Fifth, please let me know if you are involved in any quilt education activities—schools, Girl Scouts, summer camps etc. I would also like to share these with all our members.



A DOUBLE DOSE OF QUILT EXHIBITS IN SAN DIEGO

"Visions" has manifested itself as the non-profit Visions Art Museum in San Diego, "dedicated to the promotion and appreciation of the quilt as art." Currently three exhibitions are on view until January 23, 2011: The Art of the Stitch (contemporary use of embroidery); Close Up – San Diego Visions Artists (featuring 8 master contemporary quilt artists); and Leaves & Trees with Embroidery (a fundraising challenge of 12" square pieces). www.quiltvisions.org.

Separately, "Quit Visions 2010: No Boundaries", the biennial juried show, is open at the Oceanside Museum of Art until March 13, 2011. 39 quilts, some very large. QUILTS, INC. "QUILTING IN AMERICA 2010"

The sixth survey study sponsored by Quilts, Inc. (Quilters Newsletter and International Quilt Market & Festival among their divisions) was recently released. This market research project is conducted every third year with the intent of measuring the amount of time and money quilters spend. The research process involves surveys of 20,000 U.S. households and more in-depth interviews with 2,500 dedicated quilters. Key findings:

The estimated value of the quilting market in 2010 is \$3.58 billion, up 9% since 2006.

An estimated 16.38 million U.S. households (14% of households) include at least one quilter, down 14% from 2006.

The total number of U.S. quilters is 21.3 million, down 23% from 2006.

The average quilting household's annual expenditure for quilting is up 27% since 2006, to \$219.

6.2% of quilting households are considered dedicated, responsible for generating 69% of quilt industry spending (\$2.48 billion).

The average dedicated quilter has a room set aside solely for sewing/quilting activities. This average quilter has \$8,542 of quilting tools and supplies (incl. an average of 2.7 machines), and owns \$3,677 worth of fabric (93.6 yards purchased in the last 12 months). Thread? In the last 12 months, our average quilter purchased \$144.10 of thread and maintains a thread inventory of 152 spools.

The startling statistic here is that the number of quilters declined by 14% over the past three years. Other studies have identified home hobbies as increasing in a poor economy so the drop in the number of active quilters seems unusual. Several theories have surfaced: Many quilters may be using up their stash, avoiding classes and otherwise taking themselves out of the market; some question the validity of the study and the fact that younger, newer quilters may have been overlooked (those who do not have land-line phones, who are self-taught and not part of the quilting mainstream); the emergence of home crafts in general may have replaced some quilting projects; the demise of many quilt shops.

JINNY BEYER IN CHULA VISTA ON FEBRUARY 19, 2011

The Friendship Quilters of San Diego are sponsoring two interactive lectures by quilter Jinny Beyer in a rare West Coast appearance (Chula Vista). The lecture is "Color & Design" and will be given twice in one day (9:30 AM Morning Session and 2:00 PM Afternoon Session. Tickets are \$25 and can be ordered through the guild's website, www.FriendshipQuiltersSD.org. Or email SewsALot@aol.com.

SPEAKING OF QUILT SHOPS

After December 31, **The Cotton Shop** will be only a memory. Since the sale begin a month ago, the shelves are emptying fast, especially the quilt fabric, and the store may close sooner than December 31. The Lanz family, owners of the Redondo Beach fabric store, is closing its doors after 51 years. Business has been good but "the time is right" for retirement. All fabric is 30% off (no additional markdowns are planned). Sing a sad song. 1922 Artesia Boulevard, Redondo Beach. www.TheCottonShop.com.

A Time to Sew (formerly Leah's) in Mission Viejo closed in October. There's been talk about a second life for the shop – you can follow their plans at www.a-time-to-sew.com or 949/349-9437. Leah's in Orange is now Orange Quilt Bee and is run by many former Leah's employees. Elsewhere in Orange County and relatively new is Sewing Party in Laguna Hills. Material Possessions in Lake Forest, closed last year but Sacred Moondance is alive and well in the same space. M & L Fabrics Discount Store continues on in Anaheim, and will be visited by Westside Quilters on December 4 as part of our field trip to the Bowers Museum [see Programs on page 2].

Last year Loving Stitches in Santa Clarita also closed when the owner retired.

A nice success story belongs to **Cozy Quilt Shop** in El Cajon. The shop was opened in 2003 and has grown appreciably ever since. They have a full class schedule, and offer their own patterns, Cozy Pattern Originals. They sponsor a Strip Club program, and *each month* offer a coordinated bundle of about 40 2-1/2" strips and a new original pattern for these strips. This store offers a free lecture each month to debut the new sample and present the pattern. Some Westsiders are frequent visitors to these free lectures (usually on Saturday mornings) and have been impressed to see 150+ in attendance. Cozy Quilt Shop offers a weekly newsletter. Check them out at www.cozyquilt.com.

Two more local fabric stores are of interest: Lincoln Fabrics is at 1600 Lincoln Boulevard in Venice, www.lincolnfabrics1.com. They have a limited supply of all-cotton fabrics suitable for traditional quilting but the store is funky enough to provide remnants and enormous possibilities for fabrics to use as embellishments. The boxes of remnants by the back entrance are not for the faint of heart but contain some winners. A relatively new entrant to the neighborhood is Fabric Planet, 423 Lincoln Boulevard also in Venice. There are very few all-cotton fabrics among the slightly used looking bolts although a lot of space is devoted to cording and decorative trims. Collagists can find a great variety of quasi-home dec or crafting fabric.

Here's a recommendation from our member Sue Correll – Mary Jo's Cloth Store in Gastonia, North Carolina. Hold on. There's a website, www.maryjos.com. They boast of 32,000 square feet of retail space and 30 employees on the selling floor at any one time (by comparison, Cozy Quilt Shop in El Cajon has 4,500 square feet and 3,000 bolts of fabric). Mary Jo's isn't all quilting fabric, of course. Mary Jo's is famous for their customer service and their "Ask Mary Jo" guarantee. "Looking for a particular fabric, notion, or accessory? Tell Mary Jo what you need and our knowledgable staff will find it. If we do not have it in stock, we will make our best effort to obtain it from the manufacturer..."

In their November newsletter, **Superior Threads** led off with a rave review of **www.FindMyFabric.com** created by Websites For Quilters. To quote: "... an innovative fabric search engine that finds fabric and quilting supplies from hundreds of online quilt stores." You can search by typing in key words or by uploading a digital photo – a great feature when you don't know the manufacturer's name of the fabric you're seeking.

MINUTES OF THE

WESTSIDE QUILTERS EXECUTIVE BOARD MEETING

SEPTEMBER 25, 2010

A meeting of the Executive Board of Westside Quilters ("WQ") was held on September 25, 2010, at the home of Sally Wright.

The following Directors were in attendance: Sally Wright, Tina Nord, Rosemary Dresser, Sandy Ray and Sandra Lauterbach.

Sally Wright called the meeting to order at 1:15 PM and Sandra Lauterbach recorded the minutes. A quorum of Executive Board members was present.

Tina moved that we confirm the acceptance of the minutes received via e-mail of the August 5, 2010 Executive Board meeting. Unanimously accepted.

Treasurer's Report: Tina Nord reported that:

- 1. The guild has 38 members.
- 2. She distributed the Balance Sheet and the P&L through 9/27/10
- 3. \$850 profit from the Fowler Museum event.
- 4. 501c3 application requirements include showing the current budget and assumption for 3 years going forward. The Board estimated (1) 75 guild members by 5/31/11 with incremental increases of 25 members per year; and (2) \$1250 gross income from fundraisers estimated for this fiscal year with yearly incremental increases.
- 5. Donations to the guild to date total \$825. The Board estimated future cash donations of \$1,000 per year.
- 6. Program expenses: \$3500/yr planned; three \$1,000 programs and one \$500 program.
- 7. Annual Workshops projections are \$8,000 income and \$7,000 expenses; will keep the same projections for future years.
- 8. Grants: any prospect apply/receive grant money in next 3-4 yrs-NO
- 9. No income anticipated from producing and marketing original work.
- 10. Bylaws need to be redrafted to conform with 501c3 application.
- 11. Board only (not members) needs to approve bylaws and a document so stating needs to be signed by all officers.
- 12. Tina will circulate to the Board the revised bylaws, narrative and projections for the 501C(3) application; she hopes to be able to submit it by 11/1/10.
- 13. Tina volunteered to loan the \$850 application fee and wait for reimbursement until the end of the guild's fiscal year.

Newsletter: Tina plans to send the newsletter out around 10/1/10.

New Board Members: Sally reported that some positions are still unfilled. Sandy will contact a friend who may be interested in the historian/photographer position. Rosemary needs a program co-chair.

Membership: Tina reported that Veronica will provide the number of members for the newsletter. The Board advised against sending out the guild roster via email due to privacy concerns. Sally will talk with Fred Zerez to find out how to make the roster available only via a password on the guild website. Veronica would update it as necessary on the website.

October 9, 2010 general meeting: Tina and Veronica will staff the reception table. Pepper Libow has volunteered to help at info/entry desk. Veronica will have membership badges and cards.

Programs: Rosemary reported that a teacher was unavailable for the April workshop so Sherry Kleinman has switched to April. The June workshop space is now open.

Carol Taylor will cost \$550 plus hotel costs.

November	12 th Roberta Walley's workshop: The pattern costs \$5.25 and each parking permit costs \$2.50.	She is ordering
15 patterns.	The workshop will be from 10-3 and the cost is \$35.	

Bower museum trip on Saturday December 4th: Discounted admission charge is \$9/person. Rosemary is trying to get a bus for 38 people. A 5 hr trip from 10-3pm would cost \$578 all inclusive except for parking. A 47 person bus would cost \$635.50. \$100 for each additional hour. Trip would include a one hour museum tour, one hour for lunch either at the museum restaurant or a brown bag lunch, and a stop at quilt shop on the way back. Rosemary will choose the quilt shop. The drive is one hour each way. In order to set a price in the newsletter we will assume 30 people will attend for \$35 per person excluding lunch. It is a breakeven event for the guild. Sandy suggested that Rosemary talk at Quilts from the Heart to notify them of this trip.

January 14, 2011 -- Rene Jennings workshop: It will be from 9:30-3:30. Renee Jennings fee is \$200 plus mileage and meals, \$150 for classroom. The workshop will cost \$40. Renee will teach the Gordian Knot quilt and binding finishing.

February 2011 meeting --Margarete Heinisch. Her fee is \$400. Rosemary is waiting for information from her.

March 11, 2011-- Sylvia Davis workshop. Her fee is \$400. We need to choose the subject of her workshop. It should not be the same class she is doing at the South Bay Guild.

April 2011 -- Sherry Kleinman workshop. Her fee is \$250. Subject will be water color media.

May 21, 2011 -- Freddy Moran.

June 2011 workshop -- No one is scheduled yet.

July 2011 -- Linda Schmidt workshop.

MINUTES OF THE

WESTSIDE QUILTERS QUARTERLY MEETING

OCTOBER 9, 2010

The first general meeting of Westside Quilters ("WQ") was held on October 9, 2010, at St. Alban's Episcopal Church In Westwood. 59 guild members were present.

INTRODUCTORY REMARKS: Sally Wright called the meeting to order at 10:00 AM. She introduced herself and welcomed everyone. She asked all members to stand up and introduce themselves.

Philanthropy Presentations: Sandy Ray showed quilts from Quilts from the Heart. Twice a year they have a sale at the Mar Vista farmers' market and the money is used to buy batting that they use. The fabric is all donated. They welcome donations of 100% cotton or unfinished projects. The quilts are given to the VA hospital, Outward Bound and Venice clinic among others. She shared quilts.

Marianne Simpson spoke about Pat of Love and showed quilts. Pat of Love makes quilts that are given to cancer patients at St. Johns Hospital's oncology department. One woman donated 50-60 tops using a variety of fabrics. She showed kits with backs, tops and batting and offered them to anyone who wants to make one.

Sally introduced Sherry Kleinman who will teach a water color media workshop in April for WQ. Sherry explained she uses water media—crayon, fabric and acrylic paint. Sally introduced the speaker, Carol Taylor. Carol discussed the evolution of her work with a visual presentation and displayed numerous quilts.
