts, fun with friends and the true reward of being in the same space with thousands of people with the same intention: telling stories with fabric, needle and thread.

THE TREASURER'S REPORT

inaugural year actually got started – moneywise – in early August. We're doing very well!

We created a budget based on the assumption of 75 members by our fiscal year end (May 31, 2011), and we have 70 at the six-month point. We budgeted \$10,500 for programming (\$3,500 for quarterly speakers, and \$7,000 for workshops and events). These amounts are high for this year because our first four months were without programming. But the concept remains sound. Our workshops should pay for themselves. We're under budget in almost every expense category.

The application ("the 1023") for Federal non-profit status is hovering as we await collection of the documents needed. Submission shouldn't be delayed much longer. Our finances are strong and the guild can afford to pay out the \$850 application fee; originally we anticipated member loans.

NOVEMBER 12, 2010

Sally Wright called the meeting to order at 2:40 PM and Sandra Lauterbach recorded the minutes.

Sally welcomed Kathryn Bernstein to the board. She will work with Rosemary on programs.

The board members confirmed the acceptance of the minutes of the October 9,2010 Quarterly Meeting and the September 25, 2010 Executive Board Meeting which were received via e-mail.

Treasurer's Report: Tina Nord distributed and discussed budget projections and workshop information. The guild should have the funds to pay the 501c3 filing fee. Workshop projections were necessary in order to draft the proposed budget.
