PROGRAMS & WORKSHOPS

Happy New Year! I can't believe it is 2015 already! One of my favorite things about a new year is the feelings it brings of hope, renewal, and the desire to stretch ourselves to new heights. We have some exciting things planned in Programs and Workshops this year that will hopefully help you to reach new quilting goals and give you the opportunity to learn a new quilting technique or refresh your knowledge about something you may have tried in the past.

Our first educational workshop for the New Year brings well known quilting teacher Debbie Maddy to our

guild. Debbie has been quilting for over 30 years and designing patterns for 12 years. She publishes patterns under the name Calico Carriage Quilt Designs and is an international traveling teacher for quilt guilds and shops. She has taped an episode of Simply Quilts for HGTV, and her



designs have been published in *McCall's Quilting*, *Quilts and More*, and *Quiltmaker's 100 Blocks*. Debbie has also had numerous best-selling patterns in *Keepsake Quilting*. Debbie was nominated for Quilter of the Year in 2013 by the International Association of Professional Quilters.

On Friday, February 6, Debbie will show guild members how to make her most popular quilt design, "Labyrinth," using her "No Diamonds/No "Y" Seams technique to make them very easy to piece, by making the



old style 45 degree diamond quilts using only half square triangle units. From lap to king size, this quilt is nothing but fun and very interesting. High contrast fabrics in any design make the maze illusion work. You can choose from four sizes...lap to king... to make in class. It

is so simple; you will want to make more than one!! And don't forget to attend the General Meeting on Saturday, February 7, to see Debbie's trunk show and lecture, where she will be sharing with us even more amazing quilts that can be made using this simple technique.

WQ MEMBER IN ACTION!

A Middle School Quilting & Sewing Class

Editor's Note: At last month's WQ Member Holiday Tea, member **Suzanne Woods** brought up that she teaches a quilting/sewing class at a public middle school. This article is a follow-up to the request for further information. Suzanne shared our interest in the class with her students and with this article in mind, she asked them to share their favorite projects.



The middle school Quilting/Sewing class that I work with includes 35-40 sixth to eighth graders at Patrick Henry Middle School in Granada Hills (an LAUSD school). The class begins with basics: threading a needle, using an iron, learning the basic safety and operations of a sewing machine, and scissors and the rotary cutter. The class then progresses to a variety of projects.

Throughout the course, skills are emphasized to include safety, accuracy in measuring and cutting, and use of creativity.

The projects include:

1. A pincushion made from 5" squares and hand-sewn. — "I liked the pincushion best because it was "the first time to sew something."





- 2. A nine-patch pillow.
- "The project I liked best is the pillow because I got to sleep on it."



- 3. A checkerboard (which includes batting and backing)
- A draw string bag made of 5" squares and lined



- 5. A quilt sampler that includes two student-designed blocks that must include using a triangle in at least one block.
 - "I liked the guilt because I was making something big and it was something that I enjoyed."
 - "The project I liked the best is the quilt. I liked it because I did a really good job on it and it turned out really good and I was really impressed that I actually made that."




Students who finish the assigned projects and still have time left in the semester can choose an independent project to work on – a stuffed turtle, a knitting project, a stuffed teddy bear, a denim shoulder bag etc.



— "The project I liked best is the teddy bear project because it gives you a sense of accomplishment, knowing that you were the one that made that bear and it makes you and your friends/relatives proud of what you made."

For each of the assigned projects the students select from a supply of "baggies" that contain the appropriate fabrics for the specific project, assembled out of donations. Donations we receive consist of actual fabric, and gift cards and PTA financial support to purchase other materials. Donations are ALWAYS needed!

WESTSIDE QUILTERS EXECUTIVE BOARD MEETING January 10, 2015

A meeting of the Executive Board of Westside Quilters was held on January 10th, 2015 at the Westwood Presbyterian Church, prior to the UFO Workshop.

President Perla Rothenberg called the meeting to order at 9:15. Other officers attending were Sally Wright, Tina Nord, Lisa Redmond, Debbie Nussbaum, Roberta Walley and Stephanie Horsley.

President's Report: Perla presented a thank you letter from the Westside Food Bank for the \$500 charitable contribution in December. The letter was passed for those in attendance to see. There was a discussion about participating in a canned goods drive for the Food Bank. It was instead decided that WQ members would be encouraged to donate as individuals to a food bank/donation center of their choice.

A WQ event at the Craft and Folk Art Museum (CAFAM) in conjunction with the "Man-Made: Contemporary Male Quilters" exhibit was discussed. The talk mostly centered around costs and times. The exhibit is on display from January 25 through May 3. Tina Nord knows of a person who might be willing to make an anonymous donation to cover the cost of an honorarium for a private docent tour, therefore no cost to the guild. A weeknight event was discounted by the thought of evening traffic to that part of town. Officers were more optimistic towards a Saturday or Sunday AM event, with members responsible for their own parking lot costs. Perla will pursue.

Philanthropy: Debbie Nussbaum talked about delivering near 80 quilts made at the November 8th Philanthropy workshop. Twenty-five quilts were delivered to the St. Joseph Center in Venice. About half of the remaining were delivered to Las Familias del Pueblo, with the rest of the bulk going to Para Los Ninos, both located in Skid Row in Downtown Los Angeles. Photos are on the website.

The scholarship for the February workshop was brought up. Stephanie Horsley knows of an individual and she will ask.

Leadership Report: Roberta Walley noted there is a SCCQG meeting that day in Downey. WQ member Aileen Cooke, who is the Membership Chair for SCCQG, will take notes for us on the topic "Successful Workshops." The SCCQG "Meet the Teachers" event will be held April 25 at the Carson Community Center in Carson, CA.

Roberta shared how she has a constant concern for new officers and fresh blood with elections fast approaching. She urged others to share any new ideas. It was suggested that Roberta look at the notes from the last SCCQG meeting on ways to encourage members to volunteer.

Membership Report: Sally Wright reported that there are no new guild members and membership stands at 87, although there is a strong potential for a new member that day.

Sally reported that she has received half the quilts for the Road to California atrium exhibit, and hopes to receive the remainder at that day's workshop. She is scheduled to deliver the quilts a week from that day, January 17. The quilts will be available for pick up from the venue Monday afternoon from 3-5pm. Sally thanked the board for paying for the extra day's hotel cost to be able to retrieve the quilts.

Treasurer's Report: Tina Nord reported that the checking account balance is currently \$5,413.44. December activity included the \$395 collected in donations at the Holiday Tea with the off-setting \$500 charitable contribution to the Westside Food Bank. St. John's meeting venue rentals were paid for February and May. Culver City workshop venue rentals were paid for February and March, along with a \$300 refundable deposit. Debbie Caffrey, a speaker in 2016, was paid a \$250 deposit of her fee. Pat Karasick was paid a \$200 fee for the UFO Workshop.

Tina also noted that there is \$2,850 in expenses to pay prior to the Fiscal Year End (FYE), which is May 31. These expenses include the annual CPA fee of \$300, and projected February and May quarterly general meeting expenses. The projected cash balance on FYE is \$2,863, assuming the February through May workshops will not show a loss.

Additionally, 1099 Forms for speakers who were paid \$600 or more in 2014 are set to go out in the next few weeks. Also going out are donor acknowledgment letters for donations of \$25 or more received in 2014.

Programs: Sally Wright brought up the topic of pricing on workshops. The discussion ensued about estimating the number of attendees and setting the workshop price to cover expenses. While some speakers/workshop instructors are fine with home hospitality, many require a hotel adding onto the expense. Stephanie Horsley said she is able to get a Mormon rate of approximately \$75 through La Quinta hotels. It was decided that Tina, Perla and Stephanie would closely go over fees before publishing a workshop fee price. With continued discussion about ensuring that enough is made with workshop fees to cover expenses, Lisa Redmond wondered if more students could be added to the April Zentangle workshop since it appears to be so wildly popular. Stephanie will check with the instructor. Stephanie noted that Charlotte Angotti (May) would take up to 50 students. The board discussed the possibility of opening up the Angotti Workshop at the WQ member fee to neighboring guilds such as South Bay, Santa Monica, San Fernando or Glendale.

Stephanie reported that Christen Brown, who is teaching the March Ribbonwork workshop, requires students to purchase her book for those who do not already own it.

Stephanie is going to check with February instructor/speaker Debbie Maddy if she is up for a potluck or restaurant dinner on Friday night. If so, board members and workshop attendees will be invited. Regarding the February General Meeting, Marianne Simpson will give the demonstration. The showcase will again be Aristeia, a needlepoint shop. Stephanie noted that it is difficult to find a shop to participate on a Saturday morning. The board discussed that it does not have to be a shop, but perhaps an association or collector, a travel agent who sets up quilt tours and much more. Stephanie will check into additional possibilities that were suggested.

Newsletter: The deadline for the February newsletter is January 23.

The next Executive Board meeting will be held at the home of Sally Wright on March 21.

The meeting was adjourned at 10:05.
