MESSAGE FROM OUR PRESIDENT TINA NORD

Remembering Mrs. S.

Lately the gift of time has come my way: I now have two new free days each week giving me time for more sewing and reflecting. particularly on my 7th grade sewing teacher at Palms Junior High School, Mrs. S.

I learned to sew literally at my mother's knee-helping to pump the old Singer treadle machine. By the 6th grade I was making clothes acceptable enough to wear in public. In the 7th grade, "Clothing" was mandatory as all girl students made gym bags and dirndl skirts. In subsequent grades, I took "Advanced Clothing" under the illuminating Mrs. S. She taught that sewing could be a creative endeavor, not strictly a utilitarian one. And the school had *electric* sewing machines. Mrs. S. wore tailored suits of her own design with colorful silk blouses; she was the antithesis of dowdy. She imparted lessons I remember and use to this day.

Place your scissors horizontally on your work surface---easier to pick up and less likely to be pointed accidentally at the floor or another human being. When marking a hem, mark the wrong side of the fabric at twice the width of the hem from the raw edge. Then press to the mark and you don't have any markings that might show at the hem edge. When hand-sewing, pin only far enough ahead to use up the thread on your needle. Excessive pinning creates weight, stresses fabric, and causes pinpricks. Use a Hong Kong finish on hems as well as on raw seam edges for fray-able or heavy fabrics. (Look this one up. Amazing how much it's like a quilt binding.) In the 9th grade, I was ready to make a blouse with lace inserts and top-stitching, set-in sleeves, a tailored collar with piping, machine-made bound buttonholes, French seams, cuff plackets. All thanks to Mrs. S.

Giving thanks to Mrs. S. seems appropriate to the season. We give thanks for our friends, our dearest loved ones, and their health: perhaps we should remember those who have taught us and who have passed on their wisdom and experience. *Thanks to you all!*

NEWS FROM THE SOUTHERN CALIFORNIA COUNCIL OF QUILT GUILDS

Unhappily, as the Westside Quilters rep to the **Southern California Council of Quilt Guilds**, I had to miss our quarterly Westside Quilters General Meeting on October 13 in order to attend the SCCQG quarterly meeting hosted by the Antelope Valley Quilters at Quartz Hill High School in the Palmdale/Lancaster area.

It was a gorgeous day and a beautiful drive out on Route 14 through rolling hills, ranch country and past Vasquez Rocks (remember those 1960s Star Trek episodes?) into the Antelope Valley.

This meeting was especially important because a number of SCCQG Board positions were to be elected. I am happy to say that our own (and South Bay's and Santa Monica's) member *Pam Overton* was elected President in a contested race with longtime SCCQG President *Kaaren Knowlin*.

By the way, Pam is looking for someone to take on her former duties as SCCQG Insurance Chair and for someone to step in to take over the job of SCCQG Treasurer to fulfill the remainder of Don Beld's elected term. Contact Pam if you are interested in helping.

Other topics of discussion included how to properly draft a teacher lecture/workshop contract to protect a Guild in all kinds of situations and a detailed presentation by SCCQG Treasurer Don Beld on required Federal and State tax filings for non-profits. This was followed by a break out session with Don and a number of Guild reps who needed information about filing for non-profit status. Don asked the 37 Guild reps attending how many groups did not have non-profit status or thought they had organized under the wrong 501c designation. I counted at least 10 hands. I was surprised at the number and so grateful that WQ's 501c3 status had been taken care of by *Tina Nord* so efficiently and immediately upon our founding.

It was also announced that last year's new *Meet the Teachers* concept will be continued again in April at the Carson Community Center. It will again feature a Quilt Show structure with teachers in individual booths advertising their programs as well as a number of vendors.

The next SCCQG meeting is January 12, 2013 in San Marcos (San Diego County).

OUT AND ABOUT With Sally Madigan

A VISIT TO THE CHAMPLAIN VALLEY QUILT SHOW IN VERMONT

October 19th dawned bright and clear. It was an unseasonal 67 degrees when my sister and I drove off to the Quilt Show sponsored by the Champlain Valley Quilt Guild of Vermont--website: www.cvqgvt.org. Under VQF ribbon winners, you can see a number of the quilts that were hung at this show.

The members' quilts ranged from traditional to "innovative." One of the most unusual was *Summer Breeze*, depicting a summer sunset on Lake Champlain. The quilter used curved pvc pipe to maintain the rounded shape of the top!

The show included Vermont-made quilts loaned by the Vermont Historical Society. These quilts dated from as early as 1860, and included a red and white Carpenter's Square made in 1869, and a blue and white Star of Bethlehem made in 1906.

Then I began to see that innovation might have been lurking in the mountains of Vermont even "way back when." While an 1892 quilter embroidered Kate Greenaway blocks in traditional red and white, an earlier quilter, in 1890, had created a crazy quilt which included Kate Greenaway blocks embroidered on a black background!





But the most unusual quilt from this group was this cotton "Crazy Quilt Variation," made in 1909. Now that's an innovative approach to crazy quilts!

This was a quilt show, and included a silent auction. My sister, who went to the quilt show because of me, won 2 of the quilts she bid on: here is one of them—the ever popular Sunbonnet Sue.
